'Big Red' Oarsmen Stroke To Victory

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Cornell's patchwork varsity crew, which hadn't won a race all year, stroked to a surprisingly easy victory Saturday and gave the Big Red another clean sweep of the Intercollegiate Rowing Assn. championships.

The Cornell varsity beat Navy by three lengths after the Big Red freshman and junior varsity had touched off the victory parade on windswept Onondaga Lake. It was the fourth straight triumph in the varsity three mile for Coach Stork Sanford's eight and the second time Cornell had swept all three events in rowing's blue ribbon classic. The men from Cayuga did it for the first time in 1955.

In winning the varsity prize for the fourth straight time, the Cornellians tied the record set by Cornell from 1909 to 1912. No other school can claim that honor. Washington still holds the record of four sweeps in the IRA. Cornell, stroked by Johnny Meakem, a 21-year-old senior from Bloomfield, N. J., took the lead from fast-starting Massachu-

sets Tech at the mile and a quarter mark. Moving smoothly and with terrific power, the Big Red drew away from the others with every stroke. By the end of two miles it was just a question of who was going to finish second. Navy's mixture of sophs and juniors came up in the last half mile to take second by a half length over Syracuse. California's sophomore-dominated crew was fourth followed by Princeton, Pennsylvania, Dartmouth, Wisconsin, MIT, and Columbia in the 10 crew field.

Cornell was timed in 17:12.1, slowest varsity time since the regatta was shifted to Onondaga in 1952. The times for the Cornell frosh and junior varsity also were the slowest at Onondaga. A headwind of from six to eight miles an hour slowed up the crews. The frosh won their two-mile race in 11:23 and the Jayvees the three-mile in 17:35.5.

With their three victories Saturday Cornell won the Jim Ten Eyck Memorial Trophy for team honors for the fifth consecutive year.

Warner Bids For Second Golf Crown

TACOMA (AP)—Nineteen-year-old Bill Warner of Spokane will seek a second straight Pacific Northwest Golf Assn. championship here during the week of July 7-12.

Warner, who last year won both the PPGA men's and junior (18 years and under) titles will be competing against at least one other former champion. Glen Sheriff of Seattle, 1948 PPGA champ, also filed his entry.

Not yet entered is Carole Jo Kabler, the 20-year-old Sutherlin, Ore., miss who won the 1957 PPGA women's title.

The PPGA men's and women's tournaments will run concurrently—the former competing at Fircrest Golf Club and the women matching shots at the Tacoma Country and Golf Club.

Warner, who attends Seattle University, will find top flight competition in his bid to retain the title. The men's field, which Saturday numbered more than 100 of the Northwest's better amateurs, included such other standouts, in addition to Sheriff as Bill Tindall, newly crowned Seattle City amateur champion; Jim Shriver, Seattle, winner of the recent Inglewood invitational; Bill O'Brien, Seattle's golfing policeman; and Dr. Herman Dahl, just arrived home from the National Open, for which he was the first Tacoma amateur ever to qualify.

Frenchman Dead, American Driver Injured At Le Mans

LE MANS, France (AP) — A French driver had been killed and an American injured as the grueling rain-soaked 24-hour Le Mans sports car race neared the halfway mark early Sunday with a three lapped Ferrari and a British driven Jaguar staging a nip and tuck battle for the lead.

Jean Mary of France was injured fatally and youthful Bruce Kessler of Los Angeles was injured early in the race. Their cars collided as rain made the course slippery and resulted in numerous smashups. Kessler suffered severe chest injuries and was rushed to a hospital. He was in fifth place at the time.

The lead changed hands twice within an hour around midnight in an exchange of pit stops. But into the morning hours, the Ferrari, driven by Phil Hill of Los Angeles and Olivier Gendebien of Belgium held a slight lead. The race ends at 9 a. m. EST Sunday.

The low flat Jaguar, piloted by ex-winners Duncan Hamilton and Yor Bueb, closed in during a heavy rain storm as the Ferrari slowed down. Both Hamilton and Bueb are rated among the best wet track drivers.

Third in the chase at midnight (7 p.m. Saturday, EST) was a 12-cylinder Ferrari of Wolfgang von Trips and Wolfgang Seidel of Germany. But a few minutes later Seidel went off the track. He was not injured but gave up the race and third was taken over by an Aston Martin, driven by Tony Brooks of Britain and Maurice Trintignant of France.

Two more Americans, Edward Hugus of Pittsburgh and Ernst Erikson of Chicago were in 11th place with a Ferrari after eight hours but they trailed the leaders by ten laps (80 miles).
