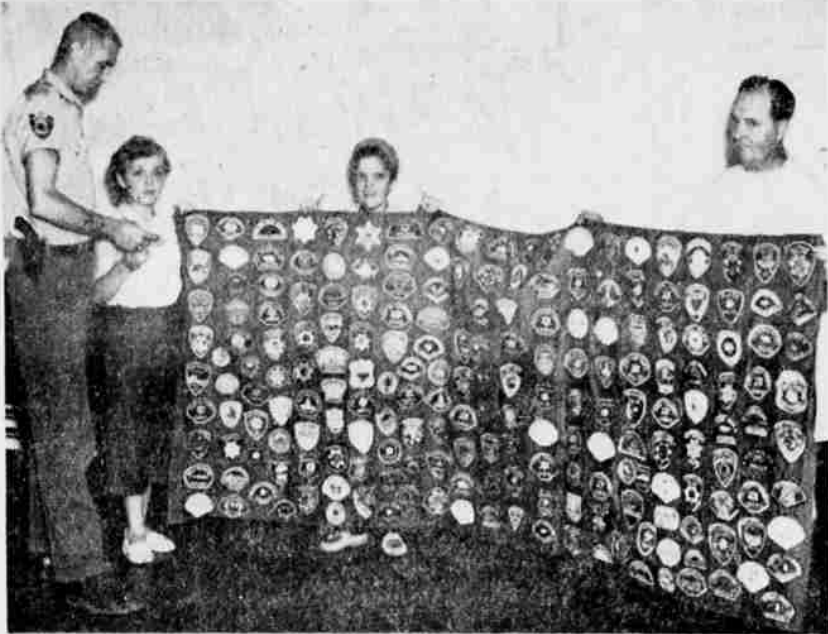

Courses Told By College

YREKA—Ken Young, director of curriculum, office of the superintendent of schools, Siskiyou County, has announced that six post session courses have been scheduled by Chico State College to be offered in Siskiyou County during late July and through August. Courses carry residence credit at \$19 for the two units.

Registration for the first class has been called for 8:30 a.m. (DST) but classes are usually held from 9 a.m. to 12 noon each day, Monday through Friday. Any adult may audit course without credit by paying the \$19 enrollment fee.

The following includes complete list, course description, instructor and available information at this date.

July 28-August 8, McCloud Elementary School, Biology s157, Field Problems in Natural Science, two units. Dr. Thomas Rodgers, Study of McCloud and Mount Shasta area as an outdoor science laboratory.

July 28-August 8, Yreka High School Library (Room 1A), Psychology s159, Evaluation of Pupil Progress, Dr. Richard Hampman, two units. Workshop type approach based on the publication, "Evaluating Pupil Progress," Bulletin of the California State Department of Education, Volume 21, No. 6, April 1952. Emphasis will be on building practical evaluation programs in schools from which teachers enroll.

August 11-22, Grenada Elementary School, Education s261, Curriculum Development and Education s261, Seminar in Curriculum Problems (enrollment may be made under either title) two graduate units. Dr. Robert Fisk and Mr. Norman Abraham. Emphasis will be placed on (1) the significant changes taking place in the world of today (sources of energy, weapons, communications, automation, population, etc.) (2) identifying human qualities essential for intelligent living in a world of change, and (3) finding curricular implications consistent with 1 and 2.

August 11-22, McCloud Elementary School, History s122, History of Northern California, two units. Ernest Neasham.

August 11-22, Yreka High School Library (Room 1A) Education s223 Developmental Reading, two units. Mrs. Vera Ekwall. Techniques and materials in the teaching of reading; basic reading, independent reading skills in content areas; from kindergarten through high schools. Procedures in corrective and remedial cases. Elementary and secondary.

August 18-29, Yreka High School Library (Room 1A), Speech s137, Audiology, two units. Arthur Solomon. A requisite for certification as a school audiometrist. Open to classroom teachers and nurses.

The State Apprenticeship Council has conferred a certificate of journeymanhood in skilled trades upon Rex E. Dillavou and Peter C. MacFarlane of Klamath Falls. Dillavou obtains journeyman rank as a meat cutter upon completion of three years on-the-job training with Safeway Stores, Inc. MacFarlane has been indentured to Carpenters Local No. 190 of Klamath Falls for four years training.

Apprentices are required to attain skills in trade standards set by labor-management committees of the particular industry and take classroom studies in subjects basic to the trade. The state's journeyman certificate gives the craftsman journeyman standing in work skills and wage rate in any area of the United States.

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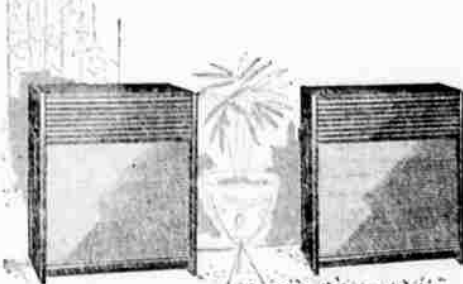
