Braves Triumph; Giants, LA Bow

Tribe Blanked By Yanks

That new born "race" in the American League still is struggling to stay alive.
With the Detroit Tigers and Chicago White Sox on the move at last, things are looking up—if you can shrug off the fact the New York Yankees have padded their lead by one game while losing 8 of 14.

Southpaw Whitey Ford won his seventh in a row with a three-hitter that beat Cleveland 4-0 last night as the Yankees ended their losing slump at four and junked their shutout string at 24 innings.
The Tigers moved into fourth place with a 9-2 victory over Washington. The Senators dropped to eighth place as Detroit won its fifth in a row and seventh in eight starts under new manager Bill Norman, who took over a last-place club a week ago.

Southpaw Billy Pierce squared his record at 5-5 and gave the White Sox staff its third consecutive shutout with a five-hitter that beat Boston 4-0. That made it four straight for Chicago, now in sixth place, while leaving the second-place Red Sox eight games behind New York.

Kansas City missed a chance to take second, losing 4-1 to Baltimore.
In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the Chicago Cubs 6-3. Pittsburgh rapped second-place San Francisco 6-1. The St. Louis Cardinals joined Pittsburgh in a tie for third by beating Cincinnati 10-4. Philadelphia defeated Los Angeles 9-6.

PORTLAND (AP)—Low grades have caused the University of Portland's two tallest basketball players to be declared ineligible for play next season.
Al Negretti, athletic director, said Tuesday that Ray Scott and Bjorne Jensen, two front line stars measuring 6 feet 9 inches, have been placed on academic probation for not meeting the scholastic grade standard.
Both will be permitted to return to the school next fall, Negretti said, but they can not play basketball.
Scott, who played high school basketball in Philadelphia and joined Portland last February, led the club in scoring and rebounding.
Jensen, former Portland high school star who came to Portland U. after briefly attending the University of Oregon, had not played for the pilots last season. But he had been expected to move into the tall front line with Scott and Jim Altenhoffen this season.

Salem's NWL Entry Faces Money Misery

The Northwest League is once again on shaky ground with the announcement Tuesday night the Salem Senators will withdraw unless given a financial transference during the seven-game series starting June 24.

"If we don't draw 10,000 fans for seven games we will fold the team," said Al Lightner, a member of the Senators' board of directors.

He said the club, currently in last place, was \$12,000 in the red. The Senators ended the 1957 season \$13,341.00 in debt, the largest loss ever incurred by a Northwest League team.

If Salem fails to draw those 10,000 fans, Lightner said, it will pull out at the end of the first half of the league's split season which ends July 1. The decision was made at a long meeting of 26 club officials and civic leaders, he said.

However, Lightner expressed a note of optimism. "The club means too much to the community," he said. "I think we will make it. They have responded before and they will do it again."

Salem is owned by an 80-man partnership, which acquired the club in 1951. It has never operated in the black.
This season, racked by bad weather, a 15-game home losing streak, and a change of managers, the Senators drew only 11,000 fans. The Class B Northwest League, often on wobbly financial legs, could be dealt a serious blow with the withdrawal of Salem. It would mean the circuit would have to face the second half of its season with only five clubs.

Tuesday night's results in league play did not provide the Senators with any occasion for even remnants of joy. They lost a 15-1 decision to Tri-City, sinking them further into the league cellar.

In other games, Wenatchee ended a four-game losing streak by downing Lewiston, 6-1, and Yakima edged Eugene, 4-3.
Tri-City's Braves crumbled the Senators by scoring 10 runs in the fourth inning on seven hits, a walk and two Salem errors. Two of the hits were a two-run homer and a single by Vern Piver. Ray Looney contributed a bases-loaded triple and a double.
Salem's only run came in the fourth frame when catcher Mill Martin homered.
Lewiston's lefthanded hurling star, Ray Hyde, lost his first game after eight straight victories. Wenatchee scored all its runs in the first three innings. Hyde throttled them with three hits after the third inning.

The lone Lewiston tally came in the third frame on a walk and two singles.
A two-run, ninth-inning homer by Rufus Johnson pulled Yakima from a 3-2 deficit and led the Bears to their win over Eugene. The Emeralds' Carl Huzler had put his club ahead with a solo home run in Eugene's half of the ninth.

Burdette Hurdles Cubs, 6-3

Lew Burdette, the hero of the 1957 World Series with three complete game victories in an eight-day span, now has two in four weeks, but that long-sought second one has hoisted the Milwaukee Braves into a 2½-game National of the season.

The crewcut right-hander went all the way for the first time in six starts since May 22 last night. He stayed out of serious trouble with a nine-hitter as the Braves beat the Chicago Cubs 6-3.

Second-place San Francisco, the only other club to get as far as 2½ games ahead this year, was shut 6-1 at Pittsburgh. The St. Louis Cardinals defeated Cincinnati 10-4 and joined the Pirates in jumping past the Redlegs for a third-place tie, just two games behind San Francisco.

In the American League, the New York Yankees ended their four-game slump, beating Cleveland 4-0 on Whitey Ford's three-hitter. Detroit made it five in a row with a 1-2 victory over Washington. The Chicago White Sox gained their third consecutive shutout as Billy Pierce's five-hitter beat Boston 4-0. Baltimore defeated Kansas City 4-1.
