

Braves Beaten By Cards

Idle SF Boosts Loop Lead

What makes that National League race so tough? A playing pattern that gives you a three-game sweep from a club one week then hands you a loss to the same bunch a week later.

Ask the Milwaukee Braves and the Chicago Cubs.

The Braves, with a chance to regain first place from idle San Francisco, blew 3-0 and 4-3 leads last night and were beaten 5-4 in 14 innings by the St. Louis Cardinals. Curt Flood's sixth homer gave it to the Cards, who lost

three in a row to the Braves at St. Louis a week ago.

And the Cubs, who swept Cincinnati in three last week, were belted 9-4 by the Redlegs last night in the only other game scheduled.

No games were scheduled in the American League.

The Braves remain a full game behind the Giants, who open a road trip tonight at Philadelphia.

The Cubs now are just a game ahead of the fourth-place Cardinals, 5½ games behind the Giants. The Reds jumped from eighth to fifth.

Lew Burdette, whose error gave the Cardinals a 3-3 tie in the seventh inning, was handed a 4-3 lead on Joe Adcock's 13th homer in the Milwaukee seventh. Bob Wally Moon, sent in extra innings with a ninth-inning homer, his second off Burdette, now 9-8.

The winner was reliever Bill Wight, who blanked the Braves on four hits over the last 6 2/3 innings for his first National League victory.

The Redlegs breezed against the Cubs, although Harvey Haddix had his troubles in the ninth before gaining a 6-5 record. Cal Neeman, who belted a two-run double earlier, hit his ninth homer, and Tony Taylor doubled with one out, but Haddix wrapped it up after Taylor was nailed at the plate trying to score on a single.

Bob Thurman hit a three-run homer for the Reds in the seventh, but they had it bagged in a four-run fourth. Rookie Marcelino Solis lost his first major league decision as George Crowe lined a bases-loaded double for two runs. Two more scored on a force-out and Roy McMillan's single.

Cerv Hits For KC Score

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Bob Cerv has furnished the Kansas City Athletics with more runs than any other player this season Tuesday night the fans are going to furnish his new home.

It's Bob Cerv, night at Municipal Stadium for the 32-year-old outfielder, who ranks second among American League hitters despite a succession of injuries.

Former president and Mrs. Harry Truman will be among the 20,000 expected for the home-stand opener with Boston. So will Gov. James Blair of Missouri, George Docking of Kansas and Victor Anderson of Nebraska.

Cerv is second in the league with 65 runs batted in, tied for third in homers with 24 and fourth in hitting with a .325 average.

He probably leads in courage—a statistic the records don't show. Cerv has played this season while his jaw was broken and wired shut. He played in the all-star game with a broken toe. He will be in the starting lineup Tuesday night with an elbow, painfully swollen. Cerv was hit by a pitched ball Saturday.

Moore May Meet Fullmer

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Possibility of a light heavyweight title fight between champion Archie Moore and former middleweight champion Gene Fullmer came to light Monday night.

Billy Newman, a gym operator and manager of several local fighters, said Moore had agreed to negotiate with a "syndicate of Salt Lake City wealthy businessmen" for a 15-round title bout that city sometime after Sept. 8.

Newman said he spoke with Moore at his San Diego home on the telephone after the syndicate had proposed he act as intermediary in setting up the fight.

Newman said Moore would demand \$100,000 and that Fullmer would probably get a percentage of the gate.

"Fullmer will have a good chance," Newman said. "Archie now weighs about 205 pounds and he'll have trouble in getting down to 175 in that short a time. He'll have trouble with that altitude, too."

He said Fullmer, on the other hand, would have no trouble with the 161 minimum for the light-heavy division. He predicted Fullmer would fight at about 160 or 170 pounds.

He said Moore is required to defend his title shortly anyhow under ring regulations.

College Boy Discus Choice

CARDIFF, Wales (UPI)—An American college student is favored to walk off with the discus championship when the track and field competition resumes today in the British Empire games.

Mike Lindsay of Scotland, who is studying engineering at the University of Oklahoma, is the student entry in the discus final. His chief rival is Stephenus Dulleis of South Africa, who already has bettered 180 feet this year.

In the featured three-mile event, Albert Thomas, a wiry, 23-year-old clerk from Sydney, Australia, will be out to better the world record of 13 minutes, 11 seconds which he set in Dublin two weeks ago.

He will run against such capable performers as England's Derek Ibbotson and Gordon Pirie, and Australia's Dave Power, winner of the six-mile run last Saturday.

Canadian Am Tourney Starts

TORONTO (UPI)—A score of 152 was expected to be good enough today to win a qualifying berth in the 1953 Canadian Amateur Golf Championship at the par 21 Scarborough Golf and Country Club.

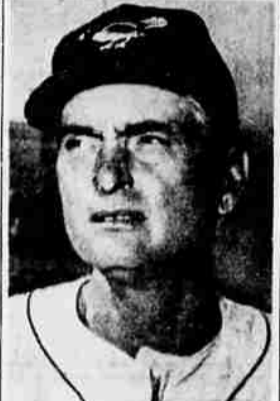

Orioles Resting In Third

Okay, so Manager Paul Richards has some different ideas about baseball. But his Baltimore Orioles in third place in the American League Race? How unorthodox can you get?

Yet that's where the Birds were sitting as they opened a two-week tour of the West at Chicago. They're 14½ games behind the New York Yankees, but they're only 3½ shy of second-place Boston.

The Orioles moved to third by taking two of three from Cleve-

land last weekend while Detroit lost three of four at Boston and slipped to fourth.

The Orioles have won 8 of 12 since the All-Star break in a jump from seventh to third.

Pitching has been the answer for the Birds, who have improved their starting each season since gaining the old St. Louis franchise in 1954. They were seventh in '54 and again in '55, although they won three more games in their second season, sixth in '56 and fifth last year.

With the likes of Jack Harshman (late of the White Sox), Arnie Portercarrero (late of the A's) and Billy O'Dell and Milt Pappas, a couple of home grown kids, the Orioles are just one game under .500. The pitching staff has a record of 30 complete games, the same as the White Sox, and second only to the Yankees' 36.

The Yankees are at Detroit tonight. Boston is at Kansas City and Washington's at Cleveland for a two-night pair.

No games were scheduled in the AL yesterday.

In the only two scheduled games in the National League, Milwaukee missed a chance to regain first place from idle San Francisco in a 14-inning, 5-4 defeat by St. Louis and Cincinnati beat the Chicago Cubs 9-4.

Referee, Two Boxers Swap Blows In Ring

NEW YORK (UPI)—Promoter Teddy Brenner said today he would like to stage a return of Monday night's wild, rough-house fight in which referee Teddy Martin was pummeled.

Martin was banged around by two angry New York welterweights, Billy Flaminio and Eddie Lynch, when he tried to break them out of a clinch in the seventh round of their TV 10-rounder at St. Nicholas Arena.

Stubby Flaminio, weighing 147½ pounds to Lynch's 149, won the unanimous decision after a fight so rough that it threatened at times to provoke a riot among the 1,254 fans.

Each boxer was warned repeatedly for rough tactics by the referee who penalized Lynch the sixth round on a foul for holding and Flaminio the eighth on a foul for kneeling.

The peak of excitement came in the seventh when husky Martin tried to break them from a clinch in a corner. Both were so angry at each other that they kept punching for about 30 seconds, with Martin in the middle — before the bell rang to end the round.

"They didn't hurt me any," said Martin. "They lost their heads—particularly Lynch."

"I lost my head because Martin kept shovin' me and threatenin' to hit me," explained Lynch, a West Side warehouse worker.

"I didn't threaten to hit him," Martin defended. "When he kept punchin' I just told him to cut it out because I'm a pretty good boxer myself."

Klamath, North Bend In Jr. Legion Playoff

Klamath Falls and North Bend legion baseball players meet at Gem Stadium Wednesday night in the first game of a best-of-three sub-district playoff that could take the local junior legion nine into the state tournament.

Game time for the seven-inning affair is 8 o'clock. Admission prices are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for high school students. The season tickets are not good for playoff games.

Manager Hi Hatfield's Klamath Falls team will be relying on the strong right arm of pitcher Blake Griggs. It was Griggs who led the Klamath Babe Ruth team to the regionals last summer before being beaten, and local baseball fans hope he can do the same thing this year in a higher classification of youth baseball.

So far this season, Griggs has won six and lost two—one to Bend, the other to Central Point. The Central Point loss was the only defeat suffered by Klamath in District 3 Southern Oregon League competition. Klamath's over-all team record is only so-so, winning 13 and losing 16.

Other probable starters for Klamath tomorrow evening will be Dean Dunson at first, Smiley Herrera and Steve Binney at second and short and Estin Kiger covering third. In the outfield will probably be Bill Worlein, Bob Yunc and Glenn Michaels. Doing the catching for Klamath is Rich Moore.

Hatfield said he would have Keith Ferrell and Dunson both ready for relief work should Griggs falter. "This first game is the big one for us," Hatfield told his club at Monday night's practice. "We need this one to take with us over to North Bend this weekend. You can bet your last dollar they will be hustling hard for themselves, which means we have to work just a little harder." Hi added.

The second game of the series will be played on the North Bend club's diamond Saturday night. The third game is billed for Sunday afternoon at North Bend, whether or not necessary.

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County All-Stars Defeat AL, 4-3

Babe Ruth League baseball broke into television at Gem Stadium Monday afternoon as the American League-County All-Star exhibition game was telecast by Station KOTI-TV. The telecast was the first live sports program attempted by the local station.

A tight pitching duel for the first six innings, the game was decided, 4-3, in favor of the County All-Stars in the bottom of the seventh. A back-to-back singles combined with a pair of American League miscues to provide the victory.

Charged with defeat for the American Stars was John Webb, who relieved starter Wally Palmberg in the fourth stanza. The winner was Chuck Cossey, who entered the contest in the sixth stanza as the third County League hurler. Chilouquinte Norm Jackson worked the third innings for the winners and Merrill's Rick Carleton immediately preceded Cossey.

Palmberg gave up one hit and walked one and Webb allowed three hits, walked one and fanned five County batters.

Jackson issued no hits and walked only one during his stint. Carleton pitched hitless ball during his two frames, while Cossey gave up the only two American League safeties.

The American League cracked the scoreboard first as they took advantage of a walk and pair of County errors to score one run in the top of the second inning. The County nine retaliated in the last of the same stanza by counting a run off a single by third-sacker Denny Salvadori, a sacrifice by Bob Mobley and two American bobbles.

Batters went out in order for the next four innings as neither side could count.

In the top of the sixth, the American League took command as John Webb led off with a single. David Saks was issued a free pass and both runners advanced through neat sacrifices by Gary Beber and Don Gredsel. Earl Brinson then bunched one off the left field wall, two feet inside the foul line, to score his mates. The American rally bogged down as Brinson died on the sacks when Dean Rhoads grounded out.

The County All-Stars wasted no time in the bottom of the inning as leadoff man, Bruce Brickner, poled a single and Don Johnson followed suit. Cossey struck out, then Don Willey blasted a towering fly to centerfield that appeared to be well on the way to nothing more than a long out when centerfielder Rich Dewep dropped the ball. Both Brickner and Johnson scored and the ball game was all tied up. Garry Peters lashed a hard one that bounced off shortstop Sherm Allen allowing Willey to score and the festivities ended. The American All-Stars committed six errors while the County

All-Stars bobbled two. Monday night at Conger Field Eastside Electric finally subdued a charged-up Redwing nine and overcame a 7-0, second-inning deficit to win 10-8. The game was called in the sixth stanza, because of the 10-run lead.
