

Group Eyes Strike End Possibility

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A proposal aimed at ending the five-week-old strike of the American Newspaper Guild against the morning Inquirer goes before the Guild membership today.

Negotiators for the Guild and the Inquirer agreed on the proposal yesterday after 10 days of subcommittee meetings, federal negotiators said.

Details of the proposal were not announced. Neither of the parties involved would comment.

Federal mediators released the following announcement: "Out of the subcommittee meetings held for the past 10 days, there has developed a proposal of a settlement of a strike by the Newspaper Guild of Greater Philadelphia against the Inquirer."

"This proposal will be presented to the membership Monday, July 7, at 2 p. m."

Robert Donahoe, chief federal mediator, later issued a statement amending the first announcement to read that the proposal would be "presented for the action of the membership."

If the Guild votes to accept the proposal and end the strike, normal distribution of the city's two major newspapers would be resumed.

The Inquirer Guild unit, representing some 700 editorial and clerical workers, struck the newspaper June 1 when its contract expired.

The dispute reportedly was over wages and a job security clause in the contract.

Truck drivers of the Inquirer and the evening Bulletin, who are members of Teamsters Local 628, have not resumed delivery of either paper.

Both Teamsters units went on strike Memorial Day, tying up distribution of the two Philadelphia papers.

The Teamsters ratified an agreement for a new contract with the two publishers June 26. But the Inquirer truckers agreed not to cross the Guild picket line. The Bulletin does not have a Guild unit.

Bulletin drivers were restored to the company payroll, but were ordered not to distribute papers. The publishers said the agreement provided that distribution would resume only when the truck drivers returned to work at both papers at the same time.

Meanwhile, both papers continue to publish daily and Sunday editions, selling them across the counters at their plants.

Former Labor Minister Wins Mexican Election In Vote

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Handsome, 48-year-old Adolfo Lopez Mateos, the brilliant labor minister in the last government, was elected president of Mexico yesterday in probably the quietest vote in the nation's history.

The dominant government Party of Revolutionary Institution (PRI) claimed Lopez Mateos had won by a landslide—somewhere between 70 and 85 per cent of the votes. No big totals were announced, however.

Lopez Mateos' victory over textile manufacturer Luis Hector Alvarez had never been in doubt. The PRI and its predecessors have never lost an election since the parent party was launched in 1928.

Mexico also elected a full new Congress of 60 senators and 162 deputies. The PRI claimed that it had retained control by an overwhelming majority.

There were prospects, however, the new Congress may contain more than the nine opposition deputies it now holds.

Only one serious incident was reported, during an argument over a local election in Ciudad Obregon, on the West Coast. A voter was killed and a soldier injured during a fight.

Women voted for the first time in a presidential election.

Opposition parties began filing protests of alleged election fraud before the polls closed. But generally the election seemed to have been conducted on democratic lines. The PRI had invited foreign observers from the United States and South America to come see for themselves.

Official returns will not be known for a week. Unofficial returns may be made known tomorrow.

Lopez Mateos will succeed President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines for a six-year term beginning next Dec. 1. He is considered a bit more liberal than his predecessor but is expected to continue most programs of the current administration, which selected him as its successor.

He is married, has a 15-year-old daughter, and made a brilliant reputation as labor minister, averting all major strikes during his six-year term.

Crash Survivors Tell Of Fighting Off Sharks After Plane Smashes Into Ocean

HONOLULU (AP)—Three survivors of the C124 Air Force transport plane which went down early Friday in mid-Pacific, returned here last night to tell of fighting off a school of sharks before they were rescued.

Nine were aboard the plane. One body was recovered and five others are missing and presumed drowned.

Returning here on the aircraft carrier Boxer, which picked up the three survivors 200 miles northeast of Johnston Island, Capt. Jonathan W. Brown, the plane's commander, told newsmen. "One of the sharks got a good hold on me and was shaking me."

"We were pounding the water and yelling and thrashing and kicking around. I was beating on the shark's head with my fist. He finally let go. There were several of them around and they swam away."

He said they apparently were put off somewhat by shark repellent from the men's lifejackets and by all the noise.

Returning with Brown were T. Sgt. James M. Phillips, Vacaville, Calif., and S. Sgt. James P. Vandere, San Rafael, Calif. Both were navigators on the big craft, which was on a flight from Travis Air Force Base in California to Tokyo with a crew of seven plus two military couriers picked up in Hawaii. Brown, who comes from Sioux City, Iowa, lives at Travis AFB, northeast of San Francisco.

Brown, Phillips and Vandere all had minor cuts, gasoline burns and stains from shark repellent. Brown had a minor shark bite on his left shoulder.

"They were taken to the Army's Tripler General Hospital for treatment."

Brown said the big Globemaster ditched 200 miles this side of Johnston Island after the No. 3 engine began backfiring and threw its propeller through the fuselage, cutting off all electric power and communications and crippling all controls except the rudder and elevator. He set her down at 120 knots but the right wing dipped and the plane broke up into sections.

"It went under immediately. I came up through a hole right above me," Brown said.

Vandere said he had gone to the rear of the plane to help other crew members and the two couriers into their lifejackets when the ship hit the water. He said he tried three times to get out of his section but each time was washed back by the waves. His shoulder was dislocated.

Fair Weather In West Seen

The nation's weather pattern showed only minor changes today, with cloudy skies and showers in wide areas east of the Rockies and generally fair in the Far West.

Stormy weather struck sections of Texas during the night. The main rain belt extended from the central and southern Plains states to the lower Great Lakes region. The San Antonio, Tex., area was drenched with heavy rain. Eight inches was reported at Devine, causing some flooding. More than 2½ inches doused San Antonio, with fairly heavy amounts in other parts of the state. Tornado winds lashed Dallas and Tyler.

Showers and thunderstorms were reported in broad areas from Texas and Oklahoma eastward across Arkansas and southern Missouri into the Ohio Valley. Rainfall at Pine Bluff, Ark., measured more than 2½ inches.

PHNOM PENH (AP)—Prince Norodom Sihanouk has canceled plans to visit South Viet Nam to negotiate on a series of recent border incidents, the Cambodian government announced today.

The move followed publication in Saigon of a newspaper article which said Cambodia was following a disorganized policy and it seemed foolish to send the man who made the policy to Saigon for negotiations. Sihanouk, the former king, is the dominant force in the country still.
