

Squaw Valley Village Work Going Strong

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A labor force of 300 men is rushing construction of the village for the 1960 Winter Olympic Games at Squaw Valley—and there is no doubt that everything will be in readiness for the international event log before 1960.

That's the word today from H.D. Thoreau, executive director of the Organizing Committee and in bold contrast to charges by recently-resigned technical director Alan Bartholemey that the whole program was a mess.

"We have 300 men at work in Squaw Valley," says Thoreau.

Sawyer Back With Phils; Smith Fired

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Ten years ago, less one day, Eddie Sawyer was hired to manage the Philadelphia Phillies. Tonight he takes over again as the Phils' field boss in one of those quirks explained thus by his predecessor: "That's baseball."

General Manager Roy Hamer announced yesterday that Mayo Smith, the man he personally brought up from the minors in 1953 to manage the Phils, was through and Eddie Sawyer, who led the Phils to the National League pennant in 1950, was replacing him.

Sawyer has been out of the game since he was fired midway in the 1952 season for failing to win. How come, Hamer was asked, the Phils hired him?

"He had a good record and he knows the National League," replied Hamer.

Sawyer declined to make a thorough appraisal of his club until he's seen more of it. He explained he'd seen very few games this year because he'd been so busy in his job as an executive with a golf ball manufacturing firm.

Smith said he felt no bitterness. "It was sudden, but that's baseball," he said.

Smith was paid off for the rest of the season when his contract was to have expired. Sawyer was hired through the end of the 1959 season.

"Work is going along smoothly. The physical work is coming along, despite the slow start occasioned by our trouble in acquiring land. And paper work on such things as transportation, housing, etc., is going well."

TICKETS READY SOON

"Ticket applications will be in the mail this fall," Bartholemey, who had started out as executive director of the games and then was demoted to technical director, charged in his letter of resignation that Prentiss Cobb Hale, president of the Organizing Committee, had refused to follow advice of technical experts and would not cooperate with residents of the Squaw Valley areas.

"Actually, we have one less problem than we anticipated," said Thoreau. "Now that we won't be having the bob-sled races, we are removing a big headache."

Thoreau pointed out that the commission now has the funds to handle all problems that may arise.

COMPLETE CITY

"The problems of getting the ski runs and skating rinks ready are of a minor size," he said. "But do you realize we are building a complete city, with sewage systems, electric lights, roads, etc."

"The morale of our staff and our workers is good. We will have the best events in skiing and skating this coming winter to find out how things are going. Then, if everything isn't in apple-pie order, we can always make modifications."

Stated for competition this coming winter will be the North American cross-country race; the biathlon (ski and shoot); invitational ski jumping event; and invitational speed skating. Three skating rinks will be ready for use.

"I'm very satisfied with the way things are going — they couldn't be going better," said Thoreau.

Hale claims that Bartholemey is disgruntled because he didn't get a pay raise—a boost from \$15,000 a year to \$25,000.
