

Payne Wins Nod In Maine Primary

PORTLAND, Maine (AP)—Sen. Frederick G. Payne (R), friend of the controversial Bernard Goldfine, was overwhelmingly renominated in Maine's primaries.

He and Gov. Edmund S. Muskie, opposed on the Democratic primary ballot yesterday, will battle it out in the state's final early September election. In 1960, Maine joins the other states balloting in November.

Sen. Payne, who acknowledged taking an expensive coast from Boston millionaire Goldfine some time ago, piled up better than a 5-1 vote over Herman D. Sabagian, a long-time political foe who told the voters that when he needed a coat "I bought it myself."

None of the other primary contests was so one-sided.

Tightest race of all was the Democratic nomination for the first four-year term as governor, Dr. Clinton A. Clauson, ex-mayor of Waterville, edged Maynard C. Dolloff, by roughly 1,200 votes.

State Grange Master Dolloff led the open support of several top party leaders.

On the Republican side, ex-Gov. Horace A. Hildreth, a radio-TV executive, was nominated to the office he held from 1945 to 1949.

Veteran Rep. Robert Hale (R) beat two opponents in his bid for a ninth consecutive term in the 1st Dist. His September foe again

will be Democrat James C. Oliver, who is still contesting Hale's 29-0 victory in the 1956 general election.

In the 2nd Dist., farmer Neil S. Bishop won the GOP nomination to meet Rep. Frank M. Coffin, unopposed in the Democratic primary.

Rep. Clifford G. McIntire (R) and Gerald J. Grady (D) had no contests in the 3rd Dist.

More than 140,000 voted yesterday—15,000 fewer than in the record primary year of 1952, but 30,000 more than two years ago when there was only one statewide contest, a three-way GOP race for governor.

With all but 16 of 632 precincts unofficially tabulated, the vote was:

U. S. Senate—Payne 81,399 and Sabagian 15,895.

Governor—Republican, Hildreth 62,968 to 38,414 for Philip F. Chapman Jr., a former state senator; Democratic, Clauson 29,545 and Dolloff 19,347.

With all the 1st Dist.'s 157 precincts in, Hale had 15,872 votes to 12,745 for Saco Mayor Peter A. Garland and 11,660 for State Sen. George E. Curtis Jr. Democrat Arthur Polled 10,632 and Bowdoin College Football Coach Adam Walsh 5,790.

Bishop, onetime independent candidate for governor, had 19,372 to political newcomer Elwin A. Sharpe's 9,570 in the 2nd Dist.

Indifference To Religion Biggest Problem Facing U.S. Ministers Now, Says Graham

SACRAMENTO (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham says he considers indifference to religion one of the biggest problems facing ministers today.

Graham, in outlining plans for his greater Sacramento crusade here June 29 to July 6, told a group of some 300 ministers:

"I'd rather have people talking against religion than not talking about it at all."

He said that he felt his purpose in serving God was to focus people's attention on religion and Christ.

"We merely come here to help you harvest what each of you have been sowing in your churches all year long," he told the ministers.

"And the reason we are able to do this is because in the past five years there has been a great change in the world."

"I find that everywhere now I go people listen to what I have to say."

"But my kind of evangelism is the least effective of the many kinds. To get people back to God and back in the churches you must develop and practice individual evangelism."

Graham was asked later in an interview if he had any preconceived ideas about Sacramento.

"No, I don't think sin is any

different here than any other city."

As for the lasting effects of his revivals, he said he agreed with what former Evangelist Billy Sunday said once when asked the same thing:

"A bath doesn't last, but you still need one ever so often."

Road Group Makes Trip

LAKEVIEW — Approximately 47 persons were in the caravan that journeyed from Lakeview Friday morning, June 12, to Winnemucca, Nevada, to attend a meeting with the Humboldt County Court in regard to the Adel-Winnemucca highway construction. Added to the 40 Lakeview people in the group were representatives from Harney County, Klamath County and the State Highway Commission.

Purpose of the trip was to give assurance to the Nevada group that Lake County will proceed with the work in joining the Humboldt County's planned construction. Reassurance was necessary on the Nevada end as to this county's plans because of a recent indication that Oregon's backing of the construction was questioned. County Judge C. H. Langset assured the officials of plans for the county work, backed by approval of the State Highway Department. Raymond Johnson, president of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce, had been told by W. C. Williams, state highway engineer, that state engineers will be sent here shortly to make the required survey. The road has been approved by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads for federal and state secondary highway system.

Figures released by two state agencies show:

Bigger than seasonal gains in the number of persons at work and a drop in the number of those out of work between April and May.

However, the 6.2 per cent unemployment rate still is the highest for any May since 1950, when the rate was 7.2 per cent.

The biggest pickups in jobs for May were in construction, agriculture and other outside industries which had been hampered by the late spring rains, the departments said.

The number of persons at work in May was 129,000 higher than the April figure, compared to a normal gain of 85,000. The number of unemployed decreased by 71,000, the highest drop in recent years.

May employment in construction was about the same as a year ago and was higher in government, service and finance. In the durable goods manufacturing industries such as aircraft, machinery, metal and automobiles, the number is below May 1957.

Smaller declines were reported in agriculture, trade groups and transportation-utilities.

The pair, free on \$2,000 bail each, are Eldon L. Shaver and Paul R. Wilson.

The judge last week dismissed the case against them because of a legal nuance contained in the complaint.

However, they were re-arrested and re-arrested, then had a preliminary hearing set for Monday morning when the judge bound them over.

Shaver and Wilson are accused of the theft of a 1957 Buick Wildcat from the office of the Klamath Falls Board of Realtors. The car was valued at \$2,000.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON TO PAVE AND IMPROVE SECOND STREET FROM THE NORTHWESTERLY LINE OF MCKINLEY STREET THROUGH THE INTERSECTION OF SECOND STREET AND ROOSEVELT STREET WHICH IS A REDUCTION IN SIZE OF IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 130.

WHEREAS, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and Notice of Hearing and Common Council did on April 21, 1958, hold a public hearing to consider objections and remonstrances against the improvement unit No. 130 and the Common Council did at the conclusion of said hearing instruct the City Engineer to reduce the size of the proposed improvement unit and to submit plans, specifications and estimates based on the size of the smaller improvement unit; and

WHEREAS, the City Engineer of Klamath Falls, Oregon, pursuant to said instruction has filed plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement unit, as amended, satisfactory which improvement unit shall continue to be known as Improvement Unit No. 130.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED IN THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, DULY ASSEMBLED IN REGULAR SESSION, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.
That the amended improvement unit designated and filed by the City Engineer together with the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement unit, as amended, filed by the City Engineer, be and the same are hereby approved.

That the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, hereby declares its intention to improve a portion of second street in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates as follows:

This project consists of paving Second Street from the northwesterly line of McKinley Street through the intersection of Second Street and Roosevelt Street. Paving will consist of 5 inches of asphalt concrete of a thickness of cement concrete and will be 28 inches in width including cement curbs and gutters. A storm sewer will be constructed from Roosevelt Street to McKinley Street.

No sidewalks are to be constructed. The estimated cost of all classes of improvement embracing all work and materials for the complete improvement of said project for such type of pavement being as follows:

Asphaltic Concrete Pavement Type "E" 3" thick \$7,873.90.
Cement Concrete Pavement Type "C" 6" thick \$9,207.90.
Total \$17,081.80.

Section 2.
That the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited by said improvement (to-wit):

Beginning at the most westerly corner of lot 5, block 102, said Buena Vista Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, thence northeasterly along the northeasterly line of California Avenue to the most southerly corner of lot 5, block 102, said Buena Vista Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, thence northeasterly along the line common to lots 5 and 4, block 102, said Buena Vista Addition, 121.5 feet to a point thence southeasterly 121.5 feet to a point which lies 121.5 feet southwesterly (when measured at right angles) from a point on the southeasterly line of Second Street said point on Second Street being 14.0 feet northwesterly along the southeasterly line of Second Street from the northeast corner of lot 1, block 102, said Buena Vista Addition, thence northeasterly 153.0 feet to said point on the southeasterly line of Second Street, thence continuing northeasterly crossing Second Street and along the southeasterly line of block 21, First Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, to a point which lies 124.1 feet from the northeasterly line of Second Street, thence northeasterly parallel to Second Street to a point on the northwesterly line of block 101, said Buena Vista Addition, thence southeasterly along the northwesterly line of block 101, said Buena Vista Addition 124.1 feet to the most westerly corner of lot 2, block 101, said Buena Vista Addition, thence northeasterly at right angles to Roosevelt Street to the most southerly corner of the easterly line of California Avenue 65.5 feet; thence southeasterly to a point on the northwesterly line of Roosevelt Street, thence southeasterly to a point on the northwesterly line of block 102, said Buena Vista Addition, thence southeasterly along the southeasterly line of Roosevelt Street to the point of beginning.
