### State Leader Has Way To Cut Legislative Session

SALLEM (AP) — John R. Richardson, state director of finance and administration, thinks he has found a way to help reduce the length of legislative sessions. His partial solution is to prepare a more explanatory state budget, and to have the key money men in the Legislature watch its preparation. It's getting harder all the time to get candidates to run for the Legislature. They serve here for four months for \$1,200. The people will vote in November whether to double the pay. The other step is to try to shorten the sessions. "The biggest factor which delays the Legislature is the review of the budget by the Joint Ways and Means Committee," Richardson says. "Action on the appropriation bills always comes last." It takes longer each session to review the budget because the state government is getting more complicated.

### Aussies Plan Basin Visit

A group of 62 Australians will arrive in Klamath Falls late Saturday in a stopover visit between Portland and San Francisco as part of a nationwide tour following their attendance at Rotary International Convention in Dallas, Texas June 1. The group, including 24 wives and one child, is traveling in two buses and arrangements have been made for a visit to Crater Lake en route here according to O. K. Puckett, president of the Klamath Falls Rotary Club. The visiting Australians will have their choice of tours through the Lava Beds National Monument, Geary Brothers Seed Ranch, Lake of the Woods, the Klamath River Copco Dam project, the city of Klamath Falls and Klamath Lake on Sunday. A no-host buffet supper has been arranged for 5 o'clock Sunday when Rotarians and civic leaders and officials will gather for an international get-together. Bill Caldwell, Modford, governor of Rotary District No. 154, will be in attendance. The visitors from "down under" will stay at the Winema Hotel Saturday and Sunday nights. If time permits, the group will be shown through the Weyerhaeuser plant Monday morning on their way south, Puckett said. He pointed out that the Australians' visit is in keeping with the fourth object of Rotary: "The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men united in the ideal of service." Assisting Puckett on the host committee are Frank Ganong, Al Nyback, Rod Murray, Duke Zamsky, Chuck Bailey, Merle West and Frank Tucker.

### Optimism Grows On Car Picture Reports Scribe

NEW YORK (UPI)—Business men are trying to guess on two immediate developments that may have an influence on the economy. One is the reception the new automobile models will get and the other is how much, if anything, will steel prices be boosted. There is growing optimism on the automobile picture. Automobile companies are stepping up their time for bringing out the new 1959 models. Some of them will be coming off the assembly lines by the middle of September. That means there will have to be buying of many things—steel, glass, leather, brass, copper, tires, and myriad other items that go to make the automobiles of today. A steel price rise may or may not become a reality. Most of the steel experts believe a price rise is a "must" because they assert there isn't enough leverage to absorb increased costs. Workers got an automatic rise in pay under their two-year contract on July 1st. They also get a boost on the cost of living index rise. It is known that steel makers will raise their prices only as a last resort—after they have gone over all the figures again. They frankly do not want to run afoul of the Washington investigators. Hence their interest today in an article entitled "The Manipulated Price Rise" by Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) published in the June 28 issue of "The Nation." Down in Wall Street the word is that Senator Kefauver will be highly disappointed if the steel companies do not raise their prices so that he can blow up a big investigation. If the steel companies raise their prices on July 1, Kefauver said in the first paragraph of his article, "it will be under circumstances difficult to justify, and the results are certainly not calculated to hasten economic recovery for the country as a whole." From this remark, the steel industry concludes a price rise would probably set off a bigger bellow than usual in Washington because of the political capital that might be extracted from the noise. The steel companies have been revamping their production facilities to produce steel at reduced costs, and the experts contend they have done a sizeable job in being able to make a profit at a low rate of production.
