Matinee Theater Sunk By Small Audience, Big Cost

NEW YORK (AP) — Matinee Theater sank quietly in the Sunday channels of daytime television at June's end, torpedoed by big expenses and small audiences. Somehow, it had managed to survive almost three years in spite of competition from quiz shows, musical shows and serials. It won wide critical acclaim, but for some time it has been unloved by NBC.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The box office TNT team of John Wayne and Howard Hawks may be the first to get a story film on the wide, wide screen.

Hawks is being independent about his plans. He favors the cinerama process, but declines to discuss the script with its backers. "If we want to use your process, we'll use it," he told them bluntly.

Hawks has been missing from the Hollywood scene since making "Land of the Pharaohs." It was a near-miss and soured Hawks on the movie business.
"I thought I would quit, and I did for a while," said the director of "Scarface," "Bringing Up Baby," "To Have and Have Not," "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" and other hits.
"But then I got bored and decided I might as well be doing what I know best."

Even cinerama, which made improvements on the three-image process, came forward with a travalgue for its first film, "Windjammer." The lack of a strong story disappointed many reviewers.

live hour-long live plays weekly. Its drooping ratings dampened sponsors' eagerness to help pay for the plays — even when they were Shakespeare.

In Matinee Theater's place have come two serials cast in the conventional mold of agony and much cheaper to produce.
Meanwhile, however, Matinee Theater is not beyond salvage. It has developed a hard core of such devoted viewers that Mrs. John Conte, wife of the actor who was host on the show, was moved to organize the non-profit Foundation for the Preservation of Matinee Theater. To date, thousands of viewers have contributed more than \$200,000 to get the show back on the air.

"And we would have much more if all our viewers knew about the Foundation," said Mrs. William Black, east coast chairman of the project. "We tried to buy spots on NBC asking viewers to contribute, but they wouldn't give us time."

Whether or not the foundation is successful, the idea of thousands of women earnestly attempting to keep alive an intelligent, entertaining television show is stimulating and pleasant.
Obviously NBC could not be expected to continue to drop a million dollars a year on a TV show, no matter how widely it was praised or beloved. Apparently it could survive only if moved to TV's prime service time — Sunday afternoon — which has become increasingly egghead and increasingly lacking in sponsors.

Reds Register Finnish Gain

HELSINKI, Finland (AP) — The Communists made the biggest gains in Finland's general elections but communist parties and today there was no change in their fortunes and the red government.
In the Helsinki Sunday and Tuesday elections the Reds and the United Front won 47 of the 100 seats in the single-chamber Parliament, a gain of seven from the Communist-led coalition of last year's election.

The Reds' lesser vote of 20 seats in a total of 100 seats was a surprise. The party had 15 seats in the 1954 election. The Social Democrats had 43 seats, the Conservatives 28 seats, the Agrarian party 14 seats, the Swedish Minority party 14 seats, the Finnish People's party 7 seats, and the Independent party last year for joining an Agrarian cabinet, 3 seats on 39,476 votes.

MINISTER RESIGNS

SANTIAGO, Chile (UPI) — Luis Octavio Reyes resigned as minister of justice Monday in protest against government support of a leftist movement to repeal the so-called law for the defense of the democracy.
Repeal of the law, which was drafted by a committee that included Reyes 10 years ago, would make it possible to grant legal status to the Communist Party in Chile.
