MRS. GEORGE R. HURN observed the 76th anniversary of her arrival in Klamath Falls Monday. She was not quite 12 years of age when her father, W. B. (Bing) Grubb, brought his wife and family to this area from Ashland. They arrived on July 14, 1882, in a team-drawn wagon, having come over Dead Indian Road. The family settled near Hoquin Springs, two miles southwest of Swan Lake, where they were among the earliest settlers.

Fire Water, Fire Victim, Final Rites

ST. LOUIS (AP)—More than 1,000 bottles of liquor and wine, caught in a warehouse flood recently, will get a private burial at a secret location next week. Some of the labels were washed away. It's illegal to replace them so the Pure Food and Drug Administration, fearful that the goods may have been contaminated, obtained a court order authorizing destruction of the spirits. A bulldozer operator, equipped with a gas mask so the fumes won't bother him, will smash the bottles before the burial. "I'd rather not say where we are going to bury it," said Roy Klorgan, a deputy federal marshal. "We want this to be a private funeral without too many mourners."

U.S. Commie Chief Blasts Ike in Wire

NEW YORK (AP)—Eugene Dennis, national secretary of the Communist party, has told President Eisenhower that his dispatch of troops in Lebanon was "an act of aggressive imperialistic intervention." In a telegram to the President yesterday, signed on behalf of the National Committee of the Communist party, Dennis called for immediate withdrawal of the U.S. forces.
