

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

Last Friday and Saturday, the Oregon State Game Commission took a step that brings closer harmony between the hunter and game management when it introduced its unit hunt plan for the coming deer season.

The unit system may not solve all the problems voiced against the commission's recent either sex or doe hunts, but one thing is sure: This new system comes the closest to solving the gripes and complaints, and as usual in cases like this, the game commission was the side that presented this compromise program and not the sportsmen who have been complaining.

The big factor that gives us the most satisfaction is that no longer can John Doe go hunting and fill his tag then return home and buy licenses for every member of his family and return during the old either sex hunts and down a doe for each tag.

The commission has divided the state into 60 different herd ranges and is issuing between 200 and 10,000 special tags for each range at no cost. A public drawing for each unit will be held shortly after August 18, the deadline for applications to reach to commission offices in Portland.

Those who draw a unit permit to shoot an antlerless deer following the regular season (tentatively set for October 4 to October 26) may do so only if they are not successful in killing a buck during regular season.

Those who are not able to obtain an antlerless deer hunting permit must either get their buck, apply for one of seven specially controlled season tags which are separate from the unit plans, or go without venison.

The four units that are of chief interest in this section of the state are the Greensprings, Klamath, Interstate and Warner. Greensprings has been allotted 500 permits; Klamath 1,000; Interstate 2,500; and Warner 800.

Rough boundary lines for these areas are: Northwest of Klamath Falls running along the Lake of the Woods Highway to Medford. From Medford south on Highway 99 to the California border and east to Highway 97, then north to Klamath Falls.

Klamath: From Klamath Falls north on Highway 97 to the southwestern corner of the Klamath Indian Reservation line, then west to Highway 66 near Bly. From this point south on the Gerber Ranch Road and follows Lost River to the California border. Then west to Highway 97 and back north to Klamath Falls. This area includes Swan Lake and Bly Mountain.

Interstate: Lies directly east of Klamath unit and runs just north of Paisley and back down to the western edge of Lakeview to the California border. This area includes Quartz Mountain and the State Line Road section.

Warner: North from the California border on Highway 395 to the XI Ranch road just north of Abert Lake. Then southeast on the Jug Mountain road to the Pleasant Burns highway. South through Plush and Adel to the California line.

The Hart Mountain unit is not open this year and there will be no permits allowed.

Bob Holloway, chief of the game commission's information and education staff said Wednesday that maps showing the exact boundaries will be distributed to all license agents by July 21 so hunters seeking unit permits can select their deer hunting spots early. At the same time, hunters may make application for their special permits as well as the elk, antelope and controlled deer seasons.

Chicago Cubs Nip NL Leaders' Heels

Braves Maintain Position

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Who's going to crack first in the National League race? While three of the so-called contenders fade away, Milwaukee and San Francisco are stepping along just half a game apart, and the suddenly competitive Chicago Cubs are at their heels.

The Braves kept that half-game edge with a 6-5 decision at St. Louis last night after blowing a 4-0 lead. Just .008 percentage points behind are the Giants, who whipped Philadelphia's fizzling Phillies 9-2.

The Cubs kept their third-place perch, 2 1/2 games behind Milwaukee, by running up a five-game streak for the first time this season, sweeping their second doubleheader in four days with comebacks 5-4 and 7-5 decisions over Cincinnati.

That gave the Redlegs a seven-game losing string, and they escaped the cellar only because of Pittsburgh's 7-4 victory over Los Angeles.

In the American League first-place New York defeated Detroit 5-2. Second-place Boston, 12 games behind, beat Kansas City 5-2. Baltimore split a two-night pair with Chicago, winning 6-5 after a 6-1 White Sox victory. And Washington clipped Cleveland 7-6 as Roy Sievers' second two-run homer of the game capped a four-run ninth.

Solo homers by Hank Aaron and Eddie Mathews, who hit a pair, gave it to the Braves in the fifth against reliever Chuck Stobbs (0-2). Mathews' first homer and Billy Bruton's first of the season helped Warren Spahn to a 4-0 lead, but the Cardinals took over with a five-run third capped by Ken Boyer's grand slam.

Spahn, now 11-6, needed more help after the fifth. He got it from reliever Don MacMahon, who came on with the bases loaded in the eighth, and left fielder Andy Patko, who made a diving catch of Don Blasingame long liner to end the eighth.

The Mick Narrows 4-Ply Gap

There's only a four-homer gap between Boston's Jackie Jensen, the leader with 27, and defending champ Roy Sievers of Washington and early leader Bob Cerv of Kansas City, tied with 22. Mickey Mantle of New York, the hottest of 'em all, is in between with 24.

Cerv, banged up with a broken jaw, broken toe and bruised hand of late, led the pact with 14 at the end of May, but has hit only 9 since. Jensen has hit 18 since May, taking the lead with 14 in June. Mantle has hit 20 since May, swatting 10 in 18 games this month. Sievers has hit 16 since May 5, this month and 3 in two days to overhaul Cerv.

Sievers, who led with 42 last season, ripped a pair of two-run shots last night, the second a two-out drive that capped a four-run ninth as the Senators beat Cleveland 7-6.

Turley won his 14th on a three-run, fourth-inning homer by Jerry Lumpe. Jim Bunning beat Turley in a strikeout duel but lost his sixth. He fanned 10.

Turley, who gave up a two-run homer to Frank Rolling in the second inning, struck out nine and became the first AL pitcher to top 100. He has 106.
