Sixteen Workmen Die In Wreckage Of Bridge When Two Sections Plunge Down

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—Two sections of a nearly finished six-lane bridge collapsed mysteriously yesterday in a tangled mass of steel, plunging at least 16 workmen to their death. Two others were missing and 22 injured. It was 3:42 p.m. on a hot, sunny, windless afternoon when the two end sections of the 16-million-dollar Second Narrows Bridge over Burrard Inlet gave way without warning. Forty construction workers were on the steel framework of the pier-supported sections. Suddenly, with a muted rumble, the temporary front supports of the foremost section crumbled and dropped the jutting end of the bridge 200 feet into the churning inlet separating Vancouver and North Vancouver. The strain jerked forward the concrete pier holding the section behind, and it nosed downward into the water. The two sections, each about 70 feet long, ended their collapse tilted crazily downward like a sagging W with their front part submerged and rear still on the supports. An eyewitness, Edwin Leitch, said the "frightening roar of the collapse sounded like a continuous peal of thunder lasting about 15 seconds."

A huge crane which had been hoisting steel girders to the top of the bridge toppled and plunged into the mass of tangled wreckage in the water below. Some workmen were caught and killed in the tortured, twisted beams. Others were crushed beneath tons of steel and concrete after they stepped into the 40-foot-deep inlet. One survivor, Don Mitchell said after riding the first section down that "everything happened so quickly there was little sensation of fear."

Bill Hallman, who was driving over the old Second Narrows Bridge 200 yards downstream, said, "The men didn't have a chance. . . . When they hit the water I could see some grasp for pieces of driftwood. It appeared about half of the men were trapped under water by the bridge sections. Others were swept away by the current."

Cause of the collapse was not known nor was a damage estimate available. Officials of the Dominion Bridge Co., the contractor, launched an immediate investigation. Atty. Gen. Robert Bonner appointed Chief Justice Steerwood Lett of the British Columbia Supreme Court to make an inquiry.

The plant two-mile bridge four miles from downtown Vancouver was more than two thirds finished and was to have been opened for travel in the autumn. Construction work began two years ago. How long completion of the bridge will be delayed by the disaster probably will not be known for several days.

Board To Run Affairs At Portland State

PORTLAND (AP)—A three-man board will make the policy decisions for Portland State College while the Oregon Board of Higher Education seeks a new president for the school. The board announced Monday that the board will consist of John Stehn, head of the music department; John Swarthout, dean of faculty; and Errett Hummel, assistant to the former president. John Cramer resigned recently as president, and has received a Fulbright Scholarship to study in Formosa. The announcement was made at the board's regular meeting here Monday, when contracts were awarded for construction of Portland State's new \$1,101,000 library. The chancellor's office presented a priority list of 1953-54 construction at the state's educational institutions. It will be discussed at a special meeting of the board June 26. That is one day after the board takes up the operating budget for the next biennium. The tentative construction program, which went into final form will go before the next Legislature, calls for an estimated expenditure of \$29,125,000.

Bride Chosen For Crown Prince Of Japan, And He May Have Had Some Say

TOKYO. (UPI)—A bride has been chosen for Japanese Crown Prince Akihito but unlike his forbears in the world's oldest ruling dynasty he may have had a part in picking her, reliable sources said today. The sources told United Press International that the engagement would be announced Sunday. A score of names have figured prominently in speculation about the woman who would become the next empress of Japan but rumor favored pretty Hatsuko Kitashirakawa, 18 and a former imperial princess.

Although the great granddaughter of the Emperor Meiji, she has been a commoner since the end of the war when all titles of nobility, except for the immediate royal family, were abolished. Imperial household officials expressed surprise about the engagement report and a spokesman for the Kitashirakawa household declared, "the whole thing is news to us."

No one in a position to know would say how the sportsman-prince, 23, feels about the woman considered eligible to be his bride. But it was said that his wishes have been taken into consideration. If so, it probably is the first time in Japanese history that "he has been considered while arranging an imperial marriage. The brides and grooms of princes and princesses always have been chosen for them.

But the final decision, in which Akihito may have a word, by tradition made by the emperor, comes, immediate members of the imperial family, a 10-member imperial household council, which includes Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi, and, of course, the girl.

SALEM (AP)—The official results of Oregon's May 16 primary election were announced Tuesday by Secretary of State Mark Hatfield.

They showed that 57.5 per cent of the registered Republicans and 41.5 per cent of the registered Democrats cast their ballots. The total percentage was 92.

CONCORD, N.H. (AP)—Gov. Dwinell said Monday night he presented the suits of cloth, each one enough to make a suit, to his fellow chief executives "as a proof of New Hampshire industry." He said the material came from one of Goldfine's mills in Lebanon, N.H.—Dwinell's home town. Dwinell told a news conference in Concord Monday evening with Adams accepting Goldfine's hospitality, and added: "I would have no reservation about accepting his (Goldfine's) hospitality." The governor said he's known Goldfine for 20 years.

He had been transferred to Cleveland and the family was staying in a hotel prior to leaving today.

Hearst Castle Crowds Grow

SACRAMENTO, (UPI)—The Division of Beaches and Parks is trying to find a way to handle all the tourists who would like to see Hearst Castle. The agency Monday announced that it would open the doors of William Randolph Hearst's historic San Simeon estate two hours earlier, beginning today and that it was trying to increase bus and guide service. The earlier opening, moved up from 10 a.m. to 9 a.m., was to permit an estimated 200 additional persons to tour the castle, that will increase the daily capacity to about 315.

Missile Range Announced

POINT MUGU, (UPI)—Establishment of the Nation Pacific Missile Range to test long-range missiles over the Pacific was announced here Monday by the Navy. Spokesmen said the range, the third of the integrated tri-service national ranges, would extend 250 miles seaward with extended corridors over the ocean. The facility provides major installations at Point Mugu, Point Arguello and on San Nicholas Island, off the coast. It also will be used in connection with the Army's overland test area extending from the east to the Dugway Proving Ground in Utah. Other testing facilities are operated by the Air Force at Cape Canaveral, Fla., and by the Army New Mexico.

French Bonds Go On Sale

PARIS (AP)—Sales began throughout France Tuesday on a new issue of bonds that Premier de Gaulle says represent a test of confidence in his 16-day-old government. Financial experts predicted a success for the bonds pegged to the Napoleon, a gold coin hoarded by Frenchmen in times of trouble. Finance Minister Antoine Pinay is trying to lure savings into circulation to provide a sound financial foundation for De Gaulle's proposed constitutional and Algerian reforms. De Gaulle told the nation last Friday that the success of the bond issue would be an indication of public backing for him. Unless the French financial situation is improved, he said, "our country will end up in a stupid catastrophe." As citizens lined up at post offices and bank windows to buy bonds, De Gaulle met with his cabinet to consider foreign problems. The most pressing questions involved the removal of French troops from two former North African protectorates, Tunisia and Morocco. Negotiations are under way quietly with Tunisia for withdrawal of troops from the interior and regrouping them around the naval base at Bizerte. The French had decided to regroup their 22,000 troops in Tunisia before they bombed a Tunisian village last Feb. 4 as a spillover from Algerian rebellion fighting. But that action provoked a crisis in French-Tunisian relations which has held up any agreement.
