

A's, Tigers Both Triumph

White Sox Whitewash Yankees; Braves Club Giants

The New York Yankees had better act fast because there's a full-fledged revolt brewing among their downtrodden American League rivals.

What had been regarded as merely some unpleasant skirmishing with the Detroit Tigers took on a much more serious aspect Monday night when the Chicago White Sox followed up with a 2-0 victory that handed the tyrannous Yankees their fourth shutout and fifth defeat in nine games.

There's still plenty of daylight between the Yankees and the so-called contenders — second-place Kansas City is 7½ games behind but the fact is the Yankees haven't been playing well for a

month. They're under .500—14-16—since May 23 and they still have their big lead only because none of the contenders has been able to get rolling.

But now both the Tigers and White Sox are making the kind of drives that can cut deeply into that, Yankee lead. The Tigers, who beat the Baltimore Orioles 3-1, Monday, have won nine of their last 12 games while the White Sox have won eight of their last 10. Even the Athletics are hanging on with a modest four-game streak after Monday night's 7-2 victory over the Washington Senators.

The picture is just the opposite in the National League where the Milwaukee Braves are slowly

opening up a lead. They beat the San Francisco Giants, 7-0, on rookie Carlton Willey's six-hitter Monday night to go 2½ games in front. The St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-3, and the Cincinnati Redlegs beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-1, in the other NL activity.

Roy Moore, a 32-year old tobacco farmer from Maryland, pitched a three-hitter to give the White Sox their sixth shutout in nine games. Moore got all the runs he needed in the first inning when Billy Goodman walked with two out and Sherman Lollar hit his eighth homer of the season. The loss snapped Yankee ace Whitey

Ford's seven-game winning streak. All four shutouts pitched against the Yankees were by right-handers and it may be significant that it was right-hander Low Burdette who shut 'em out twice in the World Series last year.

Len Surles, Klamath Union High School track coach, submitted his resignation to school officials and members of the board of education Monday bringing to an end his 11-year stay at the local high school as a member of the faculty and coaching staff.

Surles resigned to take a teaching job at Orange High School in Orange, California. His resignation becomes effective immediately.

Most of Surles' life has been spent in Klamath Falls. He was raised here before moving to Bend where he completed his high school education and starred on Bend football and track teams. After leaving Bend High, Len entered the University of Oregon where he played three years of varsity football and lettered as a blocking back. A tour of Army duty interrupted his college days, but he returned to school in 1946. After graduating from Oregon, Surles took the head football and track and assistant basketball job at Baker High School, his first

Bill Casper Claims Flint Golf Tourney

FLINT, Mich. (AP)—Today is Bill Casper Jr.'s 27th birthday and he has a check for \$9,000, a gleaming trophy and the title of golf's leading money winner to make it a happy one.

The beely ex-salvor from Apple Valley, Calif., packed \$9,000 worth of drama and excitement into one final putt yesterday. From a distance of 3½ feet he captured the \$52,000 Flint Open tournament by a single stroke.

Casper finished with a 71, one-under-par, and his 285 tournament total, nosed out Masters champion Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., and Ted Kroll of Sarasota, Fla., by a stroke.

Palmer finished brilliantly with a 69, the finest of the rainy day, while third round leader Kroll staggered in with a 75.

Casper, whose winnings for the year exceed \$31,000, actually credited a two-hour downpour with helping him to his third triumph of the year. The apple-cheeked fellow with the rosy disposition sailed home splendidly after rain sogged the Warwick Hills course at nearby Grand Blanc.

Winner of the Crosby and Colonial events, Casper was two-over-par after four holes when rain brought a stoppage of play. He had gone over par on both the third and fourth holes when the skies gave way and forced a two-hour delay.

When play resumed he caught fire and Kroll, still two strokes ahead at that stage, sagged badly. Casper birdied the fifth hole while Kroll carded a double-bogie. "That was the difference right there," said the new champion. "Everything I hit after that—no matter how I hit my shots—seemed to end up in the right place. I was pretty lucky."

Kroll and Palmer each picked up \$3,800. U. S. Open champion Tommy Bolt, snarling about the rain—"I won't play," he had said in the locker room when officials called for play to resume—finished with 74 and tied for fourth with Doug Ford at 207.

Bolt, who led for two rounds in this event after leading all four rounds of last week's National Open, played the role of "Terrible Tommy" after two weeks of pleasantness.
