

Crisis Certain To Start Anti-Imperialist Feeling

The Middle Eastern crisis seems sure to start a serious wave of "anti-imperialist" feeling in the newly freed countries of Asia and Africa.

In "neutralist" India and Indonesia, in Tunisia and Morocco, and in many other countries denunciation of the American troop landings in Lebanon is likely to be bitter.

Correspondingly, President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic is likely to be hailed as a hero who is a leader in the great surge of nationalism in one-time colonial countries.

Soviet Russia, which is loud in support of nationalist movements—except, of course, in the Soviet Union—is likely to profit considerably.

And ironically, the United States, which for years has supported the nationalist movement even against its own allies, will

be the chief target for criticism. President Eisenhower acted in an emergency at the specific and urgent request of the government of Lebanon, the most loyal ally of Western the Arab countries. But this fact is most unlikely to be taken into account by critics.

Nationalist spirit has become one of the great forces of the world.

This spirit has swept Asia and Africa and is spreading in British and Western Hemisphere possessions.

Nationalism was strong in a few of the countries before World War II—in Korea, then a possession of Japan, and in India, for example.

It was nationalist spirit that started the rebellions in Indochina and Indonesia and Algeria.

Nationalist spirit compelled France to give up Syria and Lebanon. Nationalist spirit led to the overthrow of King Farouk of Egypt and to the emergence of Nasser as the biggest Arab leader.

It is nationalism that has caused the formation of the so-called Asian-African bloc of countries in which "neutralist" and "anti-imperialist" are so often mentioned.

It is interesting to note that while Russia loses no opportunity to promote nationalist spirit all over the world, it is the world's leading anti-nationalist country within its own confines.

The nationalism of President Tito of Yugoslavia has made him a bitter enemy of the Kremlin.

A good part of the present Russian trend back to the harsh rule of the Josef Stalin era is due to fear of nationalism in the Communist satellite countries and in the Soviet Union itself.

It was because of nationalist spirit in Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia that Russia has deported hundreds of thousands of people of those Baltic republics which it absorbed.

It is because of nationalist spirit in some Soviet republics that vast numbers of their people have been deported to other areas.

But the newly freed countries will not take things like this into account. To them the imperialists are the Western democracies, whose objective in the cold war is to keep Communism from enslaving the world.

Graham Sees World Doom

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Evangelist Billy Graham believes the doom of the world will come in the Middle East where life first began at the junction of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers.

The handsome minister, whose oratory has swayed millions in rallies around the world, turned to the Bible Wednesday in discussing the shape of events in the strife-torn Middle East.

"We're seeing a shuffling on the stage for the last great drama of history," Graham said. "All we can do is sit back and pray."

"The Bible teaches us that history began in the Middle East—in Iraq at the junction of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers—and the Bible teaches us that history will end in the Middle East; that the last great war will be there and that Israel will be in its center."

The minister will hold a rally at East Los Angeles Junior College Friday night. His topic: "The End of the World."

Paying For Vicuna Coat Worse Than Buying It

WASHINGTON, (UPI)—There is one thing worse than having to buy your own vicuna coat. That's paying for vicuna and not getting it.

The Federal Trade Commission has a staff of 25 full-time sleuths whose job is to see that you do not get gypped when you buy a fancy wool or fur garment.

It was these FTC detectives who lodged mis-labeling complaints against Bernard Goldfine's mills, and sent Goldfine in search of his friend Sherman Adams.

Policing the wool and fur trades is quite a task for 25 men. It involves keeping a beady eye on the quality, price, labeling and advertising practices of some 65,000 manufacturers and 300,000 distributors.

The FTC men have been unusually busy lately. During the 1958 fiscal year, which ended June 30, they tagged 77 firms with formal complaints for violating the Fur Products Labeling Act. They filed 36 formal complaints for deceptive label or pricing of wool. About 90 more cases are now pending.

WARNINGS ISSUED
Formal complaints are issued only in serious cases. The FTC tries to handle minor or unintentional infractions by issuing an informal warning to the offender and obtaining his written assurance that he'll toe the line hereafter. About 2,500 cases were handled this way during the past 12 months.
