The double ring service was read at 2 p. m. by Dr. Dallas S. McNeil before members of the two families and close friends. Baskets of arrangements of pink and white gladioli tied with white satin ribbons, and tall lighted white tapers in a candelabra at the altar, formed a summery background for the rites. Mrs. James L. Riggs sang "The Wedding Prayer," before the service with Susie Williams, Henley, at the organ.

Averil, given in marriage by her father, was stately in a floor-length gown of heavy white slipper satin, fashioned with a delicate lace bodice over a camisole top of satin. Scallops of the lace outlined the boat-shaped neck. Long sleeves of the lace were pointed at the wrist. Medallions of the lace were caught in the very full skirt which swept into a chapel train. Her finger-tip nylon net veil was held by a tiny tiara-type, seed pearl-encrusted cap. She carried a white New Testament with cymbidium orchid and cascade of stephanotis buds caught in white satin streamers.
