Linda Reid, a sorority sister, was soloist. The nuptial service was read by Dr. Morris H. Roach, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Richmond, California, cousin of the bride, at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, June 18. Masses of white gladioli and pink majestic daisies with many lighted, tall white tapers in candelabra formed the altar arrangements. Candlelighters and ushers were Lester Larson, and Robert Larson. A third usher was Eldon C. Payzant. Sylvia Gerber, Klamath Falls, recent graduate of Mills, Portland, and Kay Settergren, Portland, bridesmaids, wore identical frocks of jade green tissue taffeta with matching hats. Dresses were made with fitted bodices and full gathered waltz-length skirts caught with a self bow at the front hemline. Their flowers were crescents of white roses and pink carnations. Best man was George A. Stevenson, brother-in-law of the bridegroom. For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Pedersen chose a cocoa shaded lace with mint green accessories, matching feather toque and cypridium orchid at the shoulder. The wedding party received immediately following the service in the church parlors. 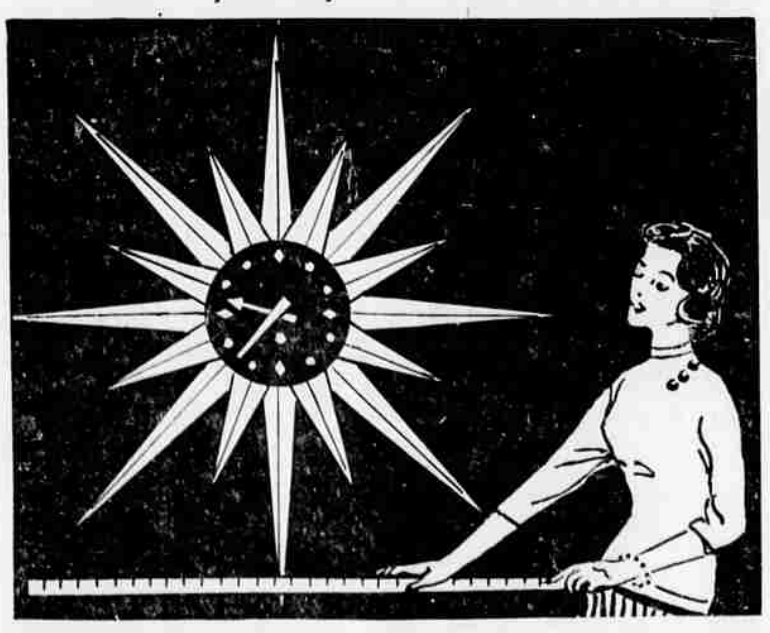
Micka-Oliva Rites In Malin Church
