Yanks Bomb Detroit, 15-0

Giants, Dodgers Nab Nods

Sal Maglie wasn't kidding when he said, "I'll show 'em."
The 41-year-old right-hander was proved when the New York Yankees shunted him to St. Louis June 14 to make room for a 39-year-old man—Virgil Trucks.

Freddie Hutchinson, Sal's new boss with the Cardinals, gave The Barber a starting chance yesterday against Milwaukee and was rewarded with a 2-1 victory.
Maglie showed signs of weariness in the sixth and seventh so Hutch sent up Irv Noren to bat for him in the eighth inning. Larry Jackson, a workhorse both on relief and starting, retired the last six Braves in a row.
The defeat cut the Braves' National League lead to 1 1/2 games as San Francisco beat the Phillies 5-4 in 14 innings on a homer by Willie Kirkland. The Giants also led their second game 1-0 when it was suspended in the sixth by the Sunday curfew. It will be completed later.

Cincinnati, St. Louis and Pittsburgh are bunched in third place 3 1/2 games behind the Braves.
Cincinnati split with Chicago, winning the first on Gus Bell's grand-slam homer 6-2. The Cubs staged a three-run rally in the ninth to take the second game 8-6.
Steve Bilko and Johnny Klippstein, two recently acquired Los Angeles Dodgers, helped the cellar team win a doubleheader from Pittsburgh 4-1 and 3-2. Klippstein's relief work saved the first game, in which two singles by Dick Gray played a prominent part. Bilko's 10th-inning pinch single scored Joe Pignatano from second base for the second decision.

In the American League, the New York Yankees beat Detroit 15-0 after losing seven straight to the Tigers. Don Larsen croaked off Detroit with two singles for his third shutout. Kansas City edged Boston 2-1 on a game-saving catch by Hector Lopez, who then singled to drive in the winning run. Cleveland took two from Washington 4-3 and 1-0. Baltimore pulled out of the cellar on Billy O'Dell's six-hit job against Chicago 2-0.

Red Athlete Has Troubles

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union's big soccer scandal was out in the open again today with one of the Soviet Union's top stars in jail on charges of rape.

Komsomol Pravda, which never tires of lecturing the errant sons of high officials and other examples of flaming Soviet youth, reported that three pampered players had been dropped from the Soviet all-star soccer team for rowdiness, drinking and general debauchery.

The Communist youth newspaper also attacked top sports officials and highly placed patrons for allowing the idolized stars to run wild.

The major offender, according to Komsomol Pravda, was Edward Streltsov, 29-year-old all-star forward who was booted after the paper dug up similar scandals of high living.

Streltsov promised to reform and was brought back to the big time. But the paper said he "committed a grave crime and will soon face court as a hooligan and a rapist."

Right wing Boris Tatushin and left back Mikhail Ogokov also were named in the article as Streltsov's companions in drunken crime and debauchery. Konstantin Andrianov was referred to as the former deputy chairman of the Committee on Physical Culture and Sports—making clear he had been fired as a result of the scandal.

The three players were kicked off the team before it went to Stockholm for the international matches, the World Series of soccer. The Soviet team was eliminated in the quarter-finals last Thursday.

Komsomol Pravda said Streltsov turned up at club meetings drunk, got into fights with the police, broke into a shop on one occasion and smashed the furniture—but he was forgiven time and again because he was a star.

Klamath Falls increased its Northern California League lead to a game and a half Sunday afternoon by bombing Dunsmuir into submission 15-1 while Weed upset second place Mount Shasta 7-2 in two of the three Sunday afternoon games played.

In the other game, Yreka moved into second place and dropped Mount Shasta to third by outscoring Scott Valley 15-12 in a three-hour slugfest that was highlighted by four home runs.

Manager Irv Whit's Klamath Kubs blasted Dunsmuir with 17 base hits including a pair of home runs. Dave D'Olivo pitched the Klamath victory, scattering eight Dunsmuir hits throughout the lineup

and was never in serious trouble over the nine inning jaunt.
Klamath broke open the game with a pair of two-run innings in the first two frames as the home runs paid off in pairs. In the first inning, Fran Miller singled then came home with two away on Floyd Linderman's fourth home run of the season.
