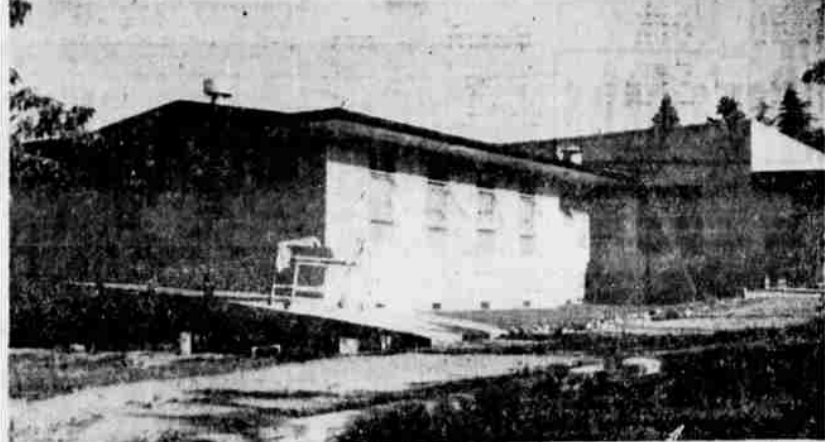

Cut Worms, Army Worms On Move In Basin; Cattlemen Plan Three County Tour

By RAY PETERSEN Cut worms and army worms are showing up in potato and alfalfa fields and it is suggested that growers watch for these pests so that control measures can be carried out in time if population of the insects build up to cause damage. The worms so far have been found more often in potato fields where the infestations are in small spots of three to four feet in diameter. They may not spread any further, but it is still possible for them to move over large areas. The worms can be controlled with toxaphene and the small spot infestations in potato fields could be cleaned up with a hand duster or sprayer. Another suggestion would be to watch for the pests and if they are not too serious, treatment could be held up until the next rapid control application is made in potato fields. One application of Endrin could be used to control aphids, cut worms and army worms. It is recommended that Endrin be used for potato aphids on the next treatment because the heavy vine growth will reduce the effectiveness of Systox. The worms can also be controlled in alfalfa fields with Toxaphene. Here again spot infestation could be treated with hand equipment. Since this insecticide should not be used on forage fed to dairy animals or animals being finished for market, we suggest you contact the county agent's office before treating entire alfalfa fields. We will be glad to discuss a control program with anyone who finds these pests in their fields. Hereford breeders in Klamath County will be host to the Oregon Hereford Association tour on July 31 and August 1. The tour will start in Lake County, July 31 at 9 a.m., with visits to the Maywell - Hotchkiss and Chambers herds. This will be followed by a visit to Warner Valley Stock Company ranch at Adel to see their new feed mill and feed yards. The Lake Cattlemen will treat the group to a barbecue lunch. In the afternoon the tour will proceed to the registered herds of Harry Oberban at Riv. Cecil Haley, Bonanza, and L. J. Horton at Dairy. On August 1 the tour will start at 8 a.m. at the J. E. Campbell Pellet mill on the Lakeview Highway east of Klamath Falls. Visits will then be made to Dr. Paul Sharp's herd at Crystal Springs, L. J. Horton's, Poe Valley, Lost River Ranch, Poe Valley and Frank Worden's near Bonanza. A potluck lunch will be served at noon at the Malin Park. After lunch the group will stop to see Norman Jacob's cattle between Merrill and Malin and E. M. Mitchell's herd west of Merrill. The last herd of Herefords visited in Klamath County will be William Zumburn's at Fort Klamath. The tour will continue on to Prineville Saturday, August 2. All cattlemen are invited to attend all or part of the tour. Imports of dressed meat and live cattle into the United States this past year have disturbed beef producers; Here is a brief outline of the trends in these imports. Imports of Canadian dressed beef and cattle in recent weeks dropped well below the levels reached earlier this year. Since early April weekly imports of dressed beef averaged around 400,000 pounds compared to a weekly average of 150,000 pounds a year earlier and 875,000 pounds during March when U. S. Beef cattle prices first reached the five-year high point. Weekly imports of Canadian slaughter and feeder cattle also fell way below the March volume. Feeder imports during the two month period, April 15 to June 15, were only two-thirds as large as March imports alone. A large part of the Canadian feeders moved to Midwest feed lots. The decline in imports may be explained in part, by stronger feeder prices at Canadian markets and the recent gradual downturn in choice steer prices at major Midwest markets.
