

# Baseball Leaders To Back New Sports Anti-Trust Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Baseball officials declared their support today for a new sports law that would give professional sports some flat exemptions from the anti-trust laws.

But one club officer, who has called baseball big business and disputed Commissioner Ford Frick several times questioned whether the proposal would solve all the sport's practical problems.

Tax attorney C. Lee De Orsey, a director of the Washington Senators, said for one thing that proposed self-regulation of major league telecasts may not effectively

protect the minors from ruinous losses at the gate.

"I don't know that the clubs by themselves will agree not to compete with the minors via television, De Orsey said a reporter.

Self-control of radio and TV broadcasts is one of the specific references in legislation introduced yesterday by Representatives Kenneth B. Keating (R-NY), William E. Miller (R-NY), Francis E. Walter (D-Pa) and Green Harris (R-Ark). They also proposed excluding from anti-trust regulation such practices as player trades and drafts, the contract reserve clause tying a play-

er to his team and territorial rights.

The measure would affect pro baseball, football, basketball and ice hockey. So would the original measure by Rep. Emanuel Celler (D-NY), which proponents of the substitute hope to knock out when the subject comes before the full House—probably next week.

Celler's bill has been approved by a thin majority of the House Judiciary Committee, which he heads. It would exempt contracts and agreements found "reasonably necessary" to keep the sports alive.

Celler said the substitute would give club owners a blank check to act as they please, even engage in "barbarous" activities to the detriment of players and the public alike.

Frick, in New York, said baseball could support the new bill.

Paul Porter, an attorney for the majors, said in Washington it is something "everybody can live with."

# Mays Glad To Leave SF After Bat Slump

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Willie Mays, who loves nothing better than to be loved, was glad to get out of San Francisco for the current road trip of the Giants.

The "most exciting" player in the game of baseball tried so hard to put a show on for his home-town followers that he came up so bad, in fact, that he is barely leading the league in hitting.

But the records show that poor

Willie, for his \$70,000 a year salary, hit only .118 for his last nine games at home, during which he went to the plate 34 times and collected only four hits.

For the 13-game series here he clouted at a respectable (for most players) .321 clip, because he got 13 hits in the first four games. But after that Willie was kaput!

"He's just trying too hard," said Manager Bill Rigney. "He wants to do his best in front of the home-town fans."

There were offers of advice, what he was doing wrong, what he should be doing, etc.

"He's swinging with only one hand," said an "expert" in the press box.

This brought a snort from Rigney.

Against the Pittsburgh Pirates, in a four-game series, Willie got one, lone infield hit in 15 trips to the plate.

"Don't worry about Willie," said Manager Danny Murtaugh. "I'm just glad we are getting out of town. Willie will come to live with hits all over the landscape. He's too good to be in a slump for long."

True as spoken, Willie came up with three hits in the next two games against the Phillies, but he was blanked in the game which ended the series—won, incidentally, by the Giants.

The fans who cheered Willie wildly when he came to bat during his hitting streak in the first four games, in which he got 13 for 19, finally took to booing him during the slump.

It is probable that the slump of Stan Musial at the same time had gone unnoticed by the Mays' fair-weather friends. Both Musial and Mays had batting marks up near the 430 mark two weeks ago.

By the time the Giants hit the road, both men were down to a more normal average, with the "Say Hey" kid holding a comfortable margin.

But all the advance season talk about Mays cracking Babe Ruth's home record in Seals Stadium has been stilled. Willie has a hard time getting one out of the infield here—let alone out of the park.

# Weill Awaits Heavy Title Bout Okay

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Promoter Al Weill was awaiting word today from the California State Athletic Commission on its request for approval of a title fight at Wrigley Field Aug. 4 between Heavyweight Champion Floyd Patterson and challenger Roy Harris, the pride of Cut and Shoot, Tex.

Weill filed his formal application for a California promoter's license Tuesday at the commission office and at the same time deposited signed contracts from both fighters for the bout which he predicted would draw a gate of better than half a million dollars.

The man who managed Rocky Marciano to the heavyweight title and before that acted as promoter for the International Boxing Club (IBC) in New York might be a promoter in name only as far as the California commission was concerned, although odds were in his favor.

Commission secretary Clayton Frye received the proper documents from Weill and immediately went to work on the long distance telephone to advise the various commissioners of their content.

Frye said a decision could be expected by Friday. He said the commissioners scattered throughout the state, would probably confer by telephone and make their decision without holding a formal meeting.

Weill was anxious to get a quick decision so he could start rolling on promotion for the bout.

He said he gave the 24-year-old Harris a flat \$100,000 guarantee. Patterson would get 50 per cent of the net gate which might run into a matter of \$200,000.

Harris, fresh out of the Army, arrived in town Tuesday and was introduced to sports writers at a press conference alongside the swimming pool at a Hollywood hotel.

The youth, looking like a genuine cowpoke—lean and hard and clad in a western hat, fancy blue western shirt and jeans and high-top boots—said shyly he has no fear of Patterson.

# Jimmy Foxx Happy With Baseball Job

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) — Jimmy Foxx, the hall of fame member of the Boston Red Sox hired last winter, is happy as a rookie with his job with the Minneapolis Millers of the American Association.

Foxx, 50, has been under a doctor's care the past few weeks with "fluctuating blood pressure."

"It's not being back in uniform, though, that's raising the pressure, it's hereditary," he said. "I couldn't be happier with my work."

And his bosses are well-pleased with the famous slugger in his new role as hitting coach and goodwill man for the Millers, the Red Sox' Triple-A farm club.

Foxx was invited to join the organization after it was learned he was out of a job and nearly destitute.

"After the story about my financial problems I got a few job offers. Maybe I could be making more money," he said, "but just being back in baseball is good enough for me."

Foxx, who made a small fortune in his 22 years in baseball and lost it on bad business ventures, is credited with a large part of the Millers' success so far this season. With a team the experts pegged for the second division, Foxx and manager Gene Mauch have kept the club on the upper rungs of the league's ladder all spring.

"Jimmy's a great guy and is doing a marvelous job," Mauch said. "All the players like him, and his tips about hitting have helped. Just having Jimmy Foxx in the same clubhouse means a lot to a ball club."

# Walker May Turn Manager

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Catcher Rube Walker was scheduled to meet with Los Angeles Vice President Buzzy Bavasi in New York Wednesday, presumably to be offered the job of managing the Dodgers' Spokane club in the Pacific Coast League.

Walker, 32, tagged as the Dodgers' No. 1 replacement for injured Roy Campanella, was told the club had asked waivers on him before Tuesday night's game with the Philadelphia Phillies.

This is his 11th season in the majors. He broke in with the Chicago Cubs in 1948 and was traded to the Dodgers June 15, 1951, along with Andy Pafko, Johnny Schmitz and Wayne Terwilliger for Gene Hermanski, Eddie Miksis, Joe Hatten and Bruce Edwards. He had a .230 batting average in the majors. He's batting .114 at present.

Goldie Hart now is manager of Spokane.

# Dodger Boss Blasts Video

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Television of big league baseball is getting out of hand, in the opinion of E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi, vice president and general manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Speaking of the flood of National League games that are being beamed into New York from Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and St. Louis since the Dodgers and Giants have moved to the Pacific Coast, Bavasi declared:

"It's now a beer war back there. And it's not a healthy situation.

"I'm not against the televising of a limited number of games. It always has been our attitude that the home club should do what it wants with television.

"But I never thought we'd go this far. You are giving your show away for nothing when you over-televises. You are making it too easy for people to see ball games — for free."

"TV has its place. It makes fans and, in that respect, helps baseball. But you can't afford to saturate the market," he said.

# Great Sportscaster Battles His Illness

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — "You have no idea what a wonderful place the world is when you can see it and how horrible it is when you can't see it."

That's the way Ted Husing sums up his misfortunes. He was one of radio's best known and best paid voices before a brain tumor crippled him and took away his sight and fortune.

He's trying a comeback but he admitted the path is rough, mainly because of his own mental depression.

Husing, now 56, sat, as he spoke, in a chair in the living room of his mother's modest Pasadena cottage, an Afghan around his legs and a cane by his side.

Has Doubts About Comeback  
He has taped two interviews—with sportscaster Tom Harmon and boxer Maxie Rosenbloom—for a series entitled "Ted Husing Reminisces" but he is not particularly hopeful about his comeback.

The voice is there — the resonant voice which in dramatic style related most of the great moments in sports more than a generation ago — but he admits himself the spirit is weak.

In the fight within himself, Husing conceded he may not be all washed up, and he has not lost his sense of humor.

"I'm my own best critic," he continued, "and I want to rise above the difficulties of my illness but sometimes I wonder."

Husing hastened to add that he hasn't lost faith in himself completely.

"I am terribly religious," he said, "and this was not occasioned by my illness. I always went to church before my programs and prayed for help."

He isn't bitter at the world and he isn't critical of those around him.

Of his abortive comeback attempt early this year when he went to New York and was placed on a \$150 a week retainer by Columbia Broadcasting System, he said:

"It was all a mistake. I wasn't ready. It was nobody's fault."

# Honors Set For Former ChiSox Star

CHICAGO (UPI) — Big Ed Walsh, an ailing man who virtually gave his blood for big league baseball in its formative days, was getting transfusions himself today to enable him to appear at the Chicago White Sox-Baltimore game Sunday to receive honors won 50 years ago.

Walsh, 77, was receiving blood in a Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., hospital to build up his strength so that he can attend the game. He'll be honored with a plaque on which will be engraved the lengthy list of his feats while with the White Sox from 1904 through 1916.

But he'll draw benefits in another way too. For Baseball Anonymous, founded to help old-time players ineligible for the present day pensions but who have financial problems, is earmarking funds received for a trust fund to pay Walsh's everyday living expenses and his medical bills.

Baseball Anonymous is accepting contributions for the Walsh Day at P.O. Box 414, Oak Park, Ill.

Walsh, a Hall of Fame player who quit playing in 1917, still has a prominent place in the baseball record book. No man ever has pitched more innings in an American League season, 464 in 1908. Only one American Leaguer ever won more games in a season, Jack Chesbro of the New York Highlanders with 41 in 1904. Walsh won 40 in 1908.
