County To Take More Roadways

The county will take over 67 roads of various lengths on the Klamath Reservation August 13, under provisions of the Klamath Termination Act.

Glenn Smith, Indian Bureau engineer, is now preparing right of way descriptions for the roads and will submit them to County Clerk Charles DeLap.

They will be recorded so the county can officially take title to the roads.

The thoroughfares run through both tribal owned land and Indian allotted homesteads. Taking title means the county will be responsible for maintaining the roads.
