In the last first set, the Americans broke Bedard's service in the second game and Fontana's delivery in the fourth for an easy victory.

MacKay's service was broken twice, once in the first set and again in the second. The Canadians got through Giammalva's delivery in the third set. The Americans made seven service breaks.

The decisive break in the long second set came in the 23rd game on Bedard's service. With the score at 1-1, MacKay's placement and Fontana's drive over the baseline gave the Yanks the game and a 12-11 lead. They then held service for the set.

In the 10th and 18th games the Canadians were two points from taking the set and they were only one point away in the 20th game on MacKay's delivery. But they muffed the opportunities.

Fontana cracked in the final set. MacKay and Giammalva broke through him twice to clinch the match and series.

"Is Minor-League Baseball Doomed?"
