# Five Kubs On All-Star Club

## Locals Selected For Game

Five members of the Klamath Falls Kubs were picked to play in the annual Northern California League all-star game to be played at Dunsmuir July 27 and manager Irv Whitt was picked to guide the South against the North giving the local semi-pro club a total of six players.

The all-star balloting was done Monday night at a league meeting held at Weed. The league managers picked the two 14-player all-star teams.

Klamath players named to the South squad were outfielders Donn Taucher and Floyd Linderman, pitcher Dave D'Olivo, shortstop Dorm Martin and utility infielder Ron Conner.

Besides the five Klamath players named, five others were picked from Mount Shasta's third place Seals and four others from the local Dunsmuir nine.

Mount Shasta players picked were catcher Dick Berensen, pitcher Bob Lawary, first baseman Mickey Risberg, third baseman Gene English and outfielder Rolfe Brooks. Dunsmuir players named included catcher John Mazzie, second baseman Peter Anderson, pitcher Larry Moulton and utility outfielder Gary Hisey.

John Carroll, Mount Shasta manager, was named to the South team as coach, assisting Whitt.

The North all-stars, managed by John Hitchcock and coached by Jack Bencke, both of Yreka, will be headed by five players from Yreka and Weed and four from Scott Valley.

Yreka's contribution to the North are pitcher George Zander, first baseman Lee Templeton, shortstop Willie Jones, outfielder Jim Kutzer and utility outfielder Lew Fawcett. Weed stars selected were pitcher Gene Hilliard, catcher Eli Brown, second baseman Vince Talarico, utility infielder Ray Brown and outfielder Raul Perez. Scott Valley's four stars were pitcher Bob Martin, catcher Rod Vinnal, outfielder Dale Evans and third baseman Ed Fisher.

Although the North team is bolstered by Yreka and Weed, both tied for the Northern Cal lead, the South all-stars should give a very good account of themselves. The South's pitching forces of D'Olivo, Lawary and Moulton has a slight edge over the North's threesome.

This Sunday, all of the league teams warm up for the all-star battle with a round of three league games. Klamath Falls hosts Dunsmuir in a big Sunday afternoon ball game at Gem Stadium. Yreka hosts last-place Scott Valley and Weed meets Mount Shasta in a crucial NCL game that is important to the league's final standings, just a month away.

Saturday night at Gem, Klamath hosts the touring Cuban Giants in an exhibition game.

## Legion Playoff Dates Announced

## Race Not Over Say Managers

Even the last-place Los Angeles Dodgers still talk about winning the National League pennant in the wild race that had only a six-game span from top to bottom today.

Nobody will admit he can't win it. Optimism bubbles from the mouth of every manager in the league. It seems all eight expect the second half of the season to be better than the first. A Cincinnati spy insists Warren Giles, the league president, is drawing up plans for an eight-game playoff.

Perhaps Danny Murtaugh of Pittsburgh said it best: "There isn't a hot pin long enough for me to risk picking a winner."

Walter Alston, Los Angeles manager, called in General Manager E. J. (Buz) Bavasi to issue a joint statement when The Associated Press asked for the Dodger views.

"In a race as close as this," he said, "this is no time for panic even when you are in eighth place. We have had more than our usual share of injuries... We also have had several men in unusual slumps. We have every reason to believe we will have a brighter second half of the season and we have confidence we can still finish on top."

Other comments: Bill Rigney of second-place San Francisco: "We have Willie Mays and our rookies have been doing a great job. If they continue to carry the load, we could go all the way."

Fred Haney of the front-running Milwaukee Braves: "Sure I think we'll win. Whoever wins it has to beat us and I don't think there's another club that can do that."

General Manager Bing Devine of St. Louis: "Every club has a chance and we're certainly in it."

General Manager Roy Hamey of the Phillies: "We will go as far as our pitching will take us. We certainly can win it all."

Birdie Tebbets of Cincinnati: "I think the pitching staff is good enough to get us to 500. What we get over 500 will be contributed by the hitters."

Bob Scheffing of the surprising Chicago Cubs: "We'll do better the second half."

## Board Gives Giants Okay

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants got past the final barrier in their fight for a home Monday when the Board of Supervisors voted to build a new stadium at Candlestick Point.

By a vote of 8-2, the supervisors gave their approval to all the legislation necessary to get construction underway, including an okay of leases and of a five-million-dollar city bond issue for buying the Candlestick Point property.

When finished, the new stadium will be approximately five miles from the center of town and will seat at least 45,000 persons, 22,000 more than Seals Stadium, where the Giants now play.

INDIANAPOLIS—Alex Olmedo, Lima, Peru, upset two-time champion Bernard Barzen, Dallas, 1-6, 8-6, 6-0 and won the men's singles title in the Western Amateur. The women's crown went to Susan Hodgman, Kalamazoo, Mich., 6-3, 6-0 over Marilyn Montgomery, San Antonio.

CHICAGO—Whitney Beed, Alameda, Calif., defeated Gordon Fleming, Flint, Mich., 6-0, 8-6 and moved into the third round of the National Clay Court Tournament.

## Kubs Host Cuban Giants

The heady and humorous Cuban Giants, traveling colored baseball team, will meet the Klamath Falls Kubs at Gem Stadium Saturday night starting at 8 o'clock in one game of the Giants' Pacific Northwest 1958 tour.

Manager Irv Whitt announced this week that he has been notified by Oscar Rico, manager of the Cuban nine, he has one of the finest teams ever to play under the Giants name in the last several years. The Cubans are nationally known for their baseball ability and have always been a top drawer wherever they play.

Rico has picked the best players to be found to make this tour of the states—under the supervision of the United States Department of Justice and Naturalization. Heading the list of Cuban ballplayers is pitcher Jose Quintero and catcher "Campanella" Mirer. Mirer is called the "Babe Ruth of Cuban Baseball." Mirer has an average of at least one home run in every game, and there have been games when the Latin American hero has homers three and four times.

The Giants have had several big leaguers on their rosters in past seasons. Some of these include Camillo Pascual and Mike Fornieles of Washington, Orestes (Minnie) Minoso of Cleveland, Willie Miranda of Kansas City, former Dodger Sandy Amoros and Romo Mejias of Pittsburgh.

This is the first traveling team to meet the Kubs this year. Whitt said the team's board of directors are looking over a few other possibilities later in the season, depending on how the local fans turnout for the Cuban Giants.

The New York Yankees aren't looking to coast into the World Series, they're aiming to fly by a record 20-game margin.

They didn't decide on that figure arbitrarily, either. If they can make it, they will shatter their own record of 1 1/2 games by which they won the 1936 American League pennant.

This bit of side-play is perfectly all right with Casey Stengel, who wouldn't mind being remembered as the Yankee manager who captured a pennant by the biggest margin in his history. Right now, the distinction belongs to Joe McCarthy, who led the 1936 Yankees.

The runaway Yankees increased their lead to 13 games—largest margin of the season—with a 3-0 victory over the Chicago White Sox Monday night.

Southpaw Whitey Ford breezed to his 11th victory while giving up only three hits and walking none. He got the only run he really needed when Hank Bauer led off the first inning with his ninth homer off loser Early Wynn. Mickey Mantle slammed his 23rd homer in the seventh to help Ford run his lifetime record to 24-8 over the White Sox.
