

# GOP Party Plans Meet

A delegation of Republican party workers and officials from Klamath County will participate in a two-day, statewide meeting in Salem Friday and Saturday, July 18 and 19, sponsored by the GOP State Central Committee.

State Chairman James F. Short, said activities will open with a buffet banquet at 6:30 p.m. Friday July 18 at the Marion Hotel.

Scheduled to speak at that gathering will be three Republican candidates for Congress. Included will be: Paul Geddes, Roseburg, fourth district; John Johnston, Portland, third district; and Marion Weatherford, Arlington, second district.

Short said this trio will be joined by first district Rep. Walter Norblad if he can make necessary schedule adjustments.

That banquet and all subsequent meetings will be open to all Republicans.

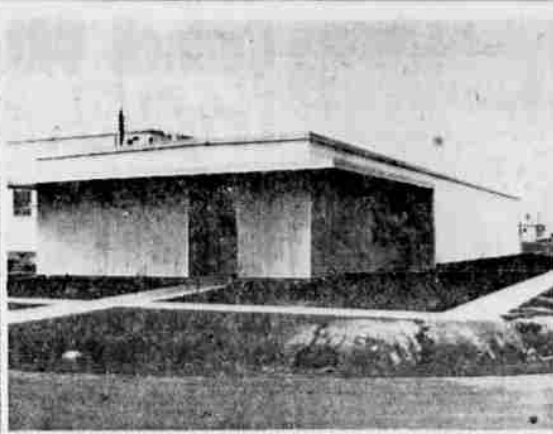
Major item of business will be election of State Central Committee officers at a business meeting slated to open at 10 a.m. Saturday in the Marion.

Meetings of statewide committees on policy and action and candidate's assistance chairmanship by Robert Mix, Corvallis, and John Merrifield, Portland, will be held following the Friday banquet.

On Saturday, a 7:30 a.m. breakfast meeting of county finance chairmen has been scheduled by State Treasurer Otto Wilson, Salem.

Also slated will be breakfast gatherings of county chairmen from each of the congressional districts at which congressional district officers will be elected. Geddes, Johnston, Weatherford and Rep. Norblad have been invited to appear at these meetings.

Short said invitations to sit in on all sessions have been extended to all interested Republicans, affiliated clubs and GOP candidates on the state and county level. All meetings will be in the Marion Hotel.

# China Reds Exert Pressure On Soviets, Observers Say

Many Western students of Communist affairs believe Red China's leadership is exerting intense pressure on the Soviet Union and other Communist countries for a tough line at home and abroad. Peiping has been much more bitter in its denunciations of Tito than the Kremlin.

The tough-policy approach likely arises from an acute internal situation in China—a situation that threatens to grow worse.

Communist China is undertaking a gigantic economic buildup in a bid to become one of the leading industrial powers. It is doing this with little margin for maneuvering economically. The immense population of China swells year by year against an ever scarce food supply.

For their industrialization program the Chinese Communists can count on help from the Soviet Union and other Communist countries. This is vital but it is not enough.

To carry it through Peiping is going to have to impose on the Chinese people enormous hardship and suffering comparable with that imposed in the Soviet Union in the 30s.

In particular it will be necessary to squeeze the peasantry. Probably this kind of an operation can only be carried out by imposition of terror such as Stalin ordered in the Soviet Union. To justify this sort of terror it will be necessary for Peiping to create a foreign enemy just as Stalin did.

The Chinese Communist leaders probably feel that they must also get other countries of the Communist bloc to present a monolithic face.

# School Sets Appeal Move

**SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)** — The Dunsuir High School District has appealed to the California Supreme Court from a \$206,804 judgment awarded a pupil who was injured playing football.

Anthony L. Welch, who was paralyzed by the injury in 1955, originally received a \$325,000 award, but it was reduced by Superior Judge Richard B. Eaton, Siskiyou County District Attorney Floyd Merrill took the case to the state high court Monday on the grounds that errors were made in the trial. He said the judge erred in prohibiting evidence on whether the school's responsibility ended when Welch's physician took charge.

The appeal also questioned the selection of a juror who was the wife of a recent client of Welch's attorney.

# 6 Prisoners Escape Jail

**PENDELTON, Ore. (AP)** — Twenty city jail prisoners spurned a chance to escape Monday, but six others took advantage of the opportunity.

Officer Richard Kinne said the six managed to saw off a lock on an outside door leading from a hallway exercise area. They hid the hacksaw marks before the break by smearing the lock with chewing gum and dirt.

Kinne identified the six as: William Sanford Williamson, 31, awaiting trial on a charge of disorderly conduct; Fred Newtonson, 37, serving time on a drunkenness conviction; Joe Martinez Rico, 34, convicted vagrant; Lee Totus, 23, convicted of drunk and disorderly conduct; Willard George Naeagos, 28, convicted of drunkenness, and James E. Webb, 21, convicted of driving while drunk and resisting arrest.

Warrants were issued on the additional charges of escape from jail.
