NEW YORK, (UPI) — Willie Mays insisted today he "ain't sick" but he says he may stay in the hospital a couple of more days.

"I have no pains and I don't feel sick," said the San Francisco Giants' center-fielder from his bed at Harkness Pavilion, "but maybe they can find out what's wrong with me if I stay here a few days."

AAU Track Meet Draws Cinder Stars

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI) — The National A.A.U. track and field competition gets under way here tonight with the greatest collection of athletes competing for berths on the traveling team since the 1952 Olympic try-outs.

Officials of the A.A.U. have announced that 44 men—two in each of the events—will be selected for the competition against the Russians at Moscow July 27-28. And this has become the big attraction.

It is probable that the one-two finishers in competition will get first chance at the journey. Some, like Bobby Morrow of Abilene, Texas, already have announced they don't want to make the trip. But there will be few defections.

While finals will be held tonight in such important races as the 100-yard dash, high hurdles, 440-yard hurdles, six-mile run, hammer throw, high jump and shot put, the preliminaries to the mile will bear watching.

"Despite the entrance of such famous sub-four-minute milers as defending champion Merv Lincoln and Herb Elliott of Australia, Lazlo Tabari of Hungary and Don Bowden of California, the entry list became so high that Meet Director J. B. Haralson said that preliminaries would have to be held.

"Those four-minute milers didn't scare anybody out," said Haralson. "I guess the distance runners like to compete against the best."

Giants Hit By Off Day

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — It was one of those days the Giants should have stayed in bed.

As though it wasn't enough that Pittsburgh swarmed over three San Francisco hurlers for 13 hits and a 6-5 win yesterday, star slugger Willie Mays, probably the most valuable player in the National League, wound up in a New York hospital for "observation."

The usually effervescent Mays was glum and silent while being admitted to Harkness Pavilion Hospital. After his examination, Mays said simply, "maybe I'll stay around here for a while."

Giants Manager Bill Rigney had expected Willie to rejoin the club in Philadelphia tonight, but doctors at Harkness said he may remain in the hospital until Saturday.

Meanwhile, Rigney had his hands full vainly trying to contain the Pirates. The Giants did make a three run rally in the ninth, but Pittsburgh relief hurler Don Gross doused the fire to save the game for starter Ron Kline.

The Pirates paved the road to victory in the second frame when Roman Mejias smashed a two run single with the bases loaded. Then in the seventh Bob Skinner belted a two run homer, and Ted Kluszewski and Bill Mazeroski batted in two more runs to give Pittsburgh its win margin.

Daryl Spencer brought in the first two San Francisco runs with a single in the sixth and a sacrifice fly in the eighth.

Bob Schmidt capped the big San Francisco rally with a homer with one man on base. But Jim Finigan fanned to end the game. Starter Al Worthington was charged with the loss.

Weill's Plan Run Aground

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—Al Weill's plans to promote a heavyweight championship bout in California have been postponed indefinitely, while state authorities check some "disturbing" facts about the fight figure—and he consults his attorney.

Weill, a New York matchmaker before becoming manager of former champion Rocky Marciano, planned to promote a fight in Los Angeles on Aug. 4 between champion Floyd Patterson and challenger Roy Harris of Cut and Shoot, Tex.

The California Boxing Commission was expected to make a decision today on Weill's application for a promoter's license, but commission chairman Dr. Dan O. Kilroy said Thursday that the ruling had been postponed indefinitely.

The postponement came after Jack Urech, investigator for the Commission, said he had turned up some "disturbing" facts about Weill. He said his staff would not be able to complete its investigation until the end of the week.

Kilroy said he wanted the commission to see a report on Urech's investigation before it made any decision on Weill.

Tebbets May Cure Newk

NEW YORK (UPI)—There was a young rookie pitcher with the then Brooklyn Dodgers back in 1949 who considered himself quite a hot shot at ping-pong.

But another player on the squad that spring handed him a 21 to 1 licking with the little paddles and the young pitcher "gave up the game."

There are those who contend that this same pitcher—a fellow named Don Newcombe—has this sort of a psyche. Because down through the years in which he became one of the National League's finest pitchers, Newcombe was branded as a guy who couldn't win the big ones.

It became an almost yearly custom, in the seemingly annual World Series battles between the Dodgers and the New York Yankees, that Newcombe would wind up as the fall guy. During the regular season he was a ball of fire, pushed in the old days by fiery Jackie Robinson and told what to do by the wispish Roy Campanella.

But then, in the series, Newcombe—strong enough to throw Little Red Riding Hood clear past the wolf—would become the Yankee pigeon.

FURTHER COMPLICATIONS
A psychiatrist might find a connection. But it developed that every spring, with the World Series his most recent baseball memory, Big Newk came up with a sore arm. This, as he rode the bench, led to further complications.

In 1955, fretting over a sore arm, he refused to pitch batting practice as manager Walt Alston tried to find out the state of his hurling health. Suspended briefly, the six-foot, four-inch Newcombe demanded that he be traded.

In 1956, when he was the league's most valuable player after winning 27 games, he was knocked out of the World Series box twice by those lip-licking Yankees. Storming out of the park while the game still was in progress, he flattened a parking lot.

FINALLY TRADED
So he had another sore arm. Inactive and itchy, he had a wrangle with the management and insisted "They should have traded me when they had a chance." Finding it hard to get back into action he brooded "You got to figure they don't want you."

When he did pitch, it was listlessly. He lost six games—and finally finished this.
