



The Fourth of July weekend will be highlighted with several outstanding sporting events throughout the state including a number of events scheduled on the local front for the sports fans with free time to spend.

Heading the list of "big things" will be the Oregon AAU track and field meet at Eugene Friday afternoon, July 4. The meet will be held on the University of Oregon's famed Hayward Field, home of the Northern Division track championships teams of Bill Bowerman.

Several leading names in track and field circles will be entered in the Oregon AAU meet including the world's shot put record holder, Perry O'Brien, and ace miler Laszlo Tabari.

O'Brien, the former University of Southern California collegiate shot put champion, has thrown the round ball 63 feet, 2 inches for the world record. He'll be trying for a new standard for Oregon track followers.

Tabari, the sensational Hungarian distance runner, will join a field of top-notch milers in the Eugene meet. Running against Tabari will be Jim Grele, Oregon miler who finished fourth in the national AAU mile at Bakersfield to Herb Elliott, Merv Lincoln and Ed Moran. Elliott, the Australian miler, set a new world's mile mark in this race, 3:57.9.

Tabari won the national AAU three-mile run the same night. Bill Dellinger, NCAA mile champion in his college days at Oregon a few years ago, will also be around Friday. Dellinger finished third in the Bakersfield three-mile race.

Another track meet is scheduled at Southern Oregon College in Ashland July 4. This is an all-comers meet open to anyone interested. Leading college and prep athletes are expected to enter the Ashland meet. Four divisions will be run off in the all-comers competition including grade school (sixth grade and under), junior high (seventh, eighth and ninth), senior high (10th, 11th, 12th) and open (college age and above).

Entries can be made prior to the start, which is 5 p.m. at the SOC track.

Local golfers will have their own two-ball foursome tournament at Reames, and a few Klamath fairway experts may travel to Prineville and Bend for the annual Mirror Pond Tournament Friday and Saturday.

Important baseball action is scheduled for Gem Stadium Friday and Sunday. The Klamath Kubs host Yreka in a battle for the Northern California League leadership Friday. Both teams are tied with 5-2 records for the top spot. On Sunday, the Klamath Falls American Legion baseball team, under the sponsorship of Superior Troy Laundry and Eastside Electric, will meet Grants Pass in the big game with a 4-0 record. Klamath is right behind at 4-1. Klamath could take the lead by whipping the GP club.

All in all there will be lots doing this weekend.

Kubs Facing Money Plea; Eye Support

The same problem facing many minor league baseball clubs and a large portion of the country's semi-pro teams has finally caught up with the Klamath Kubs of the Northern California League.

That problem is money. Manager Irv Whitte repeated late Tuesday that club officials announced after a meeting early this week that unless the Kubs start drawing a little better at the gate, the team may be forced to call a halt to its play.

"The only form of financing the club has," Whitte remarked, "is the money taken in at the gate. It doesn't take too much to run our organization the way it should be, but we are in need of a better reception at the gate for the next few games than we have had in our last home stands," Whitte added.

The Kubs manager went on to commend Kub followers for their past support. "We realize that the weather this spring hasn't been too conducive to attending baseball games," Whitte stated, "and we hope the weather and the fans both come our way the rest of the season."

This Friday, July 4, Yreka plays here at Gem Stadium in a battle for first place with the Kubs. Sunday the Klamath team, which has been leading the Northern California circuit since the opening weekend, travels to Mount Shasta to meet the third place Seals.

After Friday's home game with Yreka, Klamath is billed to meet Prineville's semi-pro club here July 12 and the traveling Caban Giants at Gem July 19 and 20. These three games could play a big roll in the financial condition of the ball club, depending on how the fans turnout.

Admission prices to all Kubs games is 75 cents for adults and all children under high school age will be admitted free. Whitte said the ticket price will remain the same with the possible exception of a 90 cent and 50 cent tickets when the Cuban Giants play here. This is not certain yet and will be decided by the team's board of directors.

Here is the full contents of the column "From Where I Sit..." written by the COP student body president:

"If you recall, last week I mentioned that I was attending a student body presidents' convention at the University of Oregon in Eugene. Well, the convention was fine—better than most. Need I go on? The rest of the building is made up of banquet rooms with dining facilities; many, many discussion rooms; and sundry other features I never got around to investigating."

"And then there are the 37 national fraternities and sororities, not to mention the living dorms, which smack of the fine hotel."

"For those interested in various other aspects of the campus, there is the museum; an enormous modern library with the stacks loaded with books; and on-campus shops of all description, including a little foreign movie theater. And speaking of theaters, the new one built for the legitimate arts was so equipped that it would cause Mark Brown to have hunger pains."

"There is much, much more—even a millrace stream which runs through all this campus splendor. But what leaves the greatest impression is not what has been built, but what has not—the acres and acres of green lawn, spread with all manner of trees, criss-crossed with long, seemingly slender walkways; the wide avenues; the curving carriage lanes; the spacious quadrangles. It is what has been allowed to remain beautiful and free of "expansion" that lends an almost unbelievable beauty to this campus."

Milwaukee Stretches Lead; Boston Wins

Low Burdette Blanks Reds; Cards, SF Bow

Are the Milwaukee Braves back in the groove now that they've managed to beat Los Angeles? Or is that 3½-game National League lead only a momentary margin while they have their hands on the Cincinnati Reds, their favorite patsies?

Either way, nobody but the champs has been that far ahead, and the Braves made it for only the second time on a shutout by Low Burdette and a home run by Eddie Mathews that beat Cincinnati 1-0 last night. That gave Milwaukee a four-game streak since ending a nine-game losing jinx with two victories last weekend.

The Dodgers contributed to Milwaukee's lead with a 9-3 victory over second-place St. Louis, and the Chicago Cubs knocked off third-place San Francisco 9-5. Philadelphia defeated Pittsburgh 4-2.

Thomson In British Lead

ST. ANNE'S-ON-THE-SEA, England (UPI)—Australia's Peter Thomson, who smashed Bobby Jones' record in leading qualifying play, was the solid title favorite today as 100 survivors began championship play in the British Open golf tournament with only two Americans on hand.

Gene Sarazen, 36-year-old Germantown, N.Y., star who won the British Open crown 26 years ago, and Monte Bradley, an unheralded Army private from Hillsboro, Tex., were the only members of a 10-man U. S. group to survive the two qualifying rounds.

Sarazen was bitter about the Americans' poor showing and openly called it "disgraceful."

Thomson, three-time winner of this title, compiled a total of 133 for the two qualifying rounds, breaking by one stroke the mark set by Jones in 1925.

Pitching Expected To Be All-Star Key

NEW YORK (UPI)—The All-Star Game moves into the pitchers' paradise called Memorial Stadium at Baltimore next Tuesday and from here it looks like an American League triumph in what may provide the stinging pitching the contest has seen in 10 years.

Memorial Stadium with its vast acreage and distant fences is not a slugger's ball park. To top it off, the American League undoubtedly has the edge when it comes to pitching this time around.

And pitching, or the lack of it, is what decides ball games. Magnanimously awarding the American League staff the accolade of superiority, a survey of the Baltimore records this season has to make the American League the decided favorite.

Baltimore, as example, has hosted 33 games this season as of Tuesday. Pitching was the key factor two-thirds of the time with a number of brilliant performances.

GAMES CLOSE
Of those 33 games at Memorial Stadium, 10 were decided by one run and 10 others were shutouts. Pitchers laboring on the Baltimore hill had pitched a one-hitter, a trio of two-hitters, a three-hitter, six four-hitters and six five-hitters.

Which means that outstanding pitching featured 17 of the 33 contests.

Both sides undoubtedly will now shower down with a record number of basehits come Tuesday. But, considering the record, this park should produce a tightly-pitched affair with the accent on getting one run across. Maybe the tightest.

In recent years the club wilders have had a field day. The closest thing to a pitching duel was in 1952 when both sides chalked up only eight hits as the National League won a 3 to 2 thriller. But you have to discount that somewhat because the game was called at the end of the fifth inning because of rain.

Silky Shakes Old Style, Wins

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (UPI)—The "new" Silky Sullivan may not provide as many thrills as the "old," but if his latest race is any indication he's probably going to make a lot of bettors happier.

Silky, after a long drought in which he failed to win a race despite his highly publicized late finish, came home in front at Hollywood Park Tuesday afternoon to capture the \$7500 San Clemente Purse by two lengths.

Forsaking his usual desperate gallop in the stretch, Silky—dismal failure in the Kentucky Derby and Preakness—never trailed by more than three lengths under a steady ride by jockey Bill Shoemaker.

The next major test for Silky is the \$100,000 Westerner on July 19.

I'll start him at first base Thursday at Milwaukee. He has been working out regularly in Philadelphia and probably will give our club a lift."

Under indefinite suspension since he pleaded guilty to a morals charge in Spokane, Wash., Feb. 20, the 25-year-old Bouchee was given another chance when Frick, at a news conference in New York, announced the reinstatement.

"It was the only decision I could live with," Frick said. "I have made an exhaustive study of all the evidence, and I am convinced that Bouchee is completely cured. All the doctors and the probation officers who have been assigned to this case have recommended his return to baseball. I am assuring sole and complete responsibility."

A little over three months after the offense, Bouchee was placed on three years probation by a Chicago judge. A psychiatrist testified that he suffered from compulsive exhibitionism, an aberration resulting from emotional illness. His offense was indecent exposure involving two young girls.

Bouchee has been working out at Connie Mack Stadium in Philadelphia, since June 4 after undergoing psychiatric treatment for three months at the Institute of Living in Hartford, Conn.

"I'll be happy to be back with the boys," Bouchee said upon hearing the news. "No one can know how happy."

Carling Won By Canada

TORONTO, Ont. (UPI)—It took a pressure putt on the last hole of the last match, but Canada can boast of a Carling Cup triumph over the favored United States team for the second straight year.

Canadian amateur champion Nick Weslock clinched a 6½ to 5½ point victory with a pressure birdie putt on the 18th hole of the final match of the best-ball foursomes at Toronto's St. George Golf Club Tuesday.

Canada won the inaugural program at Flint, Mich., last year. Canadian PGA champion Stan Leonard and Gary Cowan swept their match against Julius Boros and amateur Fred Paine of Pittsburgh, earning a full three points under the Nassau scoring system.

The Weslock-A. Al Bolding combination halved their first nine against Doug Ford and Ward Wettlaufer as each picked up ½ point, but the Canadians won the match and the cup with a 2-up win on the back nine.

Paul Harney and amateur Bob Shave of Cleveland, were the only U.S. team to earn a full three points. They defeated Jack Kay and young amateur Hugh Patterson.

Dow Finsterwald and veteran amateur Ed Meister, Jr., Wiloughby, Ohio, rallied after losing the front nine 2-up to Johnny Henrick and Eric Hanson to score a 3-up win on the back nine and the match for two points.

It's been Mantle and Berra for the New York Yankees; Kaline and Kuenn for Detroit. But Boston has the Boom-Boom boys of the moment, with Ted Williams and Jackie Jensen crashing nine homers and driving in 20 runs between them in the Red Sox last five games.

The Big Guy and Jensen, who is closing in on his best slugging season in the majors after taking the American League home run lead with 14 in June, each smacked two-run shots that powered the Red Sox to a 10-5 victory over Washington last night.

It was Jensen's 24th of the year, two shy of his 1955 high of 28, and fifth in four games for a total of 11 RBI. Williams, the most enduring 39-year-old since Jack Benny went square and turned 40, hammered his 12th home run, added two singles and picked up a third RBI as the Red Sox won their third in a row with a 4-1 record.

That put third place Boston within nine games of the leading Yankees, who split a twin-night pair at Baltimore, winning 2-1 after a 7-5 loss. Kansas City stayed a half game ahead of Boston with a 5-1 victory at Detroit. Chicago defeated Cleveland 5-4 in 11 innings after the Indians had chased White Sox ace Billy Pierce.

In the National League, Milwaukee regained a 3½-game lead, beating Cincinnati 1-0 on Low Burdette's eight-hitter while Los Angeles knocked off second place St. Louis 9-3 and the Chicago Cubs whipped third place San Francisco 9-5. Philadelphia beat Pittsburgh 4-2.
