

### Beauties Begin Battling For Coveted World Crown

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Beauties competing in the seventh annual Miss Universe pageant began rehearsals in Long Beach Municipal Auditorium today for the all-important judging.

After a session of parading on runways in the auditorium, the

covey of 79 foreign and domestic beauties was scheduled to bus to Hollywood and visit 20th Century Fox studios.

Judging begins Tuesday night when the United States entrants vie for the title of Miss U.S.A. Fifteen finalists will be selected and parade Wednesday night when this nation's representative will be chosen.

Thousands of persons jammed Ocean Boulevard Sunday to see the parade of the contestants, each riding an individual float "navigated" by a sailor or soldier reservist.

Gladya Zender, the Peruvian beauty selected as "Miss Universe" last year, rode in a convertible near the head of the procession of 124 units, including 22 bands and several marching groups.

Eugenia Maria Valverde, 17-year-old Costa Rican lovely who disqualified herself because she was too young under pageant rules, also was in the parade, but not as a contestant.

Pageant officials planned to present her with a special trophy for her honesty.

After Miss United States is chosen Wednesday night, the judging will move into the selection of Miss Universe, who will receive \$11,000 in cash, a 1958 convertible and have her expenses paid for a year.

The finals will be Friday night when Miss Universe will be named. She will be feted at a ball on Saturday.

### Traffic Kills 7 Oregonians

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — At least seven persons died in Oregon highway accidents over the weekend, raising the Associated Press list of 1958 traffic deaths in the state to 208.

Twenty-seven have perished on the streets and highways so far this month, compared to 38 for the entire month of July last year.

Two persons met death in Sunday highway crashes in opposite ends of the state.

Carolyn Edele Nicholas, 38, of Newport, was killed Sunday night in a two-car accident on U.S. 101 north of Newport, a quarter-mile north of Whale Cove. State police said two other persons were injured seriously. Their names were not learned at once.

Warren Duane Cassal, 31, Pilot Rock, died in a spectacular one-car crash early Sunday at Pilot Rock. State police said his car failed to make a turn as it sped down a hill into town. The speeding automobile smashed into a truck and then careened into a nearby service station, crashing through locked doors into the lubrication room.

Two violent collisions Saturday killed four persons, two in each crash, a few miles apart east of Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Sinclair of Portland were killed outright when their car was involved in a three-car collision on the Columbia River Highway. Two of the couple's young sons in their car were slightly injured.

Later, a head-on collision not far away on the Banfield Expressway killed Robert Bangs, 38, of Beaverton, and Emma Williams, about 30, Portland.

Mrs. Jack Davis, about 45, who lived on a ranch near Heppner, was killed when a pickup truck plunged down a 40-foot bank near Heppner.

Another traffic victim died Saturday from injuries suffered in a Friday crash. Donald E. Dnerler, 45, Salem, died in a Salem hospital. He was injured when a car failed to make a turn and crashed into a mail box on a highway near Salem.

### Siskiyou Board Names Officers

McCLOUD—The Siskiyou County Board of Education elected Robert Dewey of Dunsmuir as president and Bruce Martin of Scott Valley as vice president at a regular meeting of the group held in Yreka, July 17.

In other action the board approved two requests for inter-district pupil transfers; audio visual contracts for Rogus and Red Rock; appointment of Douglas Whitaker, trustee replacing Robert Fremd at Hill and Margaret Watson for trustee at Happy Camp, replacing Ralph Turk.

They also instructed the county superintendent of schools to request the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors to lapse the Mono School District.

Six school districts were voted the sum of \$20,000 to balance their budgets.

The next meeting of the county board will be at Yreka August 28.

Shasta Station Slates Changes

MOUNT SHASTA—Mount Shasta Radio Station KWSB has received a permit to change the frequency of their station 1340 kilocycles, to 820 kilocycles and to increase the power from 250 watts to 1,000 watts. The change will be made during August.

This will increase the area over which reception may be had by a wide margin. The broadcasting tower, now 200 feet high will be increased to 250 feet. Messages may be received under the new setup as far away as Ruby's Kitchen on the Oregon side of the Siskiyou on U.S. Highway 99, and at Warden on U.S. Highway 97.

Anderson, south of Highway 99, will also be within the area of reception.

### Interim Committee Scores Migrant Worker Handling

PORTLAND (AP) — An Oregon legislative interim committee was led Saturday that migrant farm workers in the state are being mistreated and exploited.

The charges were made in a series of detailed studies by state agencies. The studies were requested by the Interim Committee on Migratory Labor.

Some of the most spectacular charges were made in a report by the state Bureau of Labor. This report said there appears to be a ring of Mexican-American labor contractors which deals in marijuana and prostitution for the farm workers.

The report said some contractors cheated the laborers by marking up housing rentals, charging high prices for transportation, and paying workers less than the contract wage.

The report did not list the names of contractors involved in such illegal activities.

The report concluded with the statement that "there can be little doubt that the present contractors are a factor in suppressing the progress of the Spanish-American migrant farm worker toward full and responsible citizenship and Americanization."

A survey report on farm labor transportation told of defective buses and trucks. The report said that of buses checked, 13 per cent had poor foot brakes and 22 per cent had poor hand brakes. The foot brakes on 5 per cent of the trucks were defective and the hand brakes were bad on 32 per cent.

The Oregon State Employment Service Report said that the average pay per man per day ranged from \$3.37 in Columbia County to \$17.65 in Jefferson County. The per diem average for other counties included: Baker \$10.34; Douglas \$4.38; Jackson \$6.67; Josephine \$9.38; Klamath \$11.33; Lane \$3.39; Marion \$4.63; Polk \$5.11; Umatilla, \$9.24. The average for the state was reported at \$5.37.

A report from the state Public Welfare Commission revealed that public assistance expenditures in Oregon for migrants totaled \$384,796 in the year ending Feb. 28.

That is only 1 per cent of the state's total assistance expenditures.

Some 1,500 migrant families got help, but 40 per cent of these families were on the relief rolls for one month only.

The state Board of Health Survey reviewed health and hygiene problems of the migrant workers. The report said sewage disposal facilities were unsatisfactory in more than half the labor camps investigated.

Of the 190 camps checked, 18 were reported in good condition, 53 in fair condition, and 32 in poor condition.

The interim committee has taken no action on the surveys.

### Moonwatcher Out Of Funds

PORTLAND (AP) — Robert Boardwell, director of the local moonwatcher observation team, said Sunday he was "not going to quit completely" and stop watching satellites.

Earlier Boardwell had said the moonwatchers would have to disband for lack of funds. Sunday he said he would "have to mark time" until he had the finances to repair equipment out of adjustment.

He said stopwatches, a tape recorder and other gear used in tracking the satellites are all out of adjustment.

Boardwell's volunteer team of observers has been tracking the rocket section of Russia's Sputnik III satellite on its passes over Oregon. He said the rocket could be observed at 2:58 a.m. Tuesday in the northeast sky, 42 degrees above the horizon.

### Fair Head Asks Early Entries

SUSANVILLE — With less than three weeks remaining before the opening day of the annual event, exhibitors in the 1958 Lassen County Fair and Livestock Show were urged today to submit their entries as soon as possible.

Manager Abe Jensen said that persons who know what they will be exhibiting can save time and inconvenience if they file their official entries before the last-minute rush.

The fair will begin Wednesday, August 13, at the fairgrounds here and will end Sunday, August 17.

Among the events scheduled for the fair are a two-night horse show, a two-day rodeo and horse-racing program, the second annual Northwest Loggers' Contest, a street parade, a variety show featuring nationally known entertainers, and numerous other attractions.
