The Rev. Marshall McKinnie read the 2 p.m. service in the presence of a large gathering of friends and relatives. The floral background of white gladioli, orchid daisies and green foliage was illuminated with lighted tapers in multi-branched floor candelabra.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Novel A. Welman, 2140 Home Avenue; and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Porter, 2031 Van Ness Avenue. The marriage unites two prominent Klamath Basin families.

Mrs. George McIntyre, organist,

played the traditional wedding music and accompanied Margie Welman, vocal soloist for her sister's wedding. She sang "O Promise Me" and "I Love You Truly" before the nuptial ceremony, and "The Lord's Prayer" during the service.

Eunice, given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of Chantilly lace and tulle over slipper satin. The dress which she designed and made herself, featured a Sabrina neckline sprinkled with ir-

idescent sequins and bridal pointed sleeves on the fitted bodice of lace over satin. Appliques of lace and sequins highlighted the very full nylon tulle skirt which was floor length. Back interest was tiers of Chantilly lace and pleated tulle that cascaded from the waist into a full chapel train.

Her fingertip veil of illusion flared from a head hugging cap of iridescent sequins and satin. The bridal bouquet was a large white orchid atop a white Bible,

borrowed from Melba Snow.

Other traditional items in the bridal ensemble were a blue garter and an heirloom lace handkerchief belonging to the bridegroom's grandmother, Mrs. Harry Silver. A pair of pearl earrings, given her by the bridegroom, was Eunice's only jewelry.

The bride's sister Norma (Mrs. Claude) Taylor, was matron of honor. She wore a street length dress of orchid taffeta brocade with a plain orchid taffeta sash

which crossed in front and hung gracefully in back from the waistline. Her bouquet and hair flowers were white daisies and orchid carnations.
