# Bassett, Sherman In Finals

TACOMA (AP)—Two California veterans, Glenn Bassett of Santa Monica and Bob Sherman of Arcadia, stroked their way into the men's singles finals of the Pacific Northwest Tennis Championships here Saturday.

The 31-year-old Bassett, the winner of the 1956 tournament, defeated Doyle Perkins of Seattle 6-1, 6-3, 7-5 in his semi-finals match, while Sherman had to go four sets before downing 19-year-old Jim Watson of San Francisco, 8-6, 6-1, 4-6, 6-3.

Sixteen-year-old Farel Footman of San Francisco and 15-year-old Barbara Browning of Los Angeles will meet Sunday in the women's title match. They defeated Pat Yeomans of Los Angeles and Pam Davis of Los Angeles in semi-final matches on Friday.

Sherman won the junior veterans' singles crown by downing Erwin Douglas of Santa Rosa, 6-1, 8-6. The second-seeded Miss Browning topped first-ranked Miss Footman in the junior women's singles 6-0, 7-5.

Sherman and Bassett also reached the men's doubles finals with a 6-2, 6-2 victory over Clyde Knox and Bill Rose of Portland. Their opponents will be Dick Moody, Los Angeles, and Watson who beat Ron Sandys and Bentley Hill, a pair of juniors from La Jolla, 7-5, 6-4, 6-3.

Top-seeded George Conway of Los Angeles and Sandys will meet in the junior men's title match. Conway outstroked Joe Brown, Seattle, 6-4, 6-3 and the unseeded Sandys downed third-ranked Jim McManus of Berkeley, 6-4, 6-2 in semi-final tests.

# Rademacher, Folley Peak For Battle

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Optimism emanated from the light camps of heavyweights Pete Rademacher and Zora Folley Saturday as they neared peak condition for their 10-round battle Friday night at the Olympic Auditorium.

Neither scrapper—Pete, the ex-mutual king, whose only professional bout was with champion Floyd Patterson, and Folley, a serious young man from Chandler, Ariz.—is given to boastful talk.

But both have confidence in themselves, as well as respect for each other. The fight will be televised nationally, starting at 6 p.m. (PST). Southern California will be blacked out.

Rademacher unquestionably will be in line for another crack at Patterson and his title if he whips Folley, who rates in most books as the logical No. 1 challenger for heavyweight honors.

But Folley is well aware that Patterson's manager, Gus D'Amato, has him on the D'Amato blacklist because he has in the past fought under the promotion of the International Boxing Club.

The IBC has the TV rights to this match, too, but apparently this won't affect Rademacher's relations with D'Amato.

"I'm five times the man I was when I met Patterson last year," Rademacher says in reference to his game but losing shot at Floyd in Seattle last August.

Rademacher and Folley actually will be boxing for the third time. They met in 1953 as amateurs. Folley winning the first decision and Rademacher winning the next one.

# Bud Bomar, Local Keglers To Compete

Buddy Bomar of Chicago, former national match game singles and team titleholder and twice winner of the national doubles crown, will show Klamath Falls fans the kind of bowling that has led him to numerous championships when he makes a personal at Lucky Lanes.

Bomar will enter a match game against Bob Victorin, Mel Robinson and Al Hakenwerth, all leading local bowlers.

Only 42, Buddy has garnered more titles than most star bowlers collect in a lifetime. He has been consistently at the top of the bowling heap for the past 10 years, and seems to be improving with age. Recently he notched his 89th 300 game. Incidentally, Bomar's perfect games will stand the closest scrutiny. There are no "phonies" on Buddy's amazing record.

In 1950-51, Buddy found time to capture the national match game doubles crown for the second time, paired on this occasion with Ned Day. He has previously snared this title with Bill Flesch as his partner. Before Bomar and Day finally won the crown, however, the two had finished in the runner-up spot twice. Buddy holds the highest individual average for the doubles competition with a 216 average.

During the 1949-50 season, Buddy led his team to the championship in both divisions of the famous Chicago Classic League, the world's fastest bowling loop. Buddy averaged 217 to top all individual marks in the Tuesday division.

Buddy will show fans of this vicinity the smooth delivery which has carried him to some astonishing scoring heights. The Bomar record shows 89 300 games, and he boasts numerous games of 299 and 298, so many that he has long since lost count of them.

The odds are there, any takers? Minor league baseball is having enough troubles drawing at the gate these days, and when the parent clubs in the majors pick off the top stars of the lower classification clubs, the problems grow worse.

Just a week ago, Pittsburgh called up Dick Stuart, the home run hitting clown from Salt Lake City of the Pacific Coast League. The interest in PCL activity has dropped off measurably since then. Stuart was going for Tony Lazzeri's home run record of 60 set in 1925, and he was well ahead of Lazzeri's record-setting pace.

Stuart won't get a crack at the record, but what is even worse, the Pacific Coast League team, which counted on Stuart's color and slugging to draw fans through the gates are going down for the count. Every league, major or minor, must have a little extra to go with its brand of baseball. The most successful clubs in baseball today—financial success—have a good promotion plan working for them, giving the fans a little extra. And Stuart was giving the PCL fans plenty of extras.

Pittsburgh isn't the only club doing this, all of them are guilty. New York called up Zach Monroe from Denver. Philadelphia called on Don Cardwell from Miami. Cleveland takes Earl Averill from San Diego and San Francisco recalled Willie Kirkland and Felipe Alou from Phoenix just when the Giants' PCL club was on the move.

There isn't a rule against it, but it's helping to kill an already sick minor league program.

Do you baseball fans who followed the old Klamath Falls Gems remember the name Ray Perry? Back in the late 1940s when the Far West League was going well and Klamath Falls and Redding fought it out for pennants, Perry, known as the "Little Buffalo," managed Redding. He was one of the most colorful and popular figures in the league. He was probably booted more than any other person in the league's history, but people always came out to see him and had plenty of respect for his home run hitting power.

Today, Perry is still at it. He is managing the Reno Silver Sox of the California State League. Ray, who still calls Redding his home, is playing off and on as a playing-manager and every once in awhile he still clears the fences with a blow. At the latest report, Perry was hitting 224 in 54 at bats including two home runs.

# Sam Snead Seizes Lead

By WILL GRIMSLEY Associated Press Sports Writer HAVERTOWN, Pa. (AP)—Sam Snead, at his glorious best, charged in with a three-under-par 67 Saturday and seized the third round lead in the Professional Golfers Assn. championship with a score of 207.

The man in the traditional straw hat, winner of 100 tournaments but never the National Open, took a one-stroke edge over Bill Casper of Apple Valley, Calif., who missed a tying 16-foot putt on the final green. Casper shot 68 for 208.

Snead tore the Llanerch Country Club course apart for 16 holes and then reverted to character. He three-putted the 17th and missed a birdie four-foot putt on the 18th which would have shoved him farther in the front.

Dow Finsterwald, who shared the halfway lead with Jay Hebert at 139, had to sink a difficult 16-foot putt on the final green for a 70 which gave him third spot in the packaged finish at 209.

Hebert, elder brother of defending champion Lionel Hebert, scrambled to a 73 which left him five strokes off the pace going into Sunday's showdown round.

Jack Burke Jr., winner of both the Masters and the PGA in 1956, was at 211 after a third round 69.

Snead, at 46, is shooting to become the oldest man ever to win this professional event. The oldest man ever to take the title was Chick Herbert, who did it at the age of 39 in 1954.

The slammer from White Sulphur Springs, West Va., is seeking his fourth PGA crown, which would carry him closer to Walter Hagen's mark of five PGA trophies. Snead won before in 1947, 1949 and 1951.

# Husky Crew Whips Leningrad Oarsmen

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS MOSCOW (AP)—The University of Washington's rowing crew avenged its defeat at Henley Saturday by sweeping to a length and three-quarters victory over Leningrad's Trud eight on the waters of Moscow's Khimi Reservoir.

Despite the tension caused by the Lebanon crisis, the Americans' front-running triumph in the 2,000 meter (mile, 427 yards) race was cheered heartily by a crowd of more than 4,000 fans. The spectators were mainly Russians, but the onlookers included U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson, his wife and most of the American Embassy staff.

Foreigners rarely are permitted in the reservoir area, the center of a military installation. The ambassador and his party as well as many American tourists were allowed to watch the regatta. It is one of many events in the U. S.-Russian sports and cultural exchange.

The Russians were extremely cordial and the program went off without a hitch.

The Huskies, who were unbeaten until they lost to the Trud crew at the Royal Henley Regatta on July 3, were guests of honor at an official sports reception Saturday night. They also have been invited to tour the ancient churches and museums of the Kremlin and attend the Air Force Day show at Tushino Sunday.

In the three-shell pair-oars race, John Fish and Gene Phillips, a couple of Washington spars, finished third behind the Central Army Club of Moscow and Moscow Dynamo. The winners were timed in 7:43.8 and Washington's two-shell was in 8:10.6.

The Washington varsity's margin over Trud was about the same scored by the Russians on the Thames.

The Huskies, stroking at a high beat, took the lead after the first few strokes and led all the way. Rowing into a stiff cross wind, the tall Huskies moved smoothly and pulled ahead with each stroke. They were timed in 6:18.6 and Trud in 6:24.2.

Coxswain John Bisset of Opportunity, Wash., was given the traditional dunking by the crew. The Russians cheered and laughed as the tall, muscular oarsmen swung the 130-pound cox into the water.

"We are just delighted," said Washington Coach Al Ulbricksen, cracking one of his rare smiles. "After the first few strokes we led all the way. The boys did a wonderful job."

# US Thinclads Off To Russia

NEW YORK (AP)—Unless something unforeseen happens, the U. S. team will take off Sunday for the biggest track and field meet outside the Olympics in Moscow next week—and furthermore will ask no special precautions against demonstrations—it was indicated Saturday.

Dan Ferris, honorary secretary-treasurer of the AAU who is in charge of the party, said he had not heard a word from the State Department and that all other obstacles to the trip had been smoothed out.

He added that he wasn't concerned over the anti-American demonstrations that have been going on in Russia since the development of the Mideast crisis and would ask for no special police protection.

"I am confident there will be no ill feeling toward us," he said. "Our athletes always have been well treated by the Russians and we have no reason to believe that there will be a change this time."

# Australians Smash Marks

CARDIFF, Wales (AP)—Australia's fabulous swimmers smashed a world record and broke an Empire Games' mark Saturday night to top off a record-breaking day in the British Empire and Commonwealth Games. Seven Empire track and field records were broken earlier.

A quartet of Aussie females shattered their own standard of 4:19.3 for the 440-yard freestyle relay with a time of 4:17.4 in winning the championship.

Right after the girls got through four Australian men captured the 880-yard relay in 8:33.4. This bettered the Empire Games' record of 8:47.6 set by another Australian quartet at Vancouver, B. C., four years ago.
