

U.S. Naval Forces Aided

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States Navy bolstered the naval forces in Lebanon waters Thursday with two aircraft carriers, a heavy cruiser and 16 more destroyers.

This largest single group of warships to reach the Lebanon area carried Vice Adm. C. R. Brown, commander of the 6th Fleet, in his flagship Des Moines.

The flagship cruiser was accompanied by the aircraft carrier Saratoga, the heavy attack carrier Wasp, and a division of destroyers.

In addition to the 6th Fleet commander, the new force included two other admirals, Rear Adm. G. W. Anderson, commander of Carrier Division 6, and Rear Adm. Edward A. Hannegan, commander of Carrier Division 14.

The arrival of this heavy force brought the total number of 6th Fleet vessels in the immediate Beirut area to 44.

The 6th Fleet is the naval arm of the combined Middle East force led by Adm. James L. Holloway, U.S. commander in chief for forces from all branches in the entire area.

The Navy move came as the United States readied more Marine forces for the Middle East and airborne army troops, pulled from the NATO line in Germany, reached an advanced staging area in friendly Turkey.

Jilty Complex; Cities Fail To See Eye To Eye

NAGOYA, Japan (AP)—Nagoya jilted Portland and then got a crush on Los Angeles only to find L.A. reluctant to get engaged. So now Nagoya is making eyes at Germany.

That's the story being told of Nagoya's search for happiness in transpacific friendship arrangements being made between pairs of Japanese and American cities.

Already, Osaka and San Francisco are going steady; Nagasaki is engaged to St. Paul; Kobe has Seattle; Okayama, San Jose, Calif.; Kyoto, Boston; Tateyama, Bellingham, Wash.; Yokohama, San Diego; Senadai, Riverside, Calif.; Mishima, Pasadena; and Kofu, Des Moines.

All Nagoya has so far is frustration, according to the newspaper Yomiuri.

Portland, Ore., proposed affiliating last fall, but Nagoya decided it would be a bad match because Nagoya has one million more people than Portland's 400,000.

Negotiations were under way with Los Angeles. But the Far East section of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce wrote recently that L.A. wants to stay equally friendly with all cities.

So Mayor Kissen Kobayashi's reported looking elsewhere.

Under study is a proposal from the German consulate that Nagoya affiliate with a still-unnamed German city. But any day, Nagoya might decide to woo Detroit, Nagoya, because of its automotive industries, is called the "Detroit of Japan."

Leave Syria, Tourists Told

DAMASCUS (AP)—The U. S. Consulate in Damascus has urged all American tourists in the Syrian capital to get out of the Middle East.

They were also warned to avoid crowds.

There was no perceptible evidence in Damascus of any ill-feeling toward individual Americans, but newspapers and the government radio have been bitterly criticizing what they call "the flagrant aggression" of the United States in neighboring Lebanon.

About 75 Americans live in Damascus. Most of them are diplomats and businessmen and their families.

Meanwhile, loudspeakers throughout Damascus called on members of the civil defense corps to be ready to go to their stations if the sirens sounded an air raid alert. Many members of the home guard, alerted Wednesday, walked about carrying submachine guns. Otherwise there was no sign of anything out of the ordinary.

Parents Ball, Chain Boy, 12

MONTEREY, Calif. (AP)—A mother and elderly stepfather who said a ball and chain hung around her 12-year-old son's neck worked wonders in making him behave, pleaded guilty of unjustified punishment of a child.

Municipal Judge Ray Baugh set a probation hearing for Aug. 4 for Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Guthrie. Unable to post \$100 bail, they were jailed.

Guthrie, 72, told officers they locked the 24-pound ball and four-foot chain around the neck of William Gerald Jones "so we could keep an eye on him." Mrs. Myrtle Jones Guthrie, 45, said William had been pretty bad.

Information Agency Starts Broadcasts

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States Information Agency has started broadcasting news in English to the Middle East and Europe around the clock.

Director George V. Allen said the Voice of America, starting every hour on the hour, will broadcast 15 minutes of news reports and 15 minutes of news analysis, recordings of statements by U. S. and U. N. officials and editorial comment.

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Congress Sources Believe New Public Hearing Due

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressional sources said today another series of public hearings appears certain on alleged attempts to gain favors through presidential assistant Sherman Adams.

This would be separate from the current inquiry by a special House Commerce subcommittee, which recalled Bernard Goldfine for an expected final day of questioning.

Both Adams and Goldfine, a Boston textile and real estate millionaire, have denied that Adams sought or obtained favored governmental treatment for Goldfine, a long-time friend.

The investigation subcommittee of the House Armed Services Committee today had its staff sifting files relating to the settlement at a reduced rate of an Army penalty against Raylaine Worsted, Inc., Manchester, N. H. The firm is now defunct.

The subcommittee chairman, Rep. F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) would say only that the files are being evaluated and the committee expects to know soon what action it will take.

But a highly placed congressional source who would not permit use of his name said the developments that already have taken place require "public hearing to protect the innocent, if for no other reason."

Those developments are:

1. Chairman Oren Harris (D-Ark.) of the special subcommittee which has been investigating relations of Adams, Goldfine and

federal regulatory agencies disclosed that it had turned up the Raylaine matter and referred it to the Armed Services Committee. Harris said Goldfine was not involved, but wouldn't say as much for Adams.

2. Harris mentioned as an incorporator of Raylaine in 1938 an unidentified Perkins Bass, Rep. Perkins Bass (R-NH) touched off a largely party-line row in the House yesterday by protesting Harris' action. He called it a sneer and character assassination.

Bass said he has no recollection of any contact with Raylaine, though it is possible the law firm which employed him as a clerk in 1938 listed him as a matter of convenience to fill out the roll of incorporators. Bass denied even being asked to do anything, as a congressman, for the company.

3. Leo Wolff, former president

of Raylaine, denied that Adams or any other public figure used influence in behalf of the company. He said he didn't even know Adams, and any idea that political influence was used was "damned ridiculous."

But he acknowledged that he and Allen Grew, a Raylaine employee who was a boyhood friend of Adams, wrote letters to the presidential assistant while Raylaine was seeking reduction of an

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\$50,000 penalty for late delivery of textiles to the Army. Wolff said under the final settlement the company got \$40,000 back.

The White House said Adams made only routine inquiries about the Raylaine matter, using a regular form to relay queries.
