Patty Joins Tennis Aces

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—Budge Patty, the dapper dapper who won the title here in 1950, was expected to join two Americans in the third round of men's singles in the Wimbledon tennis championships today, but signs pointed to another battering for the U. S. delegation.

The mustachioed Patty, who hails from Los Angeles but spends most of this time in Paris, was pitted against young Los Angeles player Bob Perry in one second-round match.

The winner, and Patty was the experts' choice, would join eight-seeded Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, and young Mike Green of Miami, Fla., in the third round. MacKay and Green won their second-rounders Wednesday before rain forced a postponement of many matches.

Because of the rain, today's program included a hodge-podge of second and third round matches in men's singles and women's doubles.

Going into today's matches only seven Yanks still were "alive" in men's singles, and that number was expected to fall to as low as four or five by nightfall. Only five American women still were competing in women's singles, including defending champion Althea Gibson of New York who faced a third-round match today against Mexican star Yolanda Ramirez.

Three other Yanks hoped to move into the third round today in addition to the Patty-Perry winner. But Nick Carter of San Francisco was up against former U. S. junior champion Rod Laver of Australia; Greg Grant of San Marino, Calif., faced Bob Mark, a "second-line" Aussie veteran of international tournaments; and Gardner Mulloy of Denver, Colo., risked his 44-year-old legs against John Hurry of South Africa.

Connolly Picks U.S. To Win

HELSINKI, Finland (UPI) — Harold Connolly of Boston, the world hammer-throwing record-holder, predicted today that the American men would soundly beat the Russians in their track and field meet at Moscow next month.

"Our men will give the Russians a sound beating, but the Russians are favorites against our girls in their meet," Connolly said. Harold and his Czech athlete wife, Olympic women's discus champion Olga, arrived here Tuesday night for a 14-day tour of Finland during which they will appear in six international track and field meets.

Calhoun Decisions Bob Boyd

CHICAGO (AP)—Rory Calhoun, after a rousing victory over Bob Boyd in a bruising 10-rounder, said today he is looking forward to a re-match with the rugged Chicago middleweight.

Calhoun, the No. 7 middleweight contender, scored two knockdowns in Chicago Stadium last night and then stood off a tremendous finish by Boyd to score a unanimous decision in the nationally televised bout.

The New Yorker and Boyd expected to iron out the details of a re-match, tentatively slated for Aug. 6 or Aug. 20, at a meeting in the Stadium today. The bout would be held in Chicago.

Looking beyond the re-match Boyd, Calhoun said he also was looking forward to a bout with the winner of Monday night's scrap between Joey Giardello and Joey Giambra in San Francisco.

Calhoun said he played it safe last night after knocking Boyd down in the second and ninth rounds.

"All I'm interested in," said Calhoun, "is moving up in the middleweight ratings for a shot at Sugar Ray Robinson's title."

In the closing 10th round Boyd, the No. 8 middleweight contender, had the New Yorker staggering under a furious two-listed onslaught.

Referee Walter Brightmore scored it 48-42 for Calhoun under the Illinois five-point scoring system. Judge Jim McManus called it for Calhoun 47-43 and Judge John Bray gave it to Calhoun 45-44. The AP card was 46-42 for Calhoun.

Lane 'Sure' Of Title Go

HOUSTON (AP)—Kenny Lane, the Muskegon challenger, believes he is the left-hander who can stop lightweight champion Joe Brown's mastery over southpaws.

Lane expressed such confidence yesterday shortly after signing to meet the 32-year-old champion here July 23 in a 15-round nationally televised title fight.

Brown has beaten every left-hander he has faced while compiling a record that includes 72 victories, 9 draws and 15 defeats. The New Orleans-Houston Negro will be seeking his 33rd knockout when he meets Lane in Sam Houston Coliseum.

"I beat more right-handers than Brown beat southpaws," said Lane the 25-year-old Michigan boxer who has held the No. 1 spot among lightweight challengers nearly two years.

"Besides, I'm a left-hander but I think right-handed," he said.
