Radio Hams Fear Squeeze

BONN, Germany (AP) — The free world's radio hams fear they will be squeezed out by increasing military and technical demands for ultrashort wavebands.

The threat to the radio amateurs is the main theme of the fourth annual convention of the International Amateur Radio Union, which opened a week's session last night.

About 80 delegates from 14 European countries as well as observers from the United States and Australia are attending.

The convention will prepare recommendations for improving the amateur share of wavebands. They will be submitted to the conference of governments on allocation of wavelengths to be held in Geneva next year.

Delegates said demands on the wavelengths used by hams were increasing from military, shipping and police networks. They cited as an example the loss by American amateurs of the 15-meter band, taken for radar guidance of rockets.

Army Shoots Korea Thief

SEOUL (AP) — The U. S. Army said a Korean thief was shot and killed today by an Army guard who caught him stealing.

The guard was Sgt. Hager B. Blevins, 25, Circleville, Ohio.

The Army said Blevins, on special guard duty after a series of thefts in the 7th Division Engineer Company, spotted two Koreans attempting to carry away water pumps.

Blevins "called halt three times and fired three shots into the air," the announcement said.

"The Koreans, still carrying the pumps, continued to run. The guard then fired two shots at them. Both shots struck the same person. The second Korean escaped."

The 7th Division and Korean police both are investigating. No charges have been filed.

Police Guard UN Delegate

NEW YORK (AP) — Police have posted an around-the-clock guard outside the hotel suite of Abdul Majid Abbas, United Nations delegate of the overthrown government of Iraq, who reported his life had been threatened by an Iraqi army officer in this country.

Police are investigating the threat, reported to them yesterday by telephone. No details of the reported threat were revealed.

Abbas remained in his suite at the Stanhope Hotel throughout yesterday's debate in the U. N. Security Council on the Middle East crisis.

A U. N. official said Abbas had sent word that he was ill.

The 11-nation U. N. Security Council did not act on Abbas last Friday, and thus left him in Iraq's seat although Ambassador Hashim Jawad arrived that day as the accredited delegate of the revolutionary Iraqi government. His credentials are still under consideration.

BLAZE IN DOGHOUSE

Singers Come And Go, But Few Reach Golden Circle

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Singers come and singers go, and only a few reach that golden circle of permanent stars.

Of the younger crop, Eddie Fisher seems most likely to join the Crosby-Sinatra-Come level. That's the impression you get when you see him perform on the Tropicana stage.

"The guy is personable without being brash, modest without being phony. And how he sings! He is one of the few pop singers with enough voice to push aside the microphone and belt a song with no amplification. And he's got feeling, as when he sings "For My Friend," the title tune from "Around the World in 80 Days."

It's no wonder that Eddie was one of the few singers to survive the last TV season. And against large odds. He was faced with the opposition of two top Westerns, Cheyenne and Wyatt Earp. But as the season was closing, he and alternate George Gobel were holding their own and sometimes beating the cowpokes in the ratings.

"We'll be back next year in the same spot," said Eddie after his Tropicana show. "But it will be on a different basis. I'll do only 12 shows, not 16, and I'll be on George's show only three times instead of every week. And I won't be making so many guest appearances on other shows. I did about six last year."

Fisher admitted that the show got off to a slow start—"We made mistakes at first, and we'll make others too." But he profited from them, and his final shows were among the best of the season.

He has also admitted that the Fisher-Gobel chemistry did not come off too well. Both are the gentle type, and a comedy team usually requires one member to predominate. Next season they will mix only six times.

How does Fisher survive when other singers lose their sponsors? The answer is not in the ratings, but in sales. The sales pitch on Eddie's show was aimed at the sponsor's king-size cigarette. Sales went up sharply. Hence the renewal.

Never one to shun work, Eddie followed his strenuous season with a seven-week stint at this desert hotspot. But he plans to take the rest of the summer off in Hawaii with his wife Debbie Reynolds and their two children.

Ike's Kin Set For Meetings

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Eisenhower's brother planned meetings with leaders of all Nicaraguan political factions today after sidestepping criticism of U. S. support for Latin American dictators.

Dr. Milton Eisenhower listened calmly yesterday to opposition leaders who call the Somoza family's long rule in Nicaragua a dictatorship. He gave no answer to them or to youth demonstrations carrying a sign asking "More economic aid, less arms."

But Eisenhower firmly denied a charge that the United States was taking advantage of Latin American countries for its own economic benefit. It came during an outburst of anti-American feeling at a meeting with university graduates after his arrival in Nicaragua on a Central American fact finding tour.

Dr. Juan Zelaya, leader of a dissident offshoot from the Liberal party of the late President Anastasio Somoza, accused Washington of keeping dictators in power with gifts of arms and of economically exploiting Latin American nations.

Eisenhower replied that the United States did not try to hold down other nations' economies. "The truth is that the more trade there is, the more other countries prosper, the more they buy from us," he said.

"I have never witnessed a better demonstration of the need for better understanding," the special ambassador said. "If misunderstanding exists among us with university educations, it must be worse among people who do not have that education."

Other graduates indicated Zelaya spoke only for himself.

TV Producer, Mate Divorced

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — TV producer Rod Amateau would go off to the movies by himself when he got angry, his wife testified in winning a divorce.

Mrs. Joan Andree Amateau, former New York stage actress, received the decree yesterday after telling the court her husband's temper tantrums made her nervous and upset.

The court approved a property settlement and \$350 monthly support for the couple's daughter, Chloe, 3½, who will live with her mother. Amateau is 34, Mrs. Amateau, 28.

LEFT LEG BEST

In the trade union newspaper Nepszava a plain-clothes inspector—described as L. K.—identifies the culprits as:

1. Newspaper readers. They keep their heads buried in their papers when the conductor passes.
2. Debaters. Two or more passengers carry on such an animated discussion that they "fail to see" the conductor.
3. Dodgers. They watch the car before boarding to see where the
