Rainiers Trounce Portland

 Charley White was a mighty popular guy with the Vancouver Mounties Friday as they basked in the sunshine of their fourth straight Pacific Coast League victory.

White, a 205-pound backstop who bats lefthanded, whacked out the first grand-slam homer ever hit in Vancouver's Capilano Stadium Thursday night as the Mounties edged out Phippen 4-3 and climbed over the Giants into second place.

The first-place San Diego Padres retained their two-game lead by setting the Sall Lake City Bees down in a 5-3 cliffhanger.

In other games, the Seattle Rainiers splattered the Portland Beavers all over the Oregon countryside, 19-4, and the Spokane Indians kissed off a five-game losing streak with a 5-4 decision over Sacramento.

The Mounties spoiled Phoenix a 3-0 lead after two innings and the score stayed that way until White unloaded his game-winning homer in the sixth off Curt Barclay. Singles by Joe Frazier and Ray Barker and a walk loaded the bases before White stepped to the plate.

Art Ceccarelli started for the Mounties, but he lasted only for one and two-thirds innings. Mel Held came in to relieve Ceccarelli and gained credit for the victory.

The Rainiers pounded out 23 hits off the three Portland pitchers thrown into the game. Beaver starter John Buzhardt, although sticking around for only an inning and a third, was saddled with the loss. The Rainiers got six runs, one unearned, off Buzhardt.

The Rainiers got one run in the first frame and then splashed for eight in the second, four of them coming on Hal Bevan's bases-loaded homer. Unsatisfied, the Rainiers shoved across four more in the third, three in the eighth and three in the ninth.

Norm Sherry scored the winning run for Spokane in the ninth inning. He doubled, moved up on a throwing error and coasted in on Jim Williams' sharp single to centerfield.

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SF Wins In Many Ways; Rigney, Fans Don't Mind

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—When there are new ways invented to win ball games the San Francisco Giants most certainly will make use of them.

The rookie-laden Giants have won five of their last six games, including Thursday's come-from-behind 8-7 triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

Of these victories one was won on a bases-loaded walk in the last of the ninth; another when the opposing pitcher hit the batter with the bases loaded in the ninth. And then there was Thursday.

Behind two runs going into their last at bats, the Giants got the two Willies, Kirkland and Mays, on base with walks. Jimmy Davenport sacrificed them along, Orlando Cepeda, new kinspin in the Giants' attack, looped a double

down the right field foul line to send two runners across the plate and tie the score.

Philadelphia relief ace Dick Farrell then walked the next two batters to load the bases. That brought old Hank Bauer to the plate. Hank stood there until the count was one-and-two. Then he watched Farrell uncork one that Carl Sawatski couldn't get and it rolled to the screen as Cepeda jogged across home plate with the winning run.

"This club has so many fine hitters on it," said coach Wes Westrum after the game. "The pitchers get nervous. That's why we get so many breaks this way. We earn them."

Prior to that ninth inning, the Giants came from behind to tie the score three times. Philadelphia got a run in the first, but Kirkland retaliated with a homer on Harry Anderson's homer, but San Francisco got one in the same inning with the feature being Danny Farrell's double.

Philadelphia added another in the fourth but San Francisco got back three on three hits including Leon Wagner's 400-foot homer.

The game stayed scoreless from

that point until the top of the ninth. Don Johnson, the hurler purchased earlier in the week from Toronto, came in for relief duty and was combed for a double and two singles, good for two runs, before he was lifted. Ancient Merv Grissom then came on to retire the side and get credit for his sixth win of the year.

But that only set the stage for the come-back kids as they won their 15th last inning, or extra inning, ball game of the year. Tonight, the Giants sent the slow ball specialist, Stu Miller (2-4) to the mound against Vernon Law (8-7) of the Pittsburgh Pirates.
