New Television Program Claims 6th Sense Needed

NEW YORK (AP)—The summer has brought a deluge of television games.

Now comes a program that claims a sixth sense is a necessity.

It's the new ESP (for Extra-Sensory Perception) Show, which bows tomorrow night on ABC-TV. It will pit people with high degrees of purported ESP against one another in matches to see which contestant (while blindfolded) can most often properly identify unseen cards and symbols, and call the roll of dice.

There will be the usual isolation booth, and the weekly winner will earn cash and the chance to continue on the show until defeated by someone with either greater mysterious powers or more luck.

Each week five cards will be pulled from a 52-card deck and displayed face down. Home viewers can write in what they think the cards were, in the order they were pulled.

If they get everything right they win \$100,000.

Although program-creator George Wolf is a firm believer in ESP, he doesn't expect to have a home audience winner every week.

How will studio contestants be selected?

"Leading parapsychologists in the country have recommended outstanding subjects to us," said Wolf, "and several persons who have heard about the program have volunteered to be tested. We are screening them with one of the most simple of ESP devices—

cards—ace through king with no suit—are shuffled, and three of them are picked at random and placed face up on a table. The subject then says what he thinks the three cards are, but is not required to give them in any particular order. This is done six times, which means a subject can correctly name a maximum of 18 cards. To insure against a subject's being lucky on one day—or having a bad day because of something he ate for lunch—this time test is repeated on six different days. Those who score the highest on this test will be our contestants."

Tests and experiments given on the program have been formulated by Dr. J. B. Rhine, director of the Duke University parapsychology laboratory. Dr. Carroll Nash, who holds a similar position at St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia, will be present at each program as consultant. Actor Vincent Price will be master of ceremonies.

Society Gal Plans To Show World Her Acting Ability

It terms of career, Dina (pronounced Deen-uh) Merrill migrated from modeling for slick fashion magazines to little theater to Broadway to television and finally to the movies, aided and abetted not only with that ambition for acting but also with a patrician beauty. She is tall, blonde and has a stunning figure.

"I've wanted to be an actress since I was in the first grade. I guess, if I live to be 90 I'll still feel the same way.
