

No Such Place --

Challenger Comes From 'Community'

CUT AND SHOOT. Tex. (AP)—Honest, boss, there is such a place. No post office. No name on the map. Just a "community" of 195 on the edge of the "big thicket." And they're not kidding about that thicket.

Roy Harris, the schoolteacher who is challenging Floyd Patterson for the world heavyweight boxing title Aug. 18 at Los Angeles, lives here with members of the Harris clan. The place is over run with razorback hogs, stray cattle, chickens and lonesome hound dogs.

When you speak of the Harris home, you really are talking about two or three homes. Henry, that's Roy's father, lives with his wife

and five of the eight children in a unique double house. It's a log cabin with a frame house dragged up next to it and doors cut in between.

The third house belongs to Roy and his wife. It is only about 100 yards away but it is the difference between a log cabin and a log cabin. Roy lives in a white frame house with a TV aerial slanting off the roof and a Cadillac (1951 model) parked out front.

The population of Cut and Shoot shot up to about 2,000 yesterday when Roy boxed two rounds in the home-made outdoor gym that is connected to the tin-roofed Henry Harris home by a string of

colored lights. They didn't know it but this was Roy's last training session at home. Lou Viscusio, who advises Pop Harris, moved the fighter to Camp Holden, about 21 miles from Houston.

You never saw anything like this outdoor gym that the Harris boys built. The 2,000 jammed the premises, started traffic on the one-lane dirt road and nobody paid a dime. Admission was free. The good folks of this friendly section even gave away free cold drinks courtesy of the nearby Conroe bank.

Those who never had seen Harris watched closely as he boxed two rounds with a Los Angeles

gentleman named Sonny Moore. Roy had been suffering from a heavy cold so he didn't overexert himself.

Boxing writers were impressed by Harris' sturdy legs and his fast reflexes. They liked his jab and hook to the body but thought he looked a bit awkward in his right-hand leads. Really, you could not tell much except that the 25-year-old 190-pounder is in good shape.

Roy described his style as a counterpuncher. His all-winning record in 22 bouts includes only nine knockouts. "I just believe I am as ready for him (Patterson) as anybody else," he said.

As Cut And Shoot

Giants Stranded By Purkey

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—If there's a special method for throwing goose eggs at the Giants, Bob Purkey says he doesn't know what it is although he's been splattering them since 1936 in New York and now in San Francisco.

The 28-year-old right-handed Cincinnati pitcher blanked the San Francisco 49ers last night, marking up his 42nd straight scoreless inning against them. "I don't pitch any different against them than I do against the other teams," the 6-foot 2 hurler declared. "If there's anything psychological it's with them and not with me. It was just luck that when they hit the ball hard it was right to somebody."

Deal to Cincinnati in a trade with Pittsburgh that gave the Pirates relief hurler Don Gross, big Bob has won 10 already this season against 5 setbacks. Asked if he were aiming at winning 20 games for the Redlegs, Purkey replied, "I'm aiming at winning just as many games as I can this season. I'm not worrying about 20 but that's the pitcher's usual goal."

With the Pirates in his home town of Pittsburgh last year, Bob won 11 while losing 14, appearing both as a starter and relief hurler. This season he gets strictly starting duty and he's happier than he was back home.

"This is the first season I've pitched regularly and we've a great defensive club," he declares. "I'm primarily a sinker ball pitcher and the fielders take care of me. You noticed how many balls were hit on the ground last night."

"This club showed me it could use me and that's given me a lot of confidence. Last year I might start one day and relieve the next three. That I didn't like."

Pressed again for some reason why he has been so successful against the Giants since last giving up a run to them on May 7, 1953, Purkey again replied:

"There's no reason I know. They can bust loose any time. Tonight Willie Mays lined a shot but it was right at Alex Grammas, our shortstop. Bob Schmidt hit one hard but right at Don Hoak. That's why I say I'm lucky."

While the Giants couldn't score, the Redlegs started with Frank Robinson's homer and added three more along the way.

San Francisco Manager Bill Rigney, whose club dropped 11 1/2 games behind pace-setting Milwaukee with the setback, appeared even more befuddled. "He pitches like Alexander the Great against us," the Giants manager commented. "I don't know what he's got, but he does a great job against us. We can't win without scoring a run and this guy is real tough here."

This was Purkey's second shut-out of the year against the Giants. The other one was June 9 by 3-0. Only two others have shut out the hard hitting San Francisco since 1915, Roman Semproch for Philadelphia May 1 and Carl Willey for Milwaukee June 23.

In the Henley-Eastside contest, the Sporting Goods club drew first blood and their only tally as Mike Tachini, rightfield, poked the only Henley hit, a double that scored leadoff man Steve Reiling, who had gotten aboard via a base-on-balls.

The Dodgers got their share of base hits off Burdette, touching him for 11 safeties. But their hits were not enough to make up for Burdette's live RBI's and the home run by Felix Mantilla.

"Podres threw me a high curve that hung over the plate and I swung, that's all there was to that big homer," Burdette grinned after the game. "I picked off one of Ed Roebuck's fast balls for the other homer. I was glad to get those two big hits because the Dodgers were hitting me enough to worry me."

By his feat, Burdette became the only active pitcher in the National League with a grand slam homer to his credit. Prior to Thursday, he had hit only two home runs in his entire major league career. He got both of those in a single game last year against Cincinnati.

Manager Walt Alston, looking ahead to the Cincinnati series, said he hoped to pitch Fred Kipp against the Redlegs Saturday but was uncertain of his Sunday hurler.
