The white caps on the lake were too much for the smaller limiteds, but two of the powerful unlimiteds, the Miss Thriftway and Thriftway Two, of Seattle, were called for test runs late Saturday afternoon.

The Thriftways, rated among the top favorites for the handsome Diamond Cup and the \$1,000 first prize, arrived here Thursday and haven't been able to get into the lake because of the winds.

Several other unlimiteds planned to warm up engines in casual runs around the course.

Almost 80 unlimited hydros were set to go in seven races at \$250 each Saturday when officials decided it was just too rough for them. They were rescheduled until 6 a. m. Sunday.

The limiteds will gun their program until 10:30 a. m. Then the course will be made available to the locally-sponsored Miss Roundtable, the old "Question Mark" of Seattle, and the Adios, the Tri-City, Wash., entry. Both must make 90 miles an hour to qualify. The other 10 have qualified in previous competition this season.

With the wind, dark skies and temperatures scarcely in the 60s, it was a dreary day here for a community that has worked two months in perfect weather for a big weekend.

But the forecast held hopes of a brighter day Sunday. It calls for only partly-cloudy skies, temperatures in the 70s and winds of only about 12 miles an hour.

John Richards, commodore of the sponsoring Coeur d'Alene Unlimited Hydroplane Assn. said drivers and boat owners are confident the unlimiteds can go Sunday. But if the winds come up and make that impossible, they will race Monday.

The Miss U. S. I. of Detroit, one of the nation's fastest hydros, and the Miss Thriftway were still rated as the boats to beat. The Thriftway won the Memorial Cup on the Detroit River two weeks ago and the Miss U. S. has done 170 miles an hour on one stretch here.

The Maverick, owned by Bill Waggoner of Phoenix, Ariz., has the best lap time here at 113 miles an hour and is also rated a contender along with Miss Bardahl of Seattle, winner of last month's Apple Cup on Lake Chelan, Wash.

Others in the race are the community-owned Miss Spokane, the Coral Reef of Tacoma, the Miss Torren of Seattle, Miss Seattle and Miss Pay 'N Save.

Visitors have started pouring in to this city of 10,000, many from the Spokane metropolitan area 35 miles away. With good weather Sunday, sponsors said they expect as many as 200,000 to see the races.

The first of four preliminary 15-mile heats for the unlimiteds is scheduled to start at 12:30 p. m. The seven fastest boats will qualify for the 30-mile final at 5 p. m.

There was another local disappointment along with the wind. Curtis LeMay, vice chief of staff of the Air Force, was here earlier this week and was expected to add his prestige to the gallery. But he turned up in Belgium Saturday to attend a meeting. Charles Finucane, nominated Friday by President Eisenhower, is the assistant secretary of defense, will be here, however.

## Cal Ace Defeats Briton

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Tiny Mimi Arnold of Redwood City, Calif., upset British Amazon Christine Truman Saturday and keyed a six-player American advance through another round at the rain-splashed Wimbledon tennis championships.

Miss Arnold, just 19, standing 5-1 and weighing barely 100 pounds outplayed, outdove and outvoled her 6-foot, 172-pound opponent who became Britain's tennis idol after her victory over New York's Althea Gibson in the Wightman Cup matches two weeks ago. The score was 10-8, 6-3.

The center court battle brightened American prestige considerably on another gray, drizzly day that also saw the advance of Miss Gibson, the defending women's champion, and Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, chief American hope in the men's singles.

Miss Gibson, playing well with in heretofore, joined Miss Arnold in the quarter-finals with a 6-0, 6-4 victory over Lorraine Coghlan of Australia. Mrs. Margaret Osborne du Pont of Wilmington, Del., only other U. S. survivor in women's play, won a third round match from Australia's Norma Marsh 6-3, 3-6, 8-6.

Eighth-seeded Karl Faggers of Miami fell before Briton's Pat Ward, 2-6, 6-4, 6-4. MacKay, trailing Australian Bob Frick 4-6, 8-8 when rain intervened Friday, played spottily but well enough to win 4-6, 10-8, 6-4, 6-4. Mulloy eliminated 21-year-old Mike Green of Miami Beach, Fla., 3-6, 6-4, 6-2. Patzky completed a rain-delayed match with bearded Torben Ulrich of Denmark, 4-6, 7-5, 6-1, 6-2.

In first-round women's doubles play, Janet Hopps of Seattle and Sally Moore of Bakersfield, Calif., defeated D. M. Calt and Janet Treweby of Britain, 6-1, 3-6, 6-2.

## Mickey Wright Wins US Women's Crown

DETROIT (AP)—Willow Mickey Wright turned the U. S. Women's Open golf championship into a runaway Saturday and her winning total topped out a U. S. Open record established by the incomparable Babe Zaharias.

Miss Wright, a 23-year-old blonde from Chula Vista, Calif., took the lead at the outset and won the biggest ladies' tournament of them all in a blazing finish.

Despite the rugged 36 hole requirements, the long hitting lass fired a 70 in the morning round and a 74 in the afternoon for a winning 200 total that eclipses the 201 record total that the late Mrs. Zaharias had in winning the 1934 U. S. Women's Open at Pebble Beach, Mass.

This is the biggest victory of Miss Wright's young career and gives her the 1953 "slam" PGA recently, she won the ladies' PGA championship, and she did it in the same decisive fashion in both events.

She won the LPGA by six strokes and took this one by five. The leading amateur was Anne Quast, 20-year-old Stoughton, Ore., from Marysville, Wash. Her 207

total deadlocked her with Mary Lena Faulk of Thomaston, Ga., and Bey Hanson of India, Calif.

Miss Louise Siga, twice a winner and twice runner-up in the women's open, had a 74 and a 71 at Forest Lake Country Club and finished with 205.

Miss Wright's winning total is 20 strokes under par at Forest Lake's 37-36-73 layout.

At the halfway point before Saturday's 36-hole final, Miss Wright had only one stroke lead over Fay Crocker, 1935 Open winner from Montevideo, Uruguay. Miss Crocker could do no better than 76-74 for a 207 total that gave her third place.

The victory was worth \$1,500 to Miss Wright, who turned professional in 1954, the year she finished in a fourth place tie as an amateur in this same tournament.

The Washington NFL club will have two former Oregon college football stars on the field when the Redskins go against the Bay Area gridlers. Baker was one of the Redskins' leading scorers last year and one of the league's leading field goal and extra-point kickers.

This will be the tenth program to be promoted by Oregon Sports Attractions since it started operating in 1952. Past games have averaged 25,000 in attendance and made Portland the pro football capital of the nation, excluding cities represented in the National Football League.
