## Top Sport Figures Read Between Lines

NEW YORK (UPI)—You don't need bifocals to understand the current comments of such estimable sports figures as Jack Dempsey, Jack Kramer and Al Lopez.

But you do have to read between the lines.

Consider, first, the observations of Dempsey as the old Manassa Mauler observed his 63rd birthday anniversary. Dempsey applied the spurs and more than a touch of the whip to Floyd Patterson, who wears the heavy-weight crown which once adorned the Mauler's head.

"Patterson's inactivity hurts him and boxing in general," Dempsey allowed. "When he doesn't fight, the whole game suffers because people lose interest."

Undoubtedly this is true. Patterson, in a year and a half as champion, has made only two title defenses.

Yet, considering Dempsey's comments, isn't it strange that he himself is remembered, and rightfully so, as one of the all-time greats of the ring?

Because, in the seven years and two months he held the heavy-weight title—beating Jess Willard on July 4, 1919 and losing finally to Gene Tunney in September, 1926—Dempsey made only five title defenses.

Dempsey defended twice in 1920, against Billy Miske and Bill Brennan; once in 1921, against Georges Carpentier; failed to defend in 1922; defended twice in 1923, against Tommy Gibbons and Luis Firpo; went two years without a defense, and finally met Tunney—exactly three years after his last title defense.

Which means that if Patterson climbs through the ropes once in the next year and a half he'll be exactly even with the immortal Manassa Mauler's time table.

Which brings us to Kramer, the pro tennis czar.

**KRAMER AT WIMBLEDON?**

Arriving in England Tuesday, Big Jake hastily reassured the all-England court mogul that he wasn't there to raid the amateur ranks for fresh pro talent and, horrors, had no idea of trying to put his circus into hallowed Wimbledon.

"I have no intention of trying to get dates at Wimbledon," he said.

But before explaining for England, Kramer said he had inside information that Wimbledon would be receptive to giving him dates and that he would see about putting on a pro tournament there with his pros, who were Wimbledon champions, as the main attraction.

I know he said this. He said it to me.

Then there's Lopez, one of baseball's finest managers but a man burdened with an atrocious lack of talent on the field.

The good senior's hirelings are looking at the Yankees through the wrong end of the baseball telescope. They are so far back they should be wearing the original sack uniforms of the golden 20's.

But Lopez says:

"We still have a chance of catching the Yankees."

Well, what do you expect him to say?

But, as you can see, you have to read between the lines.

BR Pitchers Shine At Gem

Three of the most brilliant pitching performances witnessed in Klamath Falls baseball to date highlighted a Babe Ruth League doubleheader played under the lights at Gem Stadium Wednesday night as Eastside Electric powered a 14-0 victory over Fluhrer's in the first game and Henley Sporting Goods took a 1-0 squeaker from Chilquin in the extra-inning second contest.

Setting the marks for pitchers to follow was Eastside's Wally Palmberg who hurled a shutout ballgame that was marred only by Fluhrer's Gary Patzke's double to right in the second inning. Palmberg fanned 12 of the 21 men to face him over the five-inning route and allowed only four walks.

Earning the win for the Henley Sporting Goods nine, in what was easily the best ball game of the season so far, was Bert Allbritton, who allowed only one Chilquin hit while striking out 10 over the six-inning distance and spacing two walks and a hit batter so that he stayed out of serious trouble. Only four Chilquin runners reached first base and two of them were accounted for by a neat double play while the only man to reach third was caught off the bag by catcher Johnny Crumrine.

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## Weill Turned Down, But LA Fight Still On

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Floyd Patterson's manager says the heavyweight champion will defend his title against Roy Harris here Aug. 18 despite the denial of a promoter's license to Al Weill. But a Los Angeles matchmaker has other ideas.

George Parnassus of the Olympic Auditorium Club promptly challenged the Aug. 18 date. The Olympic has signed Zora Foley and Pete Rademacher to fight July 25 and Carmen Basilio and Art Aragon for Aug. 28. Any date in between, Parnassus argued, would hurt either fight.

The California Athletic Commission denied a license Tuesday to veteran fight figure Weill to promote the Patterson-Harris bout. A spokesman said the commission wasn't satisfied with Weill's explanation of his acquaintanceship with Frankie Carbo of New York, long a shadowy figure in U. S. boxing.

Weill, who managed Rocky Marciano to the heavyweight championship, called it "the worst deal I've had in 45 years in the sport."

Patterson's manager, Gus D'Amato, in Houston, Tex., to watch Harris in a three-round exhibition, said:

"Every effort has been made to prevent this match. We are going to hold it in the very place they didn't want it." Without identifying "the they," he added:
