Young Artists' Pictures To Be Placed On Exhibit

Paintings of two young Klamath Falls artists, Pat Carney, junior at Klamath Union High School, and Stephanie Bonotto, a senior, have been chosen to be included in the national Junior Red Cross art exhibit of the International School Art program.

This exhibit, which will include art from all Red Cross areas, will be exhibited in this country for one year in various cities then will be sent abroad to be shown.

The art is representative of the cross section of American life. The Klamath Basin chapter is one of 25 chapters participating in the Pacific area. Screening of 931 entries was completed in early June by members of the Pacific Art Association. Of the 23 pictures submitted by Klamath Basin youth, two were selected for national entry. All were accepted for International Exchange. Thirty eight coun-

tries are included in the itinerary. Pat, who entered a scene of Moore Park, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Carney, 138 South Eldorado Avenue. He has painted since he can remember and took his first training in the eighth grade. He has had no formal training, plans to continue his art studies in college and to become a commercial artist.

Stephanie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Bonotto, Wocus, and has had some formal training through the extension department of Oregon State College. She will attend the University of Oregon this fall to continue her studies and plans to teach in her chosen field.

Mrs. C. R. Canine, Klamath Basin Junior Red Cross chairman was advised of the winning entries.

GN Transfers Division Head

The Great Northern Railway announced the transfer of Ralph H. Hemmesch, Klamath Division superintendent, to a similar post at Minot, North Dakota, and the naming of Paul F. Cruikshank as his successor.

Hemmesch will have charge of the Minot Division, which includes GN's electronic classification facility, Gavin Yard.

Cruikshank has been trainmaster at Seattle. He previously was assistant trainmaster at Vancouver, British Columbia. Cruikshank is a graduate of Yale University and served four years in the Navy. He began his career with Great Northern as a track laborer in Minnesota in 1931, while a student.

Hemmesch has been in charge of GN's Eastern Oregon - Northern California operations at two separate periods. He headed the division between 1945 and 1951, and from May 1953 until his present transfer. In the interim he was superintendent of GN's Dakota Division at Grand Forks, North Dakota. He began his Great Northern career as a station helper in Minnesota in 1933.

The transfers take effect July 29.

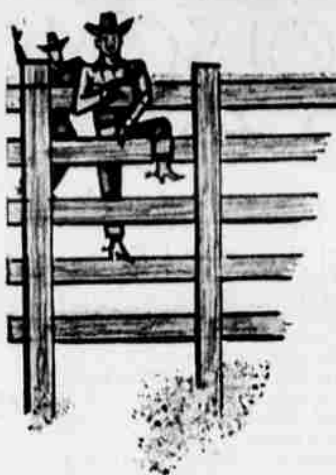

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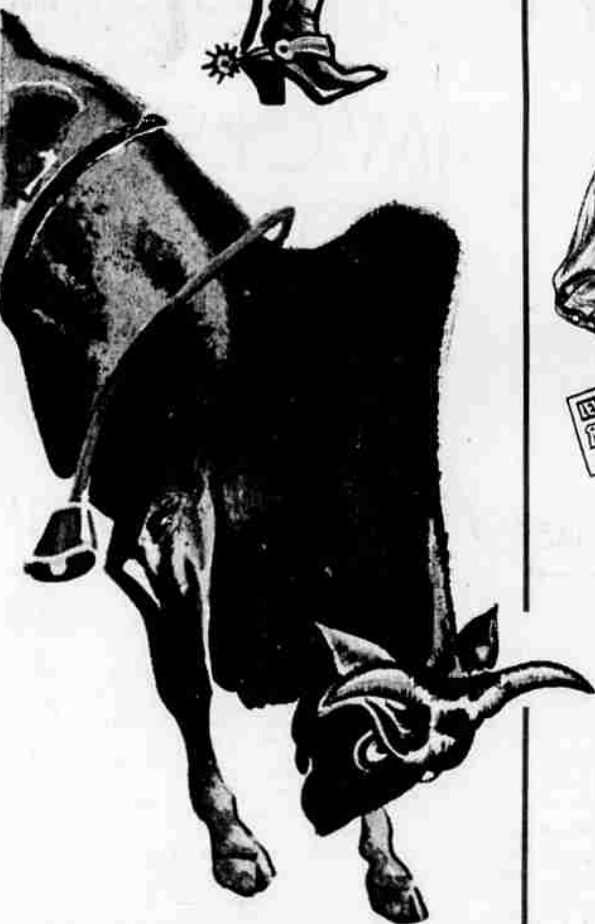
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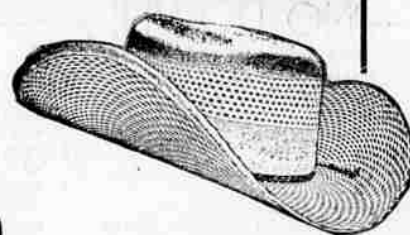


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
