GOP Bows To Ike Over Keeping Adams, But Many Leaders Unhappy

By JACK BELL. WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional Republicans bowed today to President Eisenhower's decision to keep Sherman Adams on the job. But many GOP members made it plain they aren't happy about it.

Republican state chairman split over the question of Eisenhower's top aide. Some still insisted he should get out. Others supported Eisenhower's backing him. Many declined comment, but could agree with one of their number, Ray Bliss of Ohio, who said "I'm certain I'd rather it hadn't happened."

In New York, Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler left no doubt the Democrats will make a major political issue out of Adams' dealings with industrialist Bernard Goldfine of Boston. As to Eisenhower's insistence on keeping Adams as his chief assistant, Butler added: "The President's own conduct makes him as morally responsible for this improper conduct as Mr. Adams is himself."

coattails of a president most of them would like to praise in campaign speeches. Perhaps significantly, almost the only members of Congress volunteering a good word for Eisenhower's decision to keep Adams at his desk were those not up for reelection this year.

Sen. Homer E. Capehart (R-Ind.), who isn't running this year, said Eisenhower has all the facts on Adams "and I'm going along with the president."

Sen. Everett Dirksen of Illinois, the assistant Republican leader, said in a separate interview that it was "the President's determination to make" Dirksen is not campaigning this year.

Sen. Ralph E. Flanders (R-Vt.), who is retiring, also endorsed the President's decision, commenting: "There's no question in my mind — and there never has been — in regard to Adams' integrity. I join the president in being surprised at Gov. Adams' indiscretion."

But Sen. Charles E. Potter (R-Mich.), fighting hard for another term, said that with Adams still in office the Republicans will face "a critical political handicap in the 1958 campaign."

Sen. Frank A. Barrett (R-Wyo.), seeking reelection, said he had to obtain Adams' resignation to resign, but added: "In view of the President's splendid record on integrity and honesty in government, I have no other course than to leave the decision in his (Eisenhower's) hands."

Among Republican state chairmen calling for Adams' resignation or ouster were Richard H. Shaw of Colorado, Daniel L. Louchery of West Virginia, William Cobb of North Carolina and Thomas Judd of Utah.

Chairman William T. Broomhead of Rhode Island was equally emphatic that "Adams should stay." He was joined in that by chairman Clarence F. Baldwin of Connecticut and Ben C. Henley of Arkansas.

Many Democrats held their fire, obviously waiting until late in the campaign. But there was a rising chorus of criticism.
