ESTABLISHED CAMP
Girls in the Klamath area are lagging with their registrations for Girl Scout Established Camp at Camp Esther Applegate. Mrs. William Dewing, camp chairman, has announced.

This camping opportunity, provided by the Klamath Area Girl Scout Council, is for all girls who have completed the second grade on up. Girls do not have to be Brownies or Girl Scouts to attend the camp.

The first session of established camp is full but the second session still has room for many more girls, Mrs. Dewing said. All girls, who want to attend the camp, should register with the Girl Scout office at 325 Main Street as soon as possible.

Second session camp is from August 12 to 22. The fee is \$21 for Brownies and Girl Scouts of the Klamath council and \$23 for all other girls. The fee includes insurance and transportation.

Special activities are planned for each age group, and all campers will live in units with girls their own age, and with their own unit staff. There will be a registered nurse in camp at all times and camp menus will be carefully planned by a dietitian and prepared by a professional cook.

Camp activities will stress outdoor living, swimming, appreciation and enjoyment of nature, small group activities, hiking, camping skills, sports and games, creative arts, and healthful relaxation. A rest hour is part of each day's program.

Swimming instruction will be available but not compulsory. There will be boating and canoeing for girls who qualify. Every girl will be able to take an hour's horseback ride if her parents have given their permission.

Camp Esther Applegate is operated in accordance with Girl Scout health and safety standards and is an accredited member of the American Camping Association.

Jap Commies Falling Back

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's Communist party is in trouble.
Membership is down. Internal dissension has split the ranks. And the Reds have suffered a series of setbacks under Prime Minister Kishi's government.

Informed sources here feel the party, legal in Japan, is further than ever from its goal of winning over Asia's most industrialized nation.

Before this backdrop the Communists are holding in Tokyo their first national convention in 11 years.
The May Day riots of 1952 turned public opinion against the Reds.

Now membership is down to 50,000, police report. Circulation of (Red Flag) has slumped from 300,000 to 50,000. Only two Communist are in Parliament and an internal revolt has racked the party.

The dispute seems to be over party dogma.
A band of young Turks challenged the policy of working for "a people's government" including elements other than Communists in a sort of popular front.

Shigeo Shida, a member of the Executive Committee, was expelled last May. Three members of a leftist student federation were thrown out this month, after a fist-swinging clash with party elders.

But many observers are guessing that a war of words about recognizing Red China — and increased pressure from the Communists to do so — will move into a new intense stage.

Communist China has made it plain that recognition by Japan is an immediate goal — and the price Japan, now in a recession, must pay for restoring highly coveted trade with the mainland.
