

## Hardtop Racers Set Saturday Program

Beams went scoreless until the seventh when Lewiston chased in a run. Pete Gongola's homer, with Rufus Johnson aboard, put Yakima in front in the bottom of the inning, and the Bears added a singleton in the eighth.

Lewiston tied it again in the ninth on a pair of singles and a double.

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## Garver Returns Old Form

DETROIT (AP) — Making your

Comeback of the Year awards

early? Don't overlook Ned Gar-

ver.

When people ask—and they are

asking — "What's keeping those

Kansas City Athletics up there?"

one of the biggest answers is the

crafty right-hander who has sur-

prised even himself with eight vic-

tories in 12 decisions.

The 32-year-old breaking-ball

artist whipped the Detroit Tigers

5-1 last night. He missed his fourth

shutout by the margin of pinch

hitter Bob Hazle's eighth-inning

home run.

The Tigers thought Garver was

washed up in the winter of 1956

and traded him to the Athletics

in an eight-player deal that has

backfired. The four players dealt

off by the A's never panned out

in Detroit and the Tigers have

disposed of all of them.

Garver, who had a 0-2 record

while working in just six games

for the Tigers in 1956, admitted he

pleaded with the Tigers front of-

fice not to trade him.

"I told them I'd play for less

money," he said. "I told them I

just wanted to play out the rest

of my days in Detroit. When they

traded me, I thought they figured

I was washed up and I guess I

got to thinking that way too."

Last season with the Athletics

Garver was 6-13. "I talked to
