Phoenix Nips Bevos; Nails First Place

Vancouver took two games out of three from Salt Lake in a rare doubleheader and a half Friday but it wasn't enough as the Phoenix Giants eased into the Pacific Coast League's top spot by .002 percentage points.

The Mounties edged the Bees, 5-4, in the completion of a game suspended last April because of the British Columbia curfew. The two clubs then split a regulation twin-bill. Vancouver breezing to a 3-0 shutout in the seven-inning opener, and Salt Lake taking the finale, 6-4.

At Phoenix, the Giants pushed across a run in the bottom of the 11th inning to shade Portland, 5-4, and oust San Diego from first place. The Padres dropped a 7-3 decision to Sacramento to fall a game behind both Phoenix and Vancouver.

TAKES SWEEP
Seattle swept a pair from Spokane in other games. The Rainiers won the first game, 7-5, then coasted to a 7-1 win in the nightcap.

Vancouver led, 3-1, in the bottom of the seventh when play in the suspended contest was resumed. The Mounties added two more runs in that frame, then withstood Bee threats in the last two innings to hold on for the victory.

George Bamberger hurled a four-hitter in the first regulation contest while posting his fifth shutout of the season. The Mountie righthander struck out seven and for the third straight game issued no walks. Spider Jorgensen led the Vancouver attack with a solo home run in the fourth.

The Bees rallied for three runs in the eighth to score a come-from-behind victory in the finale and salvage the odd game of the triple-header. Harding Peterson provided the big blow in the fourth with a two-run single.

HIT WINS
Jim Finigan rapped out his third single of the game at Phoenix to send home Will Jenkins with the winning run in the 11th. Jenkins had led off the inning with a double.

The Beavers took a 3-0 lead in the first inning, as solo homers by Dave Melton, George Freese and Frank Kellert, but the Giants came back with two runs in both the second and third frames to go ahead, 4-1. Portland pushed across another tally in the fourth to knot the score at 4-4, where it stayed until Finigan's game-winning single. The victory went to Gordon Jones, third Phoenix pitcher, giving him his third win in four nights.

Sacramento slammed three home runs in a big fifth inning to bump the Padres out of first place. Winning pitcher Carl Greene, Ray Webster and Bob Roselli had the four-baggers, all solo shots. The Solons added three more runs in the seventh to win going away. The Sacs collected 12 hits to San Diego's seven.

Seattle's sweep over Spokane ran the Rainiers winning string to four straight, their longest of the season. The Suds were never headed in the opener, but had to overcome a three-run deficit in the second game.

Commission Okays Rules
PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's Game Commission Friday approved final regulations for deer, elk and bird seasons for the 1958 hunting season.

The buck deer season was set for Oct. 4 through Oct. 26 in all parts of Oregon.

The elk season was set for Nov. 1 to Nov. 16 in the Coast Range, with the remainder of the state from Nov. 1 to Nov. 26.

The commission set the pheasant season from Oct. 11 to Nov. 12 throughout the state. A bag limit of four cocks a day and 12 in possession will be allowed. Hunters will be allowed a bonus of one hen in the bag or in possession in Malheur County only now, 8-Nov. 16.

NY's Ford Blanks Indians Pirates Make First Division

Bucs Rap Giants; 16 Hits

Pittsburgh's onetime patsy Pirates now are a bunch of Belts! Bucs, beating the debaters out of the ball in a drive for the National League's first division.

They made it last night, smacking 16 hits, 10 for extra bases, while rookie right-hander Curt Raydon pitched a four-hitter for his first major league shutout in a 10-0 breeze past San Francisco.

That gave the Pirates a four-game winning streak and a share of fourth with St. Louis, 6½ games behind first-place Milwaukee.

The Bucs have smacked 47 hits in their run, more than half of them for extra bases.

Milwaukee moved a full game ahead of the Giants again, although held to a split in a two-night pair with the Cubs. The Braves won 4-1 after a 5-4 defeat. St. Louis split with Cincinnati, winning the twilight opener 5-4, then losing 3-2. Los Angeles rapped Philadelphia 7-3.

Bucled 24, struck out seven, walked four for a 4-3 record with the Pirates. A peg by rightfielder Roberto Clemente got Raydon out of his only jam, nailing Willie Mays at the plate when the Giants managed two hits and a walk in the seventh.

Bob Skinner and Dick Groat each had three hits and two RBIs for the Bucs, with Skinner's solo homer (No. 8) building a 2-0 lead against loser Stu Miller (3-5) in the second inning.

Fraley's Facts, And Figures

NEW YORK (UPI) — Fearless Fraley's facts and figures:

Bob Turley of the New York Yankees undoubtedly deserves the acclaim being heaped on him for his 13-4 record this season but pitching coach Jim Turner still regards Whitey Ford as the "bread and butter" man of the Yankee staff.

"Ford's record always is misleading," Turner explains. "There is some tendency to overlook his effectiveness because he has never won 20 games. What they should look at is the few games he loses. He doesn't get credit for the times he keeps us from being beaten by holding the other team even until a relief pitcher can pick up the win in the late innings."

Ford's best season was 19 wins in 1956. But it also should be noted he has only lost 37 games in seven seasons, an average of only slightly more than five a year. With 12 wins to his credit thus far, he may finally hit that 20-game mark.

COMMON NAME
A file clerk in the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau got a jolt recently when he came across the name of Imre Nagy.

Al Cicotte, whose uncle, Ed Cicotte, was involved in the 1919 Black Sox scandal, isn't the kind to give up easily. The Yanks peddled him to Washington earlier this season and then he wound up with Charleston where he compiled a 5-0 record that has earned him another major league shot with Detroit.

Giammalva Cup Hopeful
NEW YORK (AP)—The strong comeback of Texas' Sammy Giammalva is putting a brighter tinge on the United States Davis Cup picture.

On Thursday Sammy defeated America's top-ranked player, Vic Seixas, in the Pennsylvania Grass Court Championships. The week before he upset Barry MacKay in the National Clay Court event at Chicago.

This looks like the Giammalva who, as a substitute, impressed in the American Zone final at Rye, N.Y., Aug. 15-17.

Selectors are awaiting the outcome of the Pennsylvania tournament before naming the U.S. squad.

Likely to be named, along with Giammalva, are MacKay, the Dayton, Ohio, bombardier who was the sensation of the 1957 Challenge Round at Melbourne; Alex Ornela of the Peruvian from the University of Southern California who holds the national college crown; and Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., member of the U.S. team which beat Canada recently.

Another possibility is Ham Richardson, former No. 1 player who is planning to concentrate on Davis Cup tennis this summer. Richardson has been busy as a senatorial assistant in Washington, D.C., but plans to compete next week at Southampton, L.I.

The Argentine team, headed by 34-year-old Enrique Morea, is scheduled to arrive here Sunday. Morea and his two teammates, Eduardo Soriano, 22, and Ernesto Rios, 26, will compete at Southampton and the Eastern Grass Courts Championships at Orange, N.J., prior to the Davis Cup match.

TIGERS RECALL PITCHER
DETROIT (UPI)—The Detroit Tigers have brought up pitcher Al Cicotte from their Charleston, W. Va., affiliate in the American Association. The Tigers made room for the former New York Yankee and Washington Senators hurler by placing ailing pitcher Herman Wehmeier on the disabled list.

WANDALS TOLD TO GO ALONE
MCCALL, IDAHO (AP)—The Vandals should go it alone, the University of Idaho's representative to the Pacific Coast Conference told a booster club meeting here Friday night.

"There is not a chance in the world to reconstruct the conference," Dean Ernest Wohletz of the School of Forestry said.

Idaho would be better off playing as an independent, he said, but should maintain its close athletic ties with Coast and Northwest schools.

The Vandals will have greater depth than last year and high squad ability, head football coach Skip Stanley told the meeting.

Wohletz described the condition of the PCC as "chaotic" since the withdrawal of UCLA, Southern California, Washington and the University of California.

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Yank Ace In Sixth Shutout

Just a couple of weeks ago, it appeared this was going to be the year Whitey Ford finally won 20. Now it looks as if the stubby southpaw ace of the New York Yankees might bundle up the American League shutout and earned-run titles too.

He lowered his ERA to 1.68 with a third consecutive shutout last night, blanketing Cleveland on four hits for a 6-0 victory that gave him a 13-4 record and pushed the Yankees into a 1½-game lead, their largest yet.

Ford, who beat the Chicago White Sox 5-0 on three hits and Kansas City 8-0 with a five-hitter while running his string of scoreless innings to 27, now leads the majors with six shutouts. That's his one-year high.

It's also the biggest stockpile of shutouts in the AL since Detroit's Billy Hoelt led the league with seven in 1955.

While the Yankees won their sixth in a row, the White Sox knocked off second-place Boston 4-0 on Dick Donovan's eight-hitter. Baltimore whipped Kansas City 8-3. Washington clipped Detroit 4-3.
