Law Indicts Fight Judge

NEW YORK (AP)—Bert Grant, a New York boxing judge for many years, has been indicted and arrested on charges of conspiring with fight manager Hymie Wallman to commit bribery in five bouts involving Wallman's fighters.

Grant, 51, pleaded innocent on his arraignment.

The alleged conspiracy covered five bouts at Madison Square Garden and St. Nicholas Arena in New York from Sept. 20, 1954, to April 7, 1958.

District Atty. Frank Hogan accused Grant of receiving a total of \$400 from Wallman, \$300 for fights that he judged and \$100 for a fight at which he did not officiate.

Wallman was named co-conspirator in the indictment by a New York grand jury that has been hearing an investigation of pro boxing conducted by Hogan's chief assistant, Alfred J. Scott, and assistant D. A. John J. Bonomi.

Hogan said Wallman was granted immunity for testifying. He said Grant refused to waive immunity a month ago and therefore was not permitted to testify.

Fighters managed by Wallman won all five of the fights, four by unanimous decisions, Alex Miteff, an Argentine heavyweight, was a two-time winner and middleweight Moses Ward of Detroit, featherweight Ike Chestnut of New York and lightweight Orlando Zulueta of Cuba each won once.

It was alleged in the indictment that Grant accepted bribes to favor Wallman's fighters. A conspiracy conviction, a misdemeanor, is punishable by a prison term of from one to three years. Conviction of a felony count is punishable by terms of from one to 10 years in each count.

Williams Hitting On Steady Rise

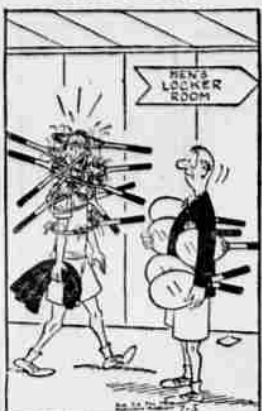

Cal Fight Official Defends Boxing Case

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Is the game of boxing rotten to the core?

Not in the opinion of Jack Urch, chief enforcement officer for the California Athletic Commission.

The wake of very unpopular decisions in San Francisco recently, and the indictment of a fight judge in New York Wednesday on charges of accepting bribes, Urch was asked if the California Commission ever had investigated a fight judge.

"Not to my knowledge," said Urch. "As far as we are concerned, every judge we use is completely honest — or we wouldn't use him."

NO INVESTIGATIONS

"We never have deemed it necessary to investigate a judge. If you will note all the complaints about the decision in the Joey Giambra-Joe Giardello fight the other night, the two men who voted for Giambra nearly always have been on the majority side down through the years."

How about the Eddie Machen-Zora Folley fight, voted a draw some months ago—a decision that brought down a torrent of boos on the head of Machen the other night when he was introduced from the ring?

"It was a close fight and could have been called either way by the judges," said Urch. "It was close enough so that we never considered investigating the judges."

Phoenix Tramples Helpless Mounties

The Phoenix Giants turned on an awesome display of power Wednesday night to trample Vancouver's helpless Mounties into submission as the two Pacific Coast League clubs got their go-for-broke series under way.

It was the Giants in a breeze, 11-5, in the opener as they rattled off five homers and eight other hits off four Vancouver hurlers, including the cream of the Mounties' mound staff.

The victory shoved the Giants up into first place and the Mounties, leaders before Wednesday night, down into third place, two percentage points behind the San Diego Padres, who won a 16-inning 12-11 cliff-hanger from the Salt Lake City Bees.

The Seattle Rainiers whitewashed Portland 3-0 in the only other game played. Rain washed out Sacramento at Spokane.

Don Taussig slammed out two homers to lead the Phoenix assault. Other roundtrippers came off the bats of Phoenix's Willie McCovey, Dusty Rhodes and George Prescott and Vancouver's Spider Jorgensen.

Glenn McMin won it for the Giants, although he had to have help from Ernie Broglio, Mel Held and the Mounties, but he took the long walk after giving up nine hits in only 3 1/3 innings of play. Joe Hatten, Jim Hughes and Russ Heman finished up.

Chuck Churn, Seattle's 6 foot 3, inch right-hander, served up a six-hitter in blanking the Beavers. He bested Elmer Singleton, a former teammate. Both worked the route.

'Case', 'Keef' Scheduled For Anti-Trust Encounter

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress, a giddy match-maker, today paired "Case" and "Keef" for a legislative encounter which staggers the mind.

"Keef," of course, is Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), slow-spoken chairman of the Senate Anti-monopoly subcommittee. The subcommittee is considering bills to exempt professional team sports from anti-trust laws.

"Case" is Casey Stengel, double-balking manager of the New York Yankees. He has been invited to testify next Wednesday on the exemption bills.

Their meeting promises to steal the show from other baseball royalty invited to appear for the subcommittee's hearings — stars like Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox, Mickey Mantle of Case's Yankees and Stan (The Man) Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals.

It isn't that Case is untutored in the world of interstate commerce. He is, after all, a Glendale, Calif., banker, who is interested in oil properties.

Jordan Upsets Isaac Logart

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Rangy Don Jordan called for a shot at lightweight champion Joe Brown today after his upset split decision victory over Cuban Isaac Logart, the No. 1 welterweight contender.

Jordan, badly cut over the right eye and bleeding profusely from the nose, came up with a furious late rally Wednesday night to edge the veteran Logart in a nationally televised 10-rounder at Hollywood Legion Stadium.

The decision was unpopular with the estimated 1,500 fans and also with the sportswriters at ringside, who voted 8-1 for Logart in a post-fight poll.

Jordan, who said he felt he deserved the verdict, indicated he'll confine his activity to the lightweight division from now on. He weighed 141 to Logart's 138.

Judge George Latka had Logart an easy winner, 97-93, but judge John Thomas voted 97-95 for Jordan and referee Mush Calaban gave it to Jordan, 95-93. The United Press International card was identical to Latka's.

Balsigers, Merrill Win Babe Ruth Tilts

A pair of visiting Lakeview Babe Ruth League teams were handed defeats for their travels at Conger Field Wednesday night as Merrill took advantage of seven errors and six hits to pound out a 12-4 win over the Lakeview Eagles while at the other end of the field Balsigers was busy breaking up a third-inning, five-all deadlock with a 10-run surge in the fourth frame to win 18-8 from the Lakeview Loggers.

The Balsiger-Logger contest was halted at the end of five as the league rule concerning a 10-run margin was invoked.

The winning pitcher was Balsiger's Fred Guntion, who came in the fourth to relieve Larry Weaver who came to the aid of starter Dwight Schuh in the third frame. The loss was charged to Logger Gary Reynolds, who went the full distance for the visitors.

In the Merrill-Eagle contest, winning pitcher Dennis Salvadori gave up only three hits over the seven-inning route but saw a total of five errors on the part of his teammates allow the Lakeview squad to count their four tallies. Charged with the defeat was Homer Smith who like the winner was plagued by errors while he allowed only six hits. Lakeview committed seven errors. Smith contributed to his own downfall as he dispensed 15 free passes. Salvadori walked five.

A sixth inning spree gave the Merrill team added insurance as they garnered four runs on a grand slam homer by Don Willey, the leadoff man, who plowed a screamer to dead center field that had players in the other ball game scattering for cover.
