Lewiston, by virtue of a double win over Salem Thursday night, climbed into a first place tie with Wenatchee in the Northwest League's second half pennant chase.

While Wenatchee's Chiefs were clawing Yakima, 7-4, to sweep the three-game series, the Broncs romped over the Senators, 6-2, and 2-1.

Eugene and Tri-City split a doubleheader, the Emeralds taking the first game, 6-5, and losing the second, 6-5.

Lewiston's victories dumped Salem, the seasons first half cellar club, into the basement again.

Bernie Sadler throttled the Senators with three hits in the first game to earn his 10th win. Lewiston coupled runs in the first and fourth innings and picked up singles in the third and fifth.

Salem's Cal Bauer homered with one on in the first frame for the Senators two runs.

The nightcap was won in the third stanza when Arnie Hallgren tripled home what proved to be the winning run. Thornton Kipper scattered eight hits to win his 13th.
