YREKA—The Yreka City Council reached a tentative agreement for annexations of properties to the east and west of the city limits at a meeting on Thursday evening, July 17.

Mobs Force Resignation

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—A demonstration by some 100,000 Venezuelans forced the resignation today of Defense Minister Jesus Maria Castro Leon after he sought to assert political power for the army.

Gen. Castro Leon had served an ultimatum on Rear Adm. Wolfgang Larrazabal, president of Venezuela's five-man ruling junta, in what looked like the first step in a plan to oust the government.

Venezuelans regarded the plan as a showdown between the people and the military, which traditionally has ruled this oil-rich nation. Students, professional people and workers assembled in front of the government palace until after midnight in support of the junta which overthrew the military dictatorship of Marcos Jimenez exactly six months ago.

Syria Fires On Airplane

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP)—Syrian antiaircraft guns fired at an unidentified single-flying plane flying very high over Damascus before dawn today, the army said. The plane fled west toward Lebanon without giving any identification signal, the army said. It added that the plane was believed to have been on a reconnaissance mission.

The unofficial Syrian news agency SNA reported, meanwhile, that the nine-day-old military regime in Iraq will announce a temporary constitution within the next 48 hours.

The 70-article constitution will legalize the proclamation of a republic made by army officers July 14 when King Faisal II was killed and his pro-Western government overthrown, SNA said, and will declare Iraq part of the "entire Arab motherland." This apparently would fall short of formally joining the United Arab Republic of Egypt and Syria.

Iraq will be governed under the temporary constitution until a plebiscite is held to name a president and voters can approve a permanent constitution, the news agency reported.

The chief of the Syrian railways, Mohammed Lem, said rail and auto traffic between Syria and Iraq was reopened yesterday after interruption since the Iraqi coup.

meeting were the complaints registered by residents on south Main Street, pertaining to the problem of trucks parking at night in that area.

According to P. O. Hughes, district superintendent for the California Division of Highways, that

it is "up to the city" to set the regulations for parking along the south highway. He also stated that some trucks must stop to obtain overload and overlength permits from the Division of Highways.

Hughes further stated he "felt the truck operators pay considerable taxes and bring additional money into the community and should not be discouraged."

After considerable argument between several unidentified citizens and Mayor Jim Cummings regarding the car vs. truck problem, Mayor Cummings explained that

no-parking zones "have so far been restricted to cases where the person's business is actually suffering."

Cummings also said that in checking police records, it was disclosed that officers had responded to numerous calls regarding parking violations in the area. He said, "If they are parking illegally, we will enforce the law by issuing tickets, that's all we can do." A report from the city housing commission to the city council disclosed a profit of \$138 for the month of June, and \$2,424.65 for the year, from operation of the city housing project.
