OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

The long-range weather forecast indicates one of the better weekends of fishing for local sportsmen this Saturday and Sunday, and the warm weather will be welcomed after the long siege of rainy days.

This weekend's fishing forecast: Williamson River has slowed a little, but nightcrawlers and flies have been producing some nice catches, including a few of the lunkers that has made the stream one of the favorites in this area.

Wood River improved this week despite the stormy weather conditions. Worm fishing and spinning lures—copper and brass—have been giving the best results although some single egg users have also picked up a few.

Sevenside and Spring Creeks have been poor to fair and shouldn't increase too much. Both streams will be restocked in the near future by the game commission and with the new planters the action will pick up at these two spots.

Sprague River is getting better. The water is still a little high in the Bly area, but fly fishermen

have been getting in their licks in the evening hours. Bait fishing on the two forks of the Sprague has been fairly fair.

Sycan River has been fair to good for small and medium sized fish. The water is still a little high, but going down to the right depth for good fishing. Single eggs and worms have been the best.

The Little Deschutes and Crescent Creek in Northern Klamath County have both been fair to good. Fly fishing has been the best with either the gray or brown colors dominating the take.

Lake of the Woods was excellent last weekend for most of the anglers who tried their luck. Several limits were checked in at the boat docks by 10 a.m. Saturday and Sunday mornings by "all-day" fishermen. Spinners and worms were the best fly-getters, but others were bringing home fish by still fishing methods. Some rainbows as big as 18 and 20 inches were checked out by resort officials and game officers. The lake should produce another big week and with the weather expected to be better.

Diamond Lake is still producing well. But things slackened off in midweek because of wind, rain and clouds. Many anglers are being taken close to the bank—some anglers are releasing the egg layers to keep the lake loaded with kamloop eggs for future fish production. The results are about split even between still fishing and trolling. Fly fishing has been excellent in the evening, with brown and yellow choice colors.

Odell and Crescent lakes were only fair last weekend, but slowed almost to a standstill when the late weekend thunder showers hit. Both lakes should be improving late this week and by Sunday—should the weather hold—be good again as they were a few weeks back.

East and Paulina lakes are still good to excellent. Some local anglers hit East last weekend and brought home some real nice catches while trolling spinner and worms and black flat fish. Still fishermen are using almost all single eggs with very little worms. Fly fishing has been only fair to good late in the day.

Fish Lake in Jackson County is still fair with single egg and worm fishing prevailing. A few one-day limits of 30 fish have been taken over the past week or so. The lake is due for another poisoning treatment to rid the water of trash fish.

Four Mile Lake produced good for the third straight weekend last Saturday and Sunday with some signs of a slowing tendency, but many limits were taken. Worm and single eggs here too. The road is still holding up fairly well.

The Klamath Falls Junior League baseball team, minus two of its front-line players, travels to Medford Thursday night for a Southern Oregon League game against the host Crater Lake Motors team. Game time is 8 o'clock.

Manager Hi Hatfield announced that pitcher-second baseman Paul Bishop and first baseman-pitcher Dean Dunson will not be with the club when it meets Medford tonight. Bishop is out for the season with a fractured foot suffered last Saturday night at Central Point while sliding into second base. Dunson, has missed practice and may be out all week with a stomach infection.

The loss of these two cuts Hatfield's already hurting pitching staff down to the core.

Resides the Medford game, Klamath hosts Prineville here for a single game Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock and Lakeview here Sunday in a doubleheader starting at 1. The first Lakeview game is a league game.

Patterson, Harris Promoter Named

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — William Rosenzohn, a slim, young business executive with a love for sports and the nerve to make a quick decision, today was embarked on a new career — promoting a world's championship heavyweight fight.

It took a combination of circumstances for the 38-year-old Rosenzohn to step into the tangled Los Angeles fight situation and pick up the Floyd Patterson-Roy Harris title bout tentatively set for Aug. 18.

"It was mostly a case of being in the right place at the right time," Rosenzohn told a press

conference at which he was introduced as the new promoter, replacing Al Weill who failed to win California Athletic Commission approval.

Rosenzohn moved in immediately when it appeared Weill would not be approved because of rumored associations with gambler Frank Carbo. The TV executive resigned from his firm, hustled out to Houston, Tex., and was on the spot when it was officially announced Wednesday Weill's application had been disapproved. D'Amato was there to watch a fight and Harris lives nearby.

Within a matter of hours he had D'Amato's signature for Patterson and then drove to Cut and Shoot, Tex., to get Harris signed for the same terms Weill promised — \$100,000.

Rosenzohn then contacted veteran fight promoter Jack Hurley of Seattle who had put on the Pete Rademacher-Patterson bout last summer. Hurley agreed to become Rosenzohn's advisor and a promoter director for the fight.

And the athletic commission in taking his application for a promoter's license indicated it would be a mere formality for him and the bout to be approved.

Hardtops To Clash Saturday

The hardtops of the Klamath Racing Association are slated to roll again this weekend as 30 local cars and drivers will match skill and luck with numerous Northern California entrants in another action-packed 10-event racing program under the lights of Klamath Speedway Saturday night.

Time trials are scheduled for 6:30 p.m. followed by the first event at 7:30. Prior to the time trials all the youngsters in the audience are invited to take a few laps around the oval in the racers as the guests of the drivers.

Speed will be at a minimum while the children are in the cars. At the conclusion of the time trials the first of four 10-lap heat events will be run, followed by a 15 lap semi-main and a 25-lap A main event. In addition to the regular program, members of the Klamath Junior Racing Association will compete in races separate from the senior drivers.

Heading the contingent of junior competitors are Don Shultz and Tony Bonetto, who have each racked up wins in prior outings. Both Shultz and Bonetto are the owners and builders of their machines.

Leading the field of senior drivers who will fight for the checkered flag are Bud Cook, who hauled in first place honors in the last meeting, Wes Bishop, who has gained a reputation as head of the "wrecking crew," Kenny Kime, making his second start of the season, and Jack Bonham who has reworked his auto for this week's contest.

Two victims of a spectacular shashup on the last program, Bob Houck and Rich Govan, who plowed into Houck's upturned auto in the first race of his career, are also slated to have their machines back in racing order for the coming weekend.

Among the speedsters from California who will invade the local scene are Mel Allman and Corky Waterman, both of whom are highly respected for their abilities.

Admission charges to the Klamath Speedway, which is located at the end of Eberlein Street, are 90 cents for adults, 50 cents for students, with children under 12 free when accompanied by parents.

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Curfew Ends BR Contests

Seven Babe Ruth League pitchers saw service Wednesday night as Merrill blew a 14-0 second inning lead over the M. L. Johnson nine before the game was halted by a curfew ruling at 9-11 at the end of seven frames on Conger Field. The contest will be replayed at a later date.

In the bottom of the fifth, Baisigers boomed back into contention as they collected five runs on three consecutive singles, two walks and an error. Doug Floyd was the leading Baisiger hitter despite a sore arm earned while trying to block a sharp single by Depeu.

Superior led their cake with an unnecessary three marks in the top of the sixth on a combination of more walks, a wild pitch and a past ball.

San Francisco Giants Bomb Leaders; Athletics Edge Cellular Dwellers, 4-3

"This National League is so tough," insists Manager Bill Rigney of San Francisco, "my guys could win it." Thus far, the race and his Giants have made that boast a toast.

The Giants haven't won two in a row in a month. They haven't had an extra-base hit or a run batted in from Willie Mays in three weeks. And they've played only .333 ball (7-14) since June 1. Yet they've lost only 1 1/2 games to the defending Milwaukee Braves.

They looked like anything but a slumping club last night, walloping the first-place Braves 10-2 on an unbeatable combination of breaks, hits and pitching. That left the third-place Giants .002 percentage points behind St. Louis. Both challengers are only 2 1/2 games back of Milwaukee.

The Cardinals won their fifth straight, 3-1 at Pittsburgh. Philadelphia avoided a dip to the cellar with a 5-4 decision over the Chicago Cubs in 10 innings. Los Angeles and Cincinnati were tied by rain.

Rain washed out all but one American League game. Kansas City won it 4-3 over Washington.

SF 10, Braves 2
The Braves failed to make a big thing of four San Francisco errors. They helped the Giants with two boots in a five-run sixth that broke a scoreless duel. Al Worthington gained a 6-3 record, but after blanking the Braves on four hits for seven innings needed relief help.

A two-run single by Ray Jablonski and an RBI double by Orlando Cepeda were the big blows in the big sixth, when errors by shortstop Johnny Logan and left fielder Joe Adcock on the same play helped put the skids to Bob Rush (5-3), who had given up only three hits for five innings.

The Giants, salvaging the finale in the three-game set, scored two more in the eighth on Jim Davenport's third homer, then counted three in the ninth on consecutive singles by Mays (1-for-5 in a shift that had him batting second), Felipe Alou, Darryl Spencer and Cepeda.
