**AWARDS PROGRAM**  
**CHICAGO (Special)** — A new 4-H awards program open to boys and girls interested in raising meat animals has been arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, according to Norman C. Mindrum, director.

It is the national 4-H swine program, and is supported by the Moorman Manufacturing Company, Quincy, Illinois, makers of concentrate feeds and parasite control products for livestock and poultry.

The company will provide 400 lege scholarships to six national college scholarships to six national trips to the 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, and medals will be awarded to county winners.

"It gives us a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction to become the donor in connection with the national 4-H swine awards program," stated E. H. Wilson, president of Moorman.

"We consider it to be a splendid way by which we can help farm boys and girls gain a greater appreciation of — and to acquire a greater participation in the future of animal agriculture.

"It is our sincere hope that these awards will stimulate ever greater achievements from the fine

group of youngsters which make up the 4-H membership," Wilson said.

Although this new awards program has just recently been launched by the state extension staff, 4-H Club members enrolled now will be eligible to enter their records in competition for the 1958 awards. Detailed information may be obtained from the county agent.

A crowded five-day program featuring competition, exhibitions and entertainment was announced today in Susanville for the annual Lassen County Fair and Livestock Show on August 13-17.

The schedule includes a two-night horse show, two days of horse racing and rodeo competition, the second annual Northwest Loggers' Contest, and performances by nationally-known entertainers.

**YREKA** — According to the monthly bulletin "Siskiyou Leader - Gram," released from the farm adviser's office at Yreka, Siskiyou 4-H Club members have considerable activity outlined for them during the summer months.

The next club council meeting of 4-H is scheduled to be held on Friday night, July 18, 8 o'clock in the Minerals Building at the Siskiyou County Fairgrounds, south of Yreka on Highway 99.

Preparations for the participation of 4-H members in the coming county fair will be discussed. Ed

Mathews, fair manager, will speak briefly on preparing entry blanks correctly. Bill Ruddiman, farm adviser, will also give information about preparing good community club feature exhibits for fairs.

Also listed under coming events is the annual 4-H Livestock Judging Day on Sunday, July 13, at the Yreka Fairgrounds starting at 9:30 a.m.

There will be two classes each in beef, dairy, sheep and swine, with prizes to be awarded to the four high individuals in each class, and to the 4-H Club with the highest total score of three individuals. There will also be prizes for the adults who participate in the judging.

Another event listed in the bulletin is the Siskiyou County 4-H Dress Revue July 26 at 1:30 p.m. in the Yreka High School gymnasium. Preceding the Dress Revue there will be a judging of garment construction on Friday, July 25. Dorothy Duncan, state 4-H Club specialist, will be present to assist with the judging and the dress revue. She urges all clothing leaders to attend the judging sessions of Friday.

Judging of the girls for the dress revue awards will take place on Saturday morning on the stage of the new Yreka High gym. Contestants will be grouped by clubs for judging, and are requested to be ready at the time set for their clubs as follows: Greenhorn, 9:30; Granada, 9:40; Table Rock, 9:50; Willow Creek, 9:55; Big Springs, 10:05; Gazelle, 10:15; Edgewood, 10:25; Fort Jones, 10:30; Quartz Valley, 10:35; Etna, 10:45; Mount Shasta, 10:45; Dunsmuir, 11; and Butte Valley clubs, 11:10.
