Integration Battle Looms

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Another skirmish over integration at Central High School loomed on the legal horizon today.

A motion to stay an order by U. S. District Judge Harry J. Lemley which suspended integration here for 2½ years was sent yesterday to an appellate court.

Wiley Branton, attorney for the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, mailed the motion to the U. S. 8th Circuit Court of Appeals at St. Louis.

He acted shortly after Lemley refused to stay the integration suspension ruling pending an appeal from it.

If the appellate court also turns down Branton's motion, the Negro attorney could seek a stay in the U. S. Supreme Court.

These motions for a stay are entirely separate from the appeal of Lemley's ruling suspending integration.

Lemley said at the hearing on the stay motion that if he granted it, his order allowing postponement of integration until early 1961 would be affected adversely.

Months would be needed to carry an appeal through the courts, he said. "And in the meantime the situation at Central High School, which we have found to be intolerable from an educational standpoint, would continue from the beginning of the approaching session to the final ruling of the Supreme Court on the merits of the case."

3 Autoists Still In KV Hospital

Of the five persons admitted to Klamath Valley Hospital after Monday morning's four-vehicle accident south of here on Highway 97, only three were still hospitalized this morning.

L. L. Davis, 71, Eagle Point, whose wife Edith, 72, died following the accident, was released from the hospital yesterday after treatment for shock.

His daughter, Dorothy Waltz, 36, Shady Cove, was also released.

Mrs. William Spangler, 40, San Francisco, was described as "resting fairly well" Tuesday morning by hospital authorities. Her son, William, 16, was "doing fine," as was William Pilz, 5, who had been a passenger in the Spangler car.

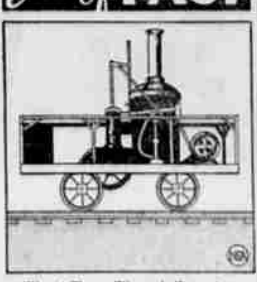
Final rites will be in Klamath Memorial Park with O'Hair's Memorial Chapel in charge of arrangements.

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The Defense Ministry claimed Monday a Chinese Nationalist warship sank a Communist gunboat and several motorized junks early Sunday during a 23-minute engagement near Quemoy Island. The warship was undamaged and its crew suffered no casualties, the ministry said.

Supervisors To Seek Fund Audit

DORRIS — The Siskiyou County supervisors voted to ask for an audit of funds by the county fish and game commission to determine how they are apportioned.

Supervisor Bill Ealy said he had received complaints from different people regarding the administration of the local fish and game funds. Ealy said specific complaints against the use of funds for hunter safety training and other uses apparently not related to fish and game work were received.

Ealy suggested that the county committee be asked to prepare a detailed budget each year to show how the funds were to be spent.

The supervisors also hired A. R. Casano, a 33-year-old land surveyor who was formerly employed by Stauffer Chemical Company, Richmond, as county surveyor to succeed Orrel Lewis, resigned. His appointment will become effective June 25 and he will fill Lewis' unexpired term which ends January 5, 1959.
