Accident In Plant Turns Radiation On

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. (UPI)—Oak Ridge officials began an intensive investigation today into an accident which left eight workers suffering from radiation exposure. The accident, called the first of its kind, happened Monday in the Atomic Energy Commission's huge special products plant when an employee emptied a small container of enriched uranium into a larger drum. A nuclear reaction then took place.

Nuclear Ban Asked Again

TOKYO (AP)—Prime Minister Kishi appealed today for a total worldwide ban on nuclear weapons coupled with reduction of conventional armament by the major powers.

The alternative, he warned, is a nuclear war which would mean the extinction of the human race. It was Kishi's first major policy address since his conservative Liberal-Democrats were swept back into power in the May 22 election. Speaking to the Diet (Parliament), he also:

- 1. Promised no change in Japan's policy of expanding trade with Communist China but refusing diplomatic recognition.
2. Said he would crack down on extremists of left and right, including groups that "restrain by group pressure the free operation of the Diet," an obvious reference to his Socialist opponents.
3. Expressed hope for exchanging visits with leaders of other nations to ease international tensions.
4. Supported a summit conference as an endeavor to resolve antagonisms between nations.

Warm Springs Tribe To Back Resource Study

PORTLAND (AP)—The Warm Springs Indian Tribe is going to gamble \$100,000 on its future. The money will be used to finance a study by Oregon State College of the tribe's human and natural resources.

The study will be designed to create a "long-range program for improving the personal and financial conditions of the Indians," said the state Board of Higher Education.

The board Monday gave its approval to OSC conducting the two-year study.

"If successfully prosecuted it can become a model for other reservations," said Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State. Strand will appoint a committee to oversee the study.

"It is not without its hazards," said Strand, "for the amount of money to be put up by the tribal council is large."

"Although they say they understand that nothing of great importance may come out of such a study, nevertheless their hopes are pinned on it," he said.

DROWNS — CLATSKANIE (AP)—A 15-year-old fisherman stepped into a deep hole and drowned in the Clatskanie Slough here Monday.

He was Larry Jacobson, 15, Clatskanie, who had been fishing with two other boys while standing in four feet of water.

Police said Jacobson wandered farther out into the slough and suddenly dropped from sight. The body was recovered in eight feet of water.
