

# Giants Win In Last Inning Indians, Yankees, Boston Triumph

## Braves Victors, Hold Lead

The names are different and some of the lineups may be lacking, but San Francisco has revived those late-inning thrillers that were such a big hit for the Giants in '51 and '52, their last pennant years.

The Giants, hanging in there, half a game behind Milwaukee in the National League race, have won 16 games in the last inning. That's a third of their 47 victories.

On their current home stand, they've won 9 of 12, winning 6 by one run and 5 of those with ninth-inning rallies.

They beat Philadelphia 8-7 with three in the ninth yesterday. Two came in on Orlando Cepeda's

double, but the clincher came home on a bases-loaded wild pitch. Milwaukee stayed a wink ahead of the Giants by giving the skidding St. Louis Cardinals another shove, 8-7. Cincinnati side-tracked the third-place Chicago Cubs 3-2. Los Angeles hammered Pittsburgh 6-3.

In the American League, the New York Yankees stayed 12 games ahead with a 4-2 decision over Detroit. Second-place Boston beat Kansas City 6-2. Milwaukee defeated the Chicago White Sox 2-0 on Billy O'Dell's nine-hitter and Cleveland defeated Washington 8-3.

## SF 8, Phillies 7

The Giants, who stand 15-17 in one-run decisions, got rolling after the Phils broke a 5-5 tie with two runs in the ninth off reliever Don Johnson, called back to the majors from Toronto the night before. The Phils' ace reliever Dick Farrell, now 6-3, lost his second to the Giants with a couple of walks that Cepeda converted into runs, two more that loaded the bases and then an errant 1-2 pitch to pinch-hitter Hank Sauer.

Mary Grissom (6-3) won it for the Giants, who got home runs from Willie Kirkland and Leon Wagner. Harry Anderson hit a three-run homer for the sixth-place Phils.

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## Sports Bill OK Suggested

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Kenneth B. Keating today urged approval of pending sports legislation as a "measure intended to be equally good, not equally bad, for all professional team sports."

The New York Republican, senior GOP member of the House Judiciary Committee, said a pending Senate bill to exempt major professional team sports from the antitrust laws is "essential if we are to eliminate the discriminatory treatment of our national team sports under present court decisions without at the same time subjecting all of them to potential ruinous antitrust litigation."

Keating made the statements in testimony prepared for the Senate antitrust and monopoly subcommittee. Also scheduled to testify with Keating were Bob Feller and Jackie Robinson.

"There is no grave threat to our economic system from the alleged baseball or football or hockey or basketball conspiracy which demands that sports be treated so severely," Keating said.

He said all should be treated alike as opposed to the present confused status in which baseball holds broader exemption from antitrust statutes than football or other team sports.

Finsterwald was runner-up last year in the final match play PGA championship. He took a 3 and 2 defeat from Lionel Hebert, a long hitting 200-pounder, in the final match. And the happiest man in the "place when Loney came through in a major championship was his elder and more famous brother Jay.

Finsterwald didn't exactly have revenge in mind yesterday when he beat out both Lionel and Jay Hebert for the lead in the opening round of the first medal play PGA championship. But it must have given him a rather pleasant feeling.

As is, if it weren't for a guy with the improbable name of Calvin Coolidge McLish, the Indians would be dead last.

They're seventh now, only two games ahead of Washington. They've won only 7 of their last 15, and McLish was the winning pitcher in 5. And they've won but 3 of their last 10, with McLish, a 32-year-old right-hander who traveled the National League for years, bagging all three.

# Klamath Kubs Host Cuban Giants Here Saturday Night

The Klamath Falls Kubs face their first "outside" competition of the season Saturday night at Gem Stadium when they host the clever and talented Cuban Giants, a traveling colored team comprised of some of Latin America's finest ball players.

Manager Irv Whitt named right-hander Gerry Burcher to start on the mound against the visiting Cubans in an effort to put on a good show for local baseball fans. Burcher, in his first start for the Kubs last Saturday night, won a 4-1 decision from Prineville while not giving up a single base on balls and striking out 12 batters.

The Kubs face one of the finest traveling teams making the circuit this season in the 1953 edition of the Cuban Giants. Several of the stars of the Mexican winter leagues will be with the Giants on their stop here and promise some action-packed baseball play. This is the eighth annual tour for the Cubans.

Manager Oscar Rieco's Giants, loaded with plenty of batting and pitching strength, are playing a 120-game exhibition schedule from coast to coast and Klamath Falls is one of the few spots in the Pacific Northwest to lure the south-of-the-border club.

Besides Burcher, Whitt said he would probably have Ron Owings or Bob Kelly catching, George Hanson on first, Jerry Burke at second, Dorm Martin at shortstop and Ron Conner covering third. In the Klamath outfield will probably be Donn Tauscher in center, Floyd Linderman in right and either Willie Dunster, Mike McKenzie or Whitt will be in left.

Of special interest in Saturday night's exhibition clash between the Cuban Giants and Kubs will be the first public appearance of the Babe Ruth League's queens.
