

Polls Named For Wheat Quota Vote

The following voting places for the June 20 wheat marketing quota referendum were announced today by Earl Wilson, chairman, Klamath County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee:

Bonanza-Poe Valley community at the Langell Valley Soil Conservation Service office in Bonanza, Merrill - Malin, Henley - Keno - Midland, and Fort Klamath communities at the County ASC office in the Tower Theater Building in Klamath Falls.

All eligible voters may cast their ballots at these locations between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m., June 20, 1958.

"The Soil Bank program has caused a slight change in the eligibility rule for voting," chairman Wilson said today. "In past wheat referendums, the general rule for eligibility was that all growers in the commercial wheat area were eligible to vote in the wheat quota referendum who would have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest on a farm."

"The rule as it now stands is that all persons are eligible to vote in the June 20 quota referendum who will share in the 1959 wheat crop from a farm in the commercial wheat area on which the wheat acreage to be harvested, plus any wheat acreage to be put in the wheat Acreage Reserve, will be more than 15 acres."

Two-thirds or more of the eligible voters must approve quotas in order to put them into effect on the 1959 wheat crop.

If quotas are approved, farmers who exceed the farm allotment will be subject to a penalty of 45 per cent of the parity price on their excess wheat, and the support price for the 1959 wheat crop will be available to farmers who comply with their wheat allotments at the national average of \$1.81 per bushel, which represents 75 per cent of parity.

If more than one-third of the wheat growers voting disapprove quotas, the quotas will not be in effect. However, allotments will remain in effect, and farmers who comply with their wheat allotments will be eligible for support at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Hearing Held Over Wreck

DORRIS—A hearing was held in Dorris Judicial Court Monday, June 16, for Ralph R. Robinson, 30, truck driver from Fresno, who was involved in a fatal truck-auto accident June 2 on U.S. Highway 97 south of Dorris on the north slopes of Mt. Hebron.

Robinson was bound over to the superior court by Judge Les Chase after hearing evidence from Wilbur Pruett, driver of the automobile involved; California Highway Patrolman James Simpson who investigated the accident; and Floyd Merrill, attorney general of Siskiyou County, who produced the death certificates of Mrs. Lillian Pruett and Tilbert Pruett.

Robinson's bail of \$5,000, which had been set earlier when he was charged with involuntary manslaughter, was continued. He was not required to testify at yesterday's hearing. Robinson is represented by Ray Donnohue, attorney from Fresno.

The victims, Mrs. Pruett and her son, Tilbert, were passengers in the car driven by their husband and father, Wilbur, when the truck driven by Robinson rolled over on the Pruett car.

Roxbury Lodge Burns To Ground

FORT JONES—Fire departments from three U.S. Forest Service ranger stations responded to a call at 12:45 a.m. on Sunday but were unable to save the Roxbury Lodge, owned by Harriet (Hat) Payne, on Scott River Road near the mouth of the Scott River.

Firemen from ranger stations at Fort Jones, Seiad and Oak Knoll answered the call, but the big structure burned to the ground in a blaze so hot it kept the fire fighters at a distance. Loss was estimated at about \$200,000.
